Commission OKs housing development for Wyld Oaks

Two other projects also get greenlight

The Apopka Planning Commission on Tuesday recommended approval for a major development plan proposing a residential development of 54 single-family detached units on nine acres in Wyld Oaks in northwest Orange County.

The major development

plan proposes 4101 Golden Gem Road to go up east of Golden Gem Road and north of the Neighborhood District Overlay of the Wyld Oaks development.

The project owner is Kelly Park VB Development. The applicant is Kimley-Horn & Associates.

The Neighborhood Overlay District allows at most 198 residential units to be built in one phase. After 4101 Golden Gem Road is built out, 144 residential units will be left in the Wyld Oaks Neighborhood District Overlay, according to the staff report in the March 12 Planning Commission agenda packet.

The packet also notes that the Wyld Oaks development agreement says a development is to be determined based on each district overlay's total gross acreage.

The 4101 Golden Gem Road plan will include sidewalks along Golden Gem Road and within the development itself.

Board member Eric Mock asked about where

the 198 units will be located in relation to Wyld Oaks. In response, city planner Jean Sanchez, who is also the project manager, said that 4101 Golden Gem Road is within the Wyld Oaks overlay and that future development would be in the same vicin-

conversation During with the Planning Commission, Mackenzie Cerjan of Kimley-Horn & Associates explained that the storm water management system will include a shared component and a pond to handle runoff, and that the stormwater system can support 198 homes once all are built.

Wyld Oaks is a 215-acre mixed use development currently under construction off the 429 Beltway and the West Kelly Park Road Interchange in Apopka. The development will have many amenities intended to accommodate a thriving state and regional population and help alleviate the affordable housing crisis,

Apopka High School alumnus Jalen Carter was granted the key to the city for winning the Super Bowl with the Philadelphia Eagles and hosting free football camps for local youth.

An estimated 500 people turned out for the city's celebration of Carter on Saturday, March 8, on Fifth Street in downtown Apopka. The ceremony included performances by the Apopka Blue Darters Marching Band and cheerleaders, and remarks by local dignitaries and Carter's former football coaches. After the ceremony, BlueMoon Band performed live music for the rest of the night.

After graduating from high school, Carter, 23,

played three seasons as a defensive lineman for the University of Georgia.

Apopka Commissioner Nadia Anderson spotlighted Carter's numerous accolades such as being a twotime NCAA football champion and a first-round draft pick of the Eagles.

"We are all a village,

and we all know if it wasn't for us, the teachers, the educators, the coaches, right, the community leaders and stakeholders that he would not be here," Anderson said. "So we want to give a round of applause to all the people that have impacted his life. It goes without saying, absolutely, the mother in the

After remarks from Anderson and Carter's former coaches, Mayor Bryan Nelson presented Carter the key to the city for the athlete's contributions on and off the field. For the past three years, Carter operated free

Council approves \$13.1 million county grant

New promotional plans in the works for the amphitheater

The Apopka City Council approved the \$13.1 million Tourism Development Tax (TDT) Grant from Orange County that will finance two separate projects at the Northwest Recreation Complex: the amphitheater upgrade and construction of a new quad of softball fields.

Council members cast their votes on March 5 after Radley William, city parks and recreation director, presented information about the grant and how it would be used to finance the amphitheater improvements and construction of the softball field

The grant is split up into yearly appropriations. In discussion with Commissioner Nick Nesta about the grant, Williams confirmed that no match is required for the grant.

tional plans are in the works for the amphitheater to seek out past promoters and new ones for the venue.

"We're becoming more active in Visit Florida and Visit Orlando to help market this particular venue, along with the field and athletic side of it. And there's interest in the amphitheater," Williams told Nesta. "We actually this week had an outreach from a new person, a new group that's looking for a space that might fit their needs at the amphitheater."

The pantry, launched this past January, assists immigrants and community members who are fi-



OCPS working to upgrade school facilities, expand capacity

Periodically, Orange County School I have meetings with the OCPS facility department to get an update on the construction projects in my area. I always walk away from those meetings in awe of the vast scope of the building program

in our school district. Since 2003, the district has opened 68 new schools and renovated or replaced another 136 schools. Over the next five years, the district plans to open another seven new schools. Over the next 10 years, there are currently 14 new schools planned with four of those in the Apopka area.

The total capital budget for OCPS is over \$3.4 billion used for new construction, land acquisition, renovation, remodeling and maintenance of the more than 200 buildings in the district.

Yes, it is a huge organization that keeps these projects moving and on a schedule. Some of the most important work that is done every day is the maintenance schedule for all of our buildings. These projects, like roofing, painting and HVAC updates, are on a schedule based on the age of the systems. There are over 50 projects currently going on or planned in District 7 alone, totaling over \$131 million.

Several schools are also in line for comprehensive renovations, which include several projects within a school at the same time. Lakeville Elementary and Piedmont Lakes Middle are scheduled to start in 2027.

Apopka High School is currently undergoing a \$20 million multi-system renovation including an auditorium refresh, exterior and interior painting, restroom upgrades and extensive work on the baseball and softball facilities.

Making sure our students have high quality and safe school buildings to go to every day is the goal and priority of the district. It's a big job and sometimes it is important to see how big a job this really is for the district. It's also nice to see a tangible realization of our tax dollars at work.

Apopka expanding water capacity

A lot of folks have been asking about the construction going on at Park Avenue and Grossenbacher, so I would like to explain a little bit about the Grossenbacher site.

Back when I was kid the site was a ballfield where I played Pony League baseball, but it has been slowly taken over by the Public Works Department for a Drinking Water Plant. The Facilities Division staff is also located on the site renovating an old concession building from the Little League days.

Jack G. Grossenbacher Water Plant was completed in 1969 featuring one groundwater well and a 500,000-gallon storage tank. In 1976, a second groundwater well was added to draw from the upper Floridan Aquifer.

The plant underwent a major expansion in 1986, which included the addition Apopka Mayor

of a high-service pump and a 1-million-gallon storage tank. A third drinking well was added in 1989 also drawing water from the upper aquifer.

Our contractor is currently building a 1.5-million-gallon tank at a total cost of \$4 million dollars to replace the 1986 tank, which has reached its useful life. The city is obligated to deepen all of our wells to draw water from the lower aquifer instead of the upper aquifer.

A new well has been permitted and designed at a depth of over 1,000 feet will cost approximately \$1.7 million dollars and should be completed before the end of the year. Water from the lower aquifer is typically not as drinkable as water from the upper aquifer, so additional treatment might be required to meet our high-quality drinking water standard.

Collectively, all of our water plants are permitted by a Consumptive Use Permit (CUP), which is issued by the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRW-MD). The permit allows for 16 million gallons of water to be pumped out of the aquifer.

Our permit expires in 2031 and will require a renewal at that time. SJRW-MD is obligated to make sure that the water that local and state governments are pulling out of the ground will not adversely affect one of our most precious assets — our

Wekiwa Springs reservation system will ensure access

As you may be aware, The Florida State Parks system has rolled out a new day-use reservation pilot program, and as the Orange County Commissioner representing District 2, which proudly includes the gem that is Wekiwa Springs State Park, I am interested to see how this system will play out. This change, which was introduced by The Florida State parks system, promises to enhance the visitor experience while preserving the and the Wekiva River Basin it feeds.

Wekiwa Springs is known for being a sanctuary for families, nature enthusiasts, and anyone seeking a breather from the hustle and bustle of life. Its crystalclear waters, beautiful tree canopy, and abundant wildlife draw hundreds of thousands of visitors annually, with over 400,000 in recent years, with peak months like May through August seeing upwards of 40,000 to 60,000 people.

onto Wekiwa Springs Road, hours-long waits, and traffic disruptions have tested the patience of visitors and resecological integrity of this idents alike. My office has outstanding Florida spring heard many stories, of families arriving with coolers packed and kids in tow, only to be turned away when the park's 250 parking spaces reached capacity. It's a frustration I've felt personally as a homeowner in this area,

The entry fee is \$6 per vehicle with up to eight people, \$4 for a single occupant, or \$2 for bicyclists, and pedestrians, remains unchanged and is collected online at booking, with no additional reservation cost. Annual passholders simply select their status during the process and present their pass at the gate. This isn't about limit-

ing access; it's about ensuring access. By managing the flow of visitors, the Florida State Parks system hopes it will reduce congestion and guarantee that those who plan can enjoy the park without the uncertainty of being turned away. The Florida Park Service, which oversees this initiative, has set the number of daily reservations based on the park's capacity.

The Florida Park Service will evaluate this program's success over the next six months, and I encourage you to share your feedback with them at AskFSP@FloridaDEP.gov. Please visit reserve.floridastateparks.org to secure your spot.

nancially struggling.

With the food drive, Hope Community Center is asking the community and businesses to donate muchneeded items, which may be brought to the nonprofit's campus located at 1016 N. Park Avenue, Apopka.

Necessary items requested are as follows: white flour, Mazeca corn flour, other corn flour (not cornmeal), plain white rice, pre-packaged tortillas, dried pasta (any kind), cereal boxes (regular size and packages of small boxes), pancake mix, pancake syrup, canned tuna fish, canned chicken, peanut butter, dried and canned

beans (pinto beans and black beans), snack bars/ granola bars, shelf-stable milk, baby formula and diapers (all sizes) and baby food.

In addition, churches, schools, organizations, and individuals may put together a food drive to help Hope Community Center and may contact the nonprofit to collaborate.

The rising costs of food and federal cuts to aid are among the reasons for the pantry's food shortage. Hope Community Center has been looking to Second Harvest Food Bank for restock the food pantry before funding was decreased.

"Due to the increasing cost of food, threats of trade wars, and uncertainty in the labor market, low-income communities are facing greater challenges in managing their cost of living. This situation highlights the urgent need to reactivate local food pantries," Hope Community Center stated in an email. "At the same time, federal cuts to several aid programs have impacted food donations to the pantry. Until recently, Hope relied on support from Second Harvest Food Bank to stock pantry staples. But recent funding cuts have sev-

ered this supply line." Second Harvest Food Bank of Central Florida did receive some federal grant money through Orange County in 2022, which was expended last December, said Erica Spence, Second Harvest Food Bank of Central Florida manager of storytelling and communication. However, the nonprofit is waiting for more funds from Orange County to come through this spring, she said.

Spence said Second Harvest Food Bank is also having conversations with Hope Community Center about the center's incomplete paperwork filing and training for a federal commodities program, which caused Second Harvest to cease sending supplies to their food pantry. Once Hope Community Center fulfills its duties in the program, distribution to the pantry will resume, Spence said.

In the meantime, Hope Community Center is welcome to Second Harvest's limited free and reducedpriced food supplies, Spence said.

Meilyn Santana, Hope Community Center chief of staff, said that her nonprofit has a great relationship with Second Harvest, and Hope does get money from the organization for staples.

"Unfortunately, Sec-

ond Harvest hasn't had grants, but will again in April or May," Santana said. "But that's why we're asking the community for help."

Santana said Hope can get free supplies from Second Harvest, but they're not staples.

"We have been shopping, but the bags are so low; it's snacks," Santana said.

Santana said she has never heard of any requirement for training and paperwork for a federal commodities program, but if there is any information available, Hope will welcome it.

assisting communities in impacted Florida areas get back on their feet.

Orange County got \$219.7 million from Community Development Block Grant — Disaster Recovery for expenses including but not limited to facilities, housing and infrastructure.

supporters have said.

Amenities will include up to 200,000 square feet of retail and outparcels, two hotels, 3,000 to 4,000 multifamily and condominium residences, an expansive outdoor entertainment venue, up to 200,000 square feet of office space, the 10-acre park and preserve Yonder, and a section named Wyld Green that will include a multi-use trail network.

Infrastructure that is a part of Wyld Oaks will receive upgrades.

The 2024 demand for Wyld Oaks retail was estimated to be about \$1.1 billion, while supply is only \$700 million, leaving a gap of about \$400 million, a past Wyld Oaks press release stated.

Right now, over 12,900 new homes are situated within 10 miles of Wyld Oaks, and there is a projected 6.1 percent population increase over the next five years, according to data from the development's website.

Other agenda items

In separate discussions and votes, the Planning Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval for the Eden Crest phase one plat, and the Willow Run plat.

The initiative will fund home repairs, replacement, and complete rebuilds as a grant to the residents. Orange County will choose the companies and directly reimburse them.





response. "Let's maximize it, because it can be a an incredible income producer for us in a benefit to the community."

The new \$8.3 million softball field quad, identified as project area one, will span about 632,000 sq. ft. and include restrooms, concessions, a maintenance building, and walkways, dugouts, and bleachers for the softball fields. There will also be grass and ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) compliant parking.

The \$4.8 million amphitheater upgrade, called project area two, will concentrate on renovating 460,000 sq. ft. and include a new ticket booth, a restroom complex, a new concession area, an upper walkway with vendor and food truck areas at the top of the hill, and more ADA-compliant parking and ADA-compliant seating.

In the last few years, the city has been putting extra funding in the capital plans for the amphitheater to increase perimeter fencing, which in turn will lessen the infrastructure costs that currently a promoter will have to bring in such as portable toilets and fencing, Williams said.

Williams also presented the TDT grant and the projects the money will be for at the Feb. 19 council meeting, when he said the grant will be brought back to the council for its approval on March 5.

The county's Tourist Development Tax Application Review Committee evaluates applications for capital gains projects asking for funds between \$2 million and \$15 million toward a project that must be wholly located within Orange County. Such money is for the purchase, building, and remodeling of qualifying facilities.

Also called the bed tax, the TDT is a 6 percent tax that is charged on sixmonths-or-less rentals such as hotel and motel accommodations.



Gilland: Seeing the end before the beginning

Decisions, decisions...we all face them. No one ever said that it was easy to choose the right career, the right spouse, or even the right place to live. No, life is rather complicated, for sure. But it is not impossible.

Like many young college students, I thought my career direction was set. I was going to be an elementary teacher, with an emphasis on teaching math. A good friend of mine had this for a degree, and it seemed like the best fit for me too.

Things went well until the second semester of my freshman year, when I participated in a new class that was aimed at helping college students determine if teaching in the public schools was their true desire.

This class allowed me to do something very similar to what was previously only available during student teaching, and that didn't happen until the student's senior year. For this class, I was given college credit to "intern" at a public school in our area, and assist in teaching basic concepts.

Well, for me, the class accomplished its goal. First, I learned that the only available jobs for young teachers would be in large metropolitan cities, and in their urban schools. At that stage of my life, I had no desire to make such a move.

Second, I had to admit that I didn't have the desire to do what teachers of that day were having to endure in these schools. While I was grateful for and respected the teachers with whom I worked, I came to realize that it just wasn't a good fit for me after all.

This put me at a crossroads: What should I do now? That question was a daily headline in my mind until a very special and quite unexpected conversation occurred with my speech professor.

The course had been required for my teaching major, and it was led by an adjunct professor who was the program director for the CBS affiliate TV station in our area. He talked to me after class, stating that "I don't think you're happy in your major." He was

"You should consider broadcasting, changing your major to communications," he told me.

That discussion opened up a path that I had never considered. But as I looked into it, and prayed over this decision, my heart was put at peace. Doors began to open, and I found myself on a rather fast track into the world of broadcasting.

I would stay with that path as a full-time career for the next 11 years—until the next interruption occurred. That was call into ministry. And during all of my 36 years of ministry, I maintained a connection with broadcasting through voiceover work and occasional part-time jobs for fun and extra

Now, for the last four years, I find myself back in the radio industry. I could never have imagined the future bumps and turns in the road back during that first conversation with my professor. None of us can see the end from the beginning.

In Proverbs 3:5-6, we read:

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make

your paths straight."
What amazing advice from the Lord to us all.
We can trust the Lord to lead us down the
path that will become our life's journey.

All American Furniture closing after over 20 years in business

Family sells entire plaza to developer

After over 20 years in business, the Kim family is saying goodbye to All American Furniture and closing its doors on March 30.

Located at 54 E. Fifth St., Apopka, All American Furniture has been a familiar spot on Fifth Street in downtown Apopka. The furniture store is located in the same plaza with such businesses as Propagate Social House, Three Odd Guys Brewing and the Smoke Exchange.

In its estimated 6,000 square-foot space, All American Furniture sold appliances, antiques, mattresses and more. The store served many lower to middle-income families and created a lot of memories for the community.

Hai Yong Kim, an immigrant from Seoul, South Korea, described operating the used furniture store as relaxing and enjoyable as she received

many friendly customers.

"You know, have a nice customer coming all the time. Very friendly," she said.

Many customers have been saddened by the closure because All American Furniture represents old Apopka.

"One lady was just tearing [up]—she's like, I'm going to miss you. This is just old Apopka, and old Apopka is changing," Hai's son

Young Kim, one of three sons and an attorney, said. His law office is located in the plaza, to the side of All American Furniture.

"Customers have cried, I'm happy too; everybody misses me," Hai Yong Kim said. "I miss everybody too."

Previously, Hai Yung Kim owned a restaurant in California that was popular among movie stars, and she worked

there until she sold it and the family moved to Apopka.

The Kim family purchased the used furniture store from previous owner John Green and acquired the Fifth Street Plaza from Warren Lockeby in the early 2000s. The space All American Furniture occupies once was a nickel and dime store, Young Kim said.

After discussions with

Warren Lockerby, the landlord, he said that the Kim family would have to buy the building or risk not renewing their lease.

After the acquisition, Hai Yong Kim and her husband Howard Kim then expanded All American Furniture's inventory, selling more used furniture for over the next two decades.

When the Kim family took ownership of the plaza, the only tenants were the used furniture store and a Spanish church. Through the family's efforts, Fifth Street prospered. Young Kim was tasked with bringing more tenants into the building, resulting in Three Odd Guys, Propagate Social House and the Smoke Stack becoming tenants.

Over the years, the Fifth Street area further prospered with events, and infrastructure and edifice renovations.

Propagate Social House launched a farmers' market that takes place on Fifth Avenue every Friday.

Across the street, the city renovated the public parking lot that included repaving the ground and planting palm

The Kim family became acquainted with the surrounding businesses on Fifth Avenue too.

When it came time for Hai Yong Kim to retire, no one else in the family wanted to take over the business. Hai Yong Kim said that her longtime employee didn't come to work following a return from a trip, which was a significant challenge. She decided to sell the store and retire, as she wanted to spend more time relaxing and playing golf at the Winter Park Golf Club.

The family sold the entire plaza to a developer with the belief that the investment firm, having more money than the family, could better develop the plaza.

"Our family doesn't have as much money as a large developer to make improvements," Young Kim said. "So for the future, as Apopka develops, and more and more things develop, I think there's going to be so much potential in this building, because there's so much history."



EMILY MEGGETT'S CREAMED CHICKEN

Recipe from Gullah Geechee Home Cooking by Emily Meggett For the Creamed Chicken: 6 to 8 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 4 ribs celery, roughly chopped

2 scallions

Seasoning salt to taste

1) Prepare the chicken: In a large, heavy-bottomed pot, bring 4 cups water to a boil over high heat. Once boiling, add the chicken breasts, celery, scallions, and seasoning salt. Cook until the chicken is cooked through, about 30 minutes. Be careful not to overcook.

To see if the chicken is done, insert a knife in the thickest part of one breast. If it's still pink, continue to cook until you can see the cooked color of the meat all the way through the chicken. 2) Once the chicken is cooked, drain, reserving 1 cup of the broth with some celery and onion to use later for the sauce. Set the chicken aside, and allow the chicken to cool for 20 to 25 minutes. 3) Once the chicken has cooled, cut the chicken into small pieces. Set aside.

For the Cream Sauce: 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter 4 tablespoons all-purpose flour 1 cup milk, whole or 2 percent, or chicken broth from cooked chicken 1-1/2 cups white mushrooms, plus more if desired, cleaned and chopped 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley 1 tablespoon chopped fresh chives

1) Prepare the cream sauce: In a 12-inch skillet, melt the butter over low heat. Once melted, add the flour and stir to combine. Stirring the mixture constantly, add the milk or the reserved chicken broth. After thoroughly mixing, bring this mixture to a boil and cook for 3 to 5 minutes, until thickened. Carefully add the cooked chicken without breaking up the pieces. Add the desired amount of chopped mushrooms, stir gently, and cook over medium heat for about 3 minutes. Remove from the heat and sprinkle with the parsley and

TIP: This may also be served as a casserole. If preparing this as a casserole, pour the chicken and cream mixture into a greased 9- x 13-inch baking dish and sprinkle the top with parsley and breadcrumbs. Bake at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for 20 to 25 minutes, until bubbling.

BASIC ROASTED ASPARAGUS

Kathryne Taylor's online column, Cookie and Kate's

1 large bunch (about 1 pound) fresh asparagus

1 to 2 teaspoons olive oil Salt. to taste

Freshly ground black pepper, to taste Seasonings (use one or all, like I did): Zest and juice of one-half of medium lemon, preferably organic

Lemon wedges, from the remaining 1/2 lemon

Sprinkle of finely grated Parmesan cheese Small handful of fresh mint or pars-

ley, finely chopped Light sprinkle of red pepper flakes Other options: Pat or two of butter Light drizzle of balsamic reduction or thick balsamic vinegar

Toasted sliced almonds 1) Preheat the oven to 425 degrees Fahrenheit and line a large, rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper for easy cleanup. Snap off the woody ends of the asparagus (if you sharply bend the asparagus near the base, it will snap in the right place). Discard the ends. 2) Place the asparagus on the sheet and drizzle with 1 to 2 teaspoons olive oil, just enough to lightly coat the asparagus. Sprinkle salt and pepper over the asparagus; toss until the spears are lightly coated in oil. Arrange the spears in a single layer on the pan. 3) Bake just until the base of the asparagus is easily pierced through by a fork. Very thin asparagus will take as little as 9 to 12 minutes, whereas thicker asparagus will need 15 to 20 minutes. 4) Transfer the roasted asparagus to a serving platter and season however you'd like. You could keep it simple with a squeeze of lemon juice, or a sprinkle of Parmesan, or add a pat of butter or drizzle of balsamic vinegar. 5) Roasted asparagus is best served when it's fresh out of the oven, but it will keep at room temperature for up to 1 hour or up to 4 days in the refrigerator (gently reheat before serving).

LINDA LAURENDEAU'S POTATOES OR VEGETABLE MEDLEY

Recipe from Apopka Historical Society's Preserving the Big Potato – A Collection of Potato Recipes

5 to 6 medium potatoes, skins on, washed and pierced for microwave 2 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil 1 teaspoon seasoning (Everglades is my favorite, but there are many wonderful blends - experiment!)

Microwave the potatoes for 4 to 5 minutes. You want them not quite fork tender. Put olive oil and seasoning into a 1-gallon sealable storage bag and mix. Cut potatoes in chunks and add to the bag. Seal and toss to coat the potatoes. Fry in hot pan or on a griddle, tossing from time to time, until golden and edges are crispy.

VARIATION: When potatoes have crisp edges, add raw, sliced: green peppers, onions, yellow squash, and zucchini coated in a bag with same amount of oil and seasoning. Cook together for a few minutes and serve hot as a vegetable medley.

AMAZING CHOCOLATE CHIP COOKIES

2 cups white whole wheat flour or... regular whole wheat flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 3-3/4 teaspoon baking soda 1/2 teaspoon fine sea salt 1-1/4 cups chocolate chips* 2/3 cup lightly packed coconut sug-

1) In a medium bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Whisk to combine, then add the chocolate chips and toss to coat. 2) In a large bowl, combine the coconut sugar, regular sugar, oil and water. Whisk until the sugar has incorporated into the oil and the mixture is smooth, about 1 to 2 minutes. 3) Add the flour mixture to the sugar mixture, then stir just until combined and no more flour is visible (don't overdo it). 4) Line 2 baking sheets with parchment paper for easy cleanup. Fill an ice cream scoop twothirds with dough (or spoon the mixture into even 2-inch mounds), and place the dough onto one of the prepared sheets. Repeat with remaining dough, leaving several inches of space around each cookie. 5) Freeze the cookies on their pans for 30 minutes, or chill them for up to 24 hours in the refrigerator. 6) When you're ready to bake, preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Bake until the edges are just starting to turn golden, about 14 to 17 minutes. Place the baking sheet on a cooling rack and sprinkle the cookies with flaky salt, if using. Repeat with the remaining cookies.

Notes: Recipe adapted from Ovenly's Secretly Vegan Salted Chocolate Chip Cookies. *Kathryne Taylor likes Ghiradelli's bittersweet 60-percent cacao chocolate chips. Use vegan/dairy free chocolate chips if necessary. **You can taste the coconut or olive oil flavor lightly in these cookies. Use whichever one you prefer. For completely neutralflavored cookies, use a neutral-flavored oil such as avocado oil or safflower oil.

Thompson died on Feb. 13 at the age of 76 due to complications from knee surgery.

"Senator Thompson spent her career committed to public service," the memorandum reads. "She will be remembered for her dedication to improving her community."

Apopka Mayor Bryan Nelson honored Thompson with a proclamation dated Feb. 27 and released on the city of Apopka website on March 5. In the document, Nelson asked all citizens to join him in honoring her memory for her contributions.

The city of Apopka will lower the flag to half-staff in Thompson's memory, Mayor Bryan Nelson confirmed in a March 11 email.

"Senator Thompson was a terrific advocate for our Community and had a true love for service," he wrote in the email.

Thompson had been a legislator for almost 20 years, most recently as a senator representing Senate District

15 for West Orange County, which encompasses Apopka, from November 2022 until her death.

Thompson served three terms in the Florida House of Representatives from 2006 to 2012, followed by the Florida Senate from 2012 to 2016, then the Florida House of Representatives from 2018 until 2022. In 2022, she campaigned for and was elected to Florida Senate District 15.

When Thompson won election in November 2018 for Florida House District 44, she became the first woman Democrat and person of color to serve in that office.

Prior to her venture into politics, Thompson was employed as an Orange County Public Schools educator for six years, then an administrator at Valencia Community College for 24 years.

As a civil rights advocate, Thompson sought to preserve regional African American history. Her achievements include penning the book "Black America: Orlando, Florida" and crusading to protect the Wells'Bulit Hotel, which provided accommodations to many Africans Americans including dignitaries, entertainers and athletes during the segregation era. The hotel is now the Wells'Built Museum of African American History and Culture in Orlando's Parramore district.

Thompson is survived by her husband, the Honorable Emerson R. Thompson, Jr., her three children, and six grandchildren.

"Senator Geraldine Thompson was so much more than a dedicated public servant and visionary leader. She was a devoted wife, mother, grandmother, and greatgrandmother whose love, wisdom, and compassion shaped their lives and the lives of so many in their community and across the state," Thompson's family said in a Feb. 14 state-

It's always a good time to go fishin' with a full moon

Hello Folks,

I sure hope you and your family made it through the tornado this past week. We haven't had one of those in a while — please pray for those that were impacted.

Once the weather settles down, the fishin' should pick back up. The specks

are still bitin' and with the full moon this Friday, it would be a good time to get out and catch some.

Kyle at Bitter's Bait & Tackle reports that folks are still catchin' some specks in Lake Monroe and Lake Jesup. The specks are bitin' real good in the Kissimmee Chain, especially in Lake Kissimmee. Most of the specks are bein' caught on minners and grass-shrimp.

The bass fishin' has been good as well. Lots of bass are bein' caught on shiners in the Headwaters. It's been reported by the guides that folks are catchin' 20 to 30 bass each trip. The bass

fishin' on West Lake Toho is doin' good as well.

MLF held a regional tournament on West Lake this past weekend. Congrats to Christopher Maxwell on his win. Chris brought 5 bass to the scales that weighed 23 pounds 15 ounces. Our own John Kremer from Deland finished in 8th place with 5 bass that weighed in at 17 pounds 9 ounces. There were 122 boats in the tournament, so I'm sure the Kissimmee Chain was a busy place over the weekend.

My buddy Rich Niles fished his club tournament on West Lake Toho on Sunday and it took a little over 14 pounds to win. I guess the BFL guys caught all the bass. Rich reported that a few bass were on the beds on Friday, and then on Sunday, only the males were guarding the beds. Rich reported that he saw bass fry (little ones) around those same beds on Sunday. Bass in Florida will spawn all the way through to May, but some anglers claim they have seen bass on the beds in June.

It all depends on the water temperature. Once the water temperature gets to 70 degrees, much of the spawn is usually over. The peak months of spawnin' in Central Florida are February through April. So, we still have lots of time to catch some big bass in Florida in 2025.

Please make sure you get your picture and release that big female back into the water as soon as possible. You can usually find bass spawnin' in isolated cover like pads, reeds, and laydowns like logs and trees. They also make their beds around cat tails, hydrilla, and Kissimmee grass. They also like to spawn in canals in shallow water.

Dependin' on the size of the bass, a female bass she can lay up to 100,000 eggs. I have also seen females spawn in clear deep water like in the Butler Chain, and the Maitland Chain. My fishin' buddy Rick Mullins and I have looked down in 10 to 12 feet of water, and seen bass on the beds in the chain. This may be the exception to the rule, but I've seen it happen out there during this time of the year.

Well, that's it for this week. I hope to see ya on the water real soon.

"We're going to have multiple personnel groupings," Rolson said. "So our job this spring is to find out who can challenge on the perimeter of the defense? Who can run by somebody and give us a vertical threat? Who's going to block on the perimeter? Who can catch the ball and make people miss in space?"

Rolson talked about the offensive scheme last year and how they were three wide or four wide nearly every down. He said that will remain in the offense, but this year, the offense will feature more tight end and half-back-oriented plays. Rolson even told me that Apopka's famous single wing would be making a comeback so Apopka could run some smash-mouth football.

Rolson's goal is to have players who excel in various scenarios in different packages so he has options on the offensive and defensive ends.

"But in the fall, I mean, hopefully, we'll have a single wing tight end and half back, as well as a pro-style single wing tight end and half back so that the guys don't get tired," Rolson said. "Most of those guys, the tight ends and half-backs, will come from the defensive line."

Rolson went on to say they will also be playing many guys on both sides of the ball to see if they can find any hidden talents. Their goal is to not only develop depth but also find a guy who may be a backup but puts everything he has into practice and is transferred to somewhere

he can help the team more. Whether that's on the offensive or defensive end doesn't matter to Rolson. He wants guys who want to work hard and be Blue Darters. "So what we're really go-

ing to try to do is play a bunch of guys on both sides of the ball in the spring to try and develop some depth and to find that guy that maybe he's a backup linebacker, but he could be a dynamic player or a starter somewhere else, you know," Rolson said.

This year, Rolson emphasizes creating and bringing back the Blue Darter team culture. The overall approach is to create a culture where effort, attitude, and team commitment are more important than individual talent, believing that this approach will ultimately lead to better team performance. Apopka has had a lot of player personnel turnover, as many kids have decided to play elsewhere. This does not bother Rolson at all.

"I would rather have a guy who's bought in and is going to give you all he's got, and he's going to be coachable — than a guy that maybe has a little more talent but is going to do it his own way and at the speed he wants to do it," Rolson said. "So when people leave, that does not concern me at all. We won a lot of games at Apopka with personnel that might not

match up. It's not an issue. I don't know, we may be better for it. I'm just going to say that right now."

Rolson said that restoring that culture shouldn't be too hard because many Apopka kids are just made that way. His focus is on finding guys who are willing to work hard to earn a starting spot, want to be Blue Darters, and are ready for a challenging year.

"I think the reality is, as you trim your roster down a little bit, you find the guys that want it and are bought in," Rolson said. "We had kids that could have competed for playing time or a starting spot, but they left. And we lost a couple here, a couple there, good. If that's what they want to do, that's what they want to do. But we just want dudes that want to be here. We want being here to mean something to you; we want you to be willing to compete, buy in and accept the challenge of what we're offering. And you know, if it's easy, anybody would do it. So, we're not that."

Rolson told me that the fall 2025 season schedule is done and ready to be released. They are just waiting to see if West Port will stay in our district. If West Port leaves, the county will have to replace that game with a new opponent. The spring football game against Jones High School will be at Jones on Wednesday, April 23, so mark your calendars to get an early look at the new Apopka football team.

The leading Blue Darter batters were Jaggers, Peyton


