Apopka, we needed to consider 30 years ago how the city would remake itself after the farms closed.

The Board of County Commissioners has taken a large role in promoting the simulation industry and tech hub around the University of Central Florida. Osceola County is promoting the semiconductor chip and automation industries. Orlando was named the best city for sports entertainment in the U.S. These are positive examples of developing new industries in our region. I can tell you many of the businesses in Lockhart are thriving due to the construction of Universal's new theme park, Epic Universe. Yet, in District 2, we still need to diversify our economy from construction.

Richard Florida gives many great examples. If we follow these examples, the principles will bring new opportunity and excitement to our communities, he posits. Innovation is what keeps cities vital and relevant.

Author Jacobs states, "When a place gets boring, even the rich people leave." Without openness as well, a city will lack the ability to attract diverse talent. New talent and ideas are needed to replenish energy and capacity. Our city must have the ability to attract and retain top talent.

Mr. Florida uses Charlotte, North Carolina, to describe its resurgence and success. Here it is - the secret sauce, "The city has built up its downtown, incubated cultural activities, and improved its over-

all talent base of educated professionals." In other words, he says, "Put people first." If we don't, the talent will move from a community that is in decline to one that offers better opportunity.

I have heard these cries on social media repeatedly, yet, cries and frustration do not solve problems. They are the floor to start innovating. A single political leader will never solve systemic societal problems. My next column will share more of Richard Florida's solutions from regions successfully adapting to changing conditions.

I hope you get interested in reading a few of his books. His books have stimulated my thinking and problem-solving skills. I sure could use more help.

County gives Northwest Recreation project application top score for funding

The city of Apopka's application to secure Orange County Tourism Development Tax (TDT) funding received the top score out of all applications by the TDT Application Review Committee at their tentative scoring meeting held on Friday, August 16, at the Orange County Commission Chambers.

The city of Apopka's application titled, "Northwest Rec: 2025 and Beyond" outlined a \$13.1-million proposal to expand the Northwest Recreation Complex by bringing four new softball fields with associated amenities and expanded amenity upgrades to the Apopka Amphitheater.

Apopka Parks and Recreation Department prepared the application, and department director Radley Williams presented the application to the TDT. The application highlighted the existing and future impacts the Northwest Recreation Complex has on Orange County tourism and local economy. In 2023, the complex hosted over 58,000 visitors across 58 sports tournaments and over 31,000 visitors across 15 concerts.

The TDT Application Review Committee will hold its final scoring meeting on Friday, September 13, 2024 at 9 a.m. in the Orange County Commission Chambers. At this meeting, the committee's final recommendation will be drafted and approved for submission to the Tourist Development Council and the Orange County Board of County Commissioners.

The Orange County Board of County Commissioners is set to decide on the final awarding of the TDT funding at a meeting in early October.

The Orange County Tourism Development Tax Application Review Committee reviews grant applications and makes recommendations to the Tourist Development Council, with the final decision being made by the Orange County Board of County Commissioners. The capital project grant request should be for a dollar amount in excess of \$2 million and up to and including \$15 million toward a project for the acquisition, construction, expansion, enlargement, renovation, and equipping of eligible facilities.




