Council appoints deputy police chief

Lovetta Quinn-Henry to become chief upon McKinley retirement

The Apopka City Council voted unanimously Wednesday to appoint Lovetta Quinn-Henry as the city's new deputy police chief, with the expectation that she will succeed retiring Chief Michael McKinley later this year.

Quinn-Henry, whose expected start date is May 1, will earn an initial base salary of \$178,000 per

Quinn-Henry has served 25

years with the Orlando Police Department and is its current deputy police chief. As team commander for the

critical incident stress management team, Quinn-Henry helmed leadership during noted crises such as citywide protests and the Pulse Nightclub shooting.

Among her achievements in ed-

ucation, Quinn-Henry holds a bachelor's in criminal justice, a master's degree in public administration and a doctor of philosophy degree.

"If approved [as deputy chief], I will have the opportunity to work closely with Dr. Quinn-Henry over the next several months as she transitions into her new role," McKinley said at the meeting. "This period will allow her to familiarize herself with the agency, its operations and dedicated personnel within the

Chamber recognizes Eileen Ricketson, women in leadership

Annual event marks Women's History Month

The Apopka Area Chamber of Commerce celebrated March as Women's History Month with its annual Women in Leadership luncheon on Wednesday, March 19, at Highland Manor in Apopka.

At the event, the Chamber honored Eileen Ricketson with the Lifetime Achievement Award for her 45 years of active community service, including at The Apopka Chief. Laura Halfpenny, senior director of soccer growth for the U.S. Soccer Federation, delivered the keynote address. Halfpenny's message to the nearly 100 attendees in the room was to contemplate their own leadership values and implement steps to grow their leadership capacity.

Honoring Eileen Ricketson

After accepting the Lifetime Achievement Award, Eileen Ricketson had asked Jamey Ricketson, her youngest of three sons, to read an acceptance remark on her behalf: "Mom wants to thank everyone of you," Jamey Ricketson said. "She wrote this because none of us are going to be able to speak it, so I'll try to make it for you."

He followed with Eileen thanking the audience and acknowledging God's blessings for her family and continued community work in the past, present and future: "My prayer is that you are able to continue making this community be all that God would have it be."

Originally from Maryland, Eileen Ricketson married late Apopka Chief publisher John Ricketson on March 20, 1964, on a military base. After their eventual relocation to Florida, they became parents to three sons, all born in Gainesville: twins Jerry and Joey in 1969, and Jamey in 1971.

John and Eileen acquired The Apopka Chief and The Planter newspapers in late 1979 and became their publisher in 1982. Over the years, Eileen Ricketson took on such

Form of government again focus of charter amendment talks

Scheduled city elections, term limits also on workshop agenda

The Wednesday, March 19, charter amendment workshop ended with an agreement to aim for next month for the City Council's first and second readings of the proposed amendments to meet the deadline from the Orange County Supervisor of Elec-

The workshop, which started one hour before the regularly scheduled City Council meeting, didn't result in any action.

On the workshop's agenda for discussion were the following topics: changing the date for city elections, establishing term limits for all elected positions—including the mayor—of no more than three consecutive terms at a time,

Construction begins on all-inclusive playground

Playground will provide environment for children of all abilities

Construction has kicked off this month on the Northwest Recreation Complex's all-inclusive playground, designed to enhance more inclusive play for children of all abilities.

The city broke ground in January on the all-inclusive playground, which will feature new play structures, Go-Rounds, ZipKrooz, a sensory garden, accessible pathways and more. New parking areas and a new exit roadway to Jason Dwelley Parkway will also be part of the construction project.

Project money comes from the city's recreation impact fees, as well as a combined \$110,000 donation from Unlimited Capabilities and one of its funding partners, the Douglas G Halliday Foundation.

In a Thursday, March 13, email between city staff, city park manager Christopher Richter said playground construction began the first week of March.

"Over the next couple of weeks the crews will continue to build the structures as well as work on installing the sidewalks and curbing," Richter wrote in the email. "We should start to see the



true footprint of the project become more clearly defined and the identity of the new park start to emerge."

In a March 14 email response, city parks and recreation director Radley Williams said he'd like to start dispatching bi-weekly project updates to the mayor, commissioners and relative project partners.

In addition to the allinclusive playground, other projects include phase one of the Community Redevelopment Agency Downtown Trail and the Northwest Recreation Complex relief driveway, Williams wrote.

"I think this will help keep the excitement active for these projects and keep you Mayor, the Commis-

sioners, and the project partners up-to-date so that they have information to provide constituents should they be asked about our many ongoing projects," Williams wrote.

REP Services, Inc. and Landscape Structures are designing and constructing the playground. According to a past city of Apopka news release, Unlimited Capabilities' mission lines up with the playground because this facility will introduce a new play space for all in the community to enjoy.

Prior to construction of the all-inclusive playground, the city closed the previous park last November to make way for the new facility.

Committee hears input on Orange County redistricting

Voters approved commission expansion last November

The 2025 Mid-Decennial Redistricting Advisory Committee met last week for the second time since its formation. Its members discussed the redistricting process that will increase the number of Orange County Districts from six to eight.

The advisory committee meeting occurred on Wednesday, March 12, at the Orange **County Administration Center** in Orlando, following an initial meeting on March 6.

In November 2024, Or-



ange County voters passed a charter amendment to increase the number of commission districts from six to eight. In January, the Orange County Board of County Commissioners created the 2025 Mid-Decennial Redistricting Advisory Committee to help with the redistricting process.

Tasked with recommendations for increasing the number of Orange County Commission Districts from six to eight, the advisory committee's responsibilities are as follows: to conduct pub-

lic meetings for residents' input, evaluate census data, suggest boundaries for the two new commission districts and modifications to existing districts, and give an initial recommendation to the Board of County Commissioners for evaluation in September.

The committee discussed the mapping process, the use of census data, and how redistricting could affect voter turnout, costs, and the Orange County Supervisor of Elections Office. The committee was introduced to the mapping software Dave's Redistricting, which can create redistricting maps for all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

Residents during public comment brought up the importance of correct census data and fair representation. Cynthia Harris of Orlando stressed the importance of thinking about District 6's transient populations and how that reflects the district's population.

"We have the jail, and with the jail being counted, because in the census, you're counting people and not voters, you're actually double dipping, because those people are not all from District 6 to be in the jail," Harris said. "Once they leave the jail, they're going back to their prospective communities based on whatever happens with the outcome of their cases, or they're going to the reception center or permanent prison and then they're being counted there."

She recommended the committee consider the American Community Survey that the U.S. Census Bureau offers on a more frequent basis as opposed to the U.S. Census' 10-year recurrence, to gather more accurate data in the redistricting process.

Per a resolution, the Orange County Supervisor of Elections must assign a staff to the committee when developing redistricting recommendations, Dan Helm, director of special projects with the Orange County Supervisor of Elections Office, said. After the committee makes final recommendations this September and the board approves it, the Supervisor of Elections Office can start its work.

Helm gave the advisory committee recommendations for the redistricting process, including to look at census blocks, the smallest geographic unit the U.S. State Census Bureau uses, when gathering data. He also recommended not dividing congressional districts or precincts because the Supervisor of Elections Office has requirements on how to report to the state and give information to voters.

The first public county district meeting is scheduled 6–9 p. m. on Thursday, March 27, at the Orange County Multicultural Center in District 6, 7149 W. Colonial Drive, Orlando.

The District 2 meeting will take place 6-9 p. m. on Wednesday, April 2, at the John Bridges Community Center, 445 W. 13th St., Apopka.

changing the form of government from strong mayor to council-manager, employment contracts, and authority of city clerk in election qualifying.

Currently, the city has the strong mayor-form of government, in which the mayor acts as the chief executive in the city's day-to-day operations. The city is considering a change to the council-manager form, in which an elected council creates the policies, and the employed city manager enacts policies and manages daily operations.

"It's not to change the

charter, per se, as if it's to send the questions about possibly changing the charter to the voters," city attorney Cliff Shepard said in a Tuesday, March 18, interview with The Apopka Chief. "I've drafted an ordinance that has a number of questions - I can't remember how many – and they [the City Council] can say at that time, 'Well, we decided we don't really want to put this one out there, but we want to put these other ones out there,' or whatever."

That would unfold on the first reading, Shepard said.

"On second reading, it should be everything is finalized as to what they want to send to the voters," he said. "And then they vote on it. They approve it. Then it goes to the voters at whatever the next election is."

The charter review process is not set by law but can be influenced by the passage of time and changing societal norms, Shepard said.

The workshop also touched on the possibility of changing the governing body's name from "council" to "commission" for language consistency, since both words are used in the charter. Shepard said there is no difference between a council or commission.

"I asked them, 'Do you want to be a council? Do you want to be a commission?' Because in the charter, it reads both ways, and it needs to pick one and stick with it," Shepa-

Shepard noted that the city's last charter review was likely before his time as the city attorney. He suggested that a charter review might be necessary every five to seven





Authentic taste: Susie Bulloch's Texas Style Smoked Brisket

From the website Heygrillhey.com, we found a recipe that, according to its founder and BBQ boss lady Susie Bulloch, this Texas Style Smoked Brisket will give you that authen-



tic Texas taste, right in your own backyard! Susie founded Hey Grill Hey in 2015 with the desire to help people make better BBQ. When she's not grilling, she is hanging out with Todd and their three kids, preferably outdoors!

From Charleston Receipts, James Island Shrimp Pie is a shrimp and rice casserole contributed by Mrs. John Jenkins. You need two pounds of shrimp and a cup of raw rice, both of which you cook before making the pie. It is then baked in a moderate oven (350 to 375 degrees) for about 30 minutes or until brown on top.

If you like a salad extravaganza, try this Wilted Spinach Delight! It's from Panama City's Canary Cottage, in Joyce LaFray Young's book, Country Cookin', and it looks teriffic!

Florida Orange Meringue Pie is a recipe that Byron McCoy shared with Pot-Pourri of Zellwood, the book that was later shared with us by Claire Ellington. You will notice and possibly wonder about the direction, "Add a little hot mixture to beaten egg yolks." This is meant to "temper" the eggs; to gradually moderate the temperature so they don't actually cook when exposed to a large amount of extremely hot mixture.

Bonnie Milliken shares her Pizza Dough recipe with us through Northside Baptist Church's book of recipes. This is another basic instruction you can use to exercise your "exploratory" gene to have some fun in the kitchen, especially with the kids.

Texas Style Smoked Brisket From HeyGrillHey.com / Susie Bulloch Ingredients:

1 each 12-14 pound whole packer brisket

2 tablespoons coarse Kosher salt

2 tablespoons coarse black pepper 2 tablespoons garlic powder (optional)

Instructions:

1) Store your brisket in the refrigerator 2 eggs until you are ready to start trimming. Cold briskets are much easier to work with. Flip your brisket over so the point end is underneath. Remove any silver skin or excess fat from the flat muscle. Trim down the large crescent moon shaped fat section until it is a smooth transition between the point and the flat. Trim any excessive or loose meat and fat from the point. Square the edges and ends of the flat. Flip the brisket over and trim the top fat cap to about 1/4 of an inch thickness across the surface of the brisket. 2) In a mixing bowl or empty spice container, mix the salt, pepper, and garlic. Shake over the brisket to evenly distribute the spices on all sides. 3) Preheat your smoker to 225 degrees F using indirect heat and hardwood smoke. Place the brisket on the smoker with the point end facing your main heat source. This is a thicker part of the brisket and it can handle the additional heat. Close the lid and smoke until and internal thermometer reads 165 degrees F (usually takes around 8 hours). 4) On a large work surface, roll out a big piece of butcher paper (or foil) and center your brisket in the middle. Wrap the brisket by folding edge over edge, creating a leak proof seal all the way around. Return the wrapped brisket to the smoker, seam side down so the weight from the brisket crimps the edges of the paper wrap down tight. 5) Close the lid on the smoker and, maintaining 225 degrees F, continue cooking until the internal temperature of the brisket reaches 202 degrees F in the thickest part of the meat (takes anywhere from 5-8 hours). 6) Remove the brisket to a large cutting board and allow to rest for 1 hour before slicing. Slice both the point and the flat against the grain with a sharp knife and serve immediately.

MRS. JOHN T. JENKINS' (HESS LEBBY) **JAMES ISLAND SHRIMP PIE**

Recipe from Charleston Receipts, America's Oldest Junior League Cookbook in Print, a Cookbook by The Junior League of Charleston, Inc.

1 cup of raw rice 2 cups water 1 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup butter

Pinch of mace 5 tablespoons tomato catsup 2-1/2 tablespoons Worcestershire Salt and pepper to taste 2 pounds shrimp

1 cup milk (approximately)

Cook rice in salted water until very soft and stir butter into it. Combine all ingredients with cooked shrimp, adding enough milk to make mixture the consistency of thick custard. Put in buttered casserole and bake in moderate oven until brown on top (about 30 minutes). Serves 8.

WILTED SPINACH DELIGHT FROM **CANARY COTTAGE IN PANAMA CITY**

Recipe from

Country Cookin' by Joyce LaFray Young 1/2 pound bacon

1/2-3/4 cups sugar (or sugar substitute) 2 tablespoons dry mustard

1 cup vinegar 1/4 cup water

1 pound fresh spinach (washed, cleaned, torn into bite-size pieces)

3 tomatoes (cut into wedges)

12 fresh mushrooms (sliced)

1/2 cup scallions (sliced) 2 hard boiled eggs (chopped fine) 1/2 cup sharp cheddar cheese

1) Place bacon in frying pan and fry until crisp. Remove bacon and allow to cool. Crumble. Set aside. 2) Add sugar, dry mustard, and vinegar to bacon drippings. Stir to blend. Add water. Stir. Bring to boil. Simmer 5 minutes while arranging salads. 3) Place spinach on salad plates. Arrange the other ingredients on top, including the crumbled bacon. 4) Spoon the hot sauce over and serve immediately.

Variation: Use yellow squash that has been sliced thin. Serves 4-6. Cooking: 10 minutes.

BONNIE MILLIKEN'S PIZZA DOUGH

Recipe from

Northside Baptist Church's cookbook

1 cup warm water

1 package yeast

1 tablespoon sugar 1 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons oil

2 cups flour, and additional 1-1/2 cups flour, approximately

Sprinkle yeast into warm (not hot) water until dissolved. Add sugar, salt, and oil.

Add 2 cups flour, a little (1/2 cup) at a time. It will be a very stiff dough. Turn out onto floured flat surface and knead in the remaining 1-1/2 cups flour until dough is smooth and elastic.

Place dough in greased bowl. Brush or pat top with oil. Cover and let rise in warm place (85 degrees). In the rising process, keep in a place that is free from drafts until dough is double in bulk. It will take about 45 minutes (30 minutes or less if you use the Rapid Rise Yeast). Punch down the dough and divide in half. Knead slightly and press each ball of dough into pizza pan.

Top with 'whatever,' i.e.; 1 cup tomato or pizza sauce, 1/2 pound mozzarella cheese, cooked Italian sausage, cooked hamburger, slivers of onion, green pepper, olives, pepperoni, etc.

Bake at 400 degrees about 20 to 25 minutes in preheated oven.

Dough can be refrigerated or frozen before rising. Defrost or let dough come to room temperature before first step in rising. It can be refrigerated or frozen after adding the toppings or after slightly baking (10 to 15 minutes).

BYRON MCCOY'S FLORIDA ORANGE MERINGUE PIE

Recipe from Pot-Pourri of Zellwood 1 cup orange juice

1 cup orange sections, cut into pieces 2 tablespoons grated orange rind

1 cup sugar

5 tablespoons cornstarch

3 egg yolks, beaten

2 tablespoons lemon juice

2 tablespoons butter or margarine Meringue from the egg whites

Combine orange juice, sections, grated rind, sugar and cornstarch. Cook on low heat until clear. Add a little hot mixture to beaten egg yolks. Cook about 5 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Blend in lemon juice, butter or margarine. Pour into BAKED pie shell. (Be sure filling and shell are both hot or both cold.) Cover filling with meringue. Bake in 350-degree oven until lightly browned.

She visited 49 states in the U.S., with only Wisconsin left to check off her travel bucket list before her passing. Athletics were another defining part of Elaine's life. A former professional swimmer and performance diver during her college years, she continued to pursue physical challenges throughout her life. She was also an occasional golfer in her 30s and 40s. She even completed the annual 350-mile bicycle ride across Georgia. Thanks to her father, a talented contractor, Elaine developed many practical skills, becoming a skilled amateur carpenter, plumber, electrician, and auto mechanic.

Elaine's family was her heart. She is survived by her loving husband, Dr. Robert O'Neal, PhD; her daughter, Dawn Parish; her son-in-law, Chris Parrish (USN, RET); and her grandchildren, William Joel Parrish (Nuclear Mechanic) and Lt. Chelsie Parrish (NOAA) - a pilot, diver, and marine researcher who plays with the Florida Avengers, a franchise of the Women's National Football Conference. She is also survived by her Sister-in-Law Clare Durante, her nephew, COL Bob E. Parsons, USA, RET, and his wife, Rebecca Parsons. A memorial service with limited attendance will be held at a later date. In lieu of flowers, the family requests that donations be made in Elaine's honor to the Wounded Warrior Project or Tunnels to Towers, two causes she held close to her heart due to her admiration for the military and first responders. Elaine's life was one of service, passion, and adventure, and she will be remembered for her boundless energy, her fierce love for learning, and her commitment to her family and community.



Novak brothers lead nation for Apopka boys water polo team

Travis Novak is No. 1-ranked goalie in the nation

The Apopka boys water polo team is in a good place at 6–8 on the season, including 2–1 in district, and ranked 39th in Florida and 50th in the nation, according to MaxPreps. The Blue Darters have won two of their last six games and are on a three-

game win streak.

The team has scored 169 goals and allowed 173 for a negative three-point scoring differential. Apopka averages 12.1 goals, 9.07 assists, and 9.93 steals a game. The Blue Darters are averaging 23 shots per game with a 52.5 shooting percentage with five game-winning goals. Apopka collected 77 ejections and drew 65.

Apopka's boys water polo team has some of the best players in the country, starting with goalkeeper Travis Novak. He is ranked No. 1 in the nation — yes, the nation — in saves. Novak has made 178 saves in 14 games, an average of 12.71 saves per game.

Novak is also 10th in the nation for assists, with 36 on the season for an average of 2.57 assists per game.

Another notable player who has had a great season is Novak's brother, Steven Novak. Steven is ranked 23rd in the nation and the state in

Final building, site inspections scheduled

It has been two weeks since the school district's acting chief facilities officer for the Apopka High School baseball and softball complex projects, told parents of the Apopka baseball and softball families that their fields could be operational and safe for occupancy by Thursday, March 13. Neither complex was ready for occupancy at that time, but the district hopes to wrap up the process

this week

Rory Salimbene, the acting chief facilities officer for Orange County Public Schools, said Tuesday that he and the district believe the complexes will be ready for occupancy by the end of spring break, although he added a caveat.

"That's barring some unforeseen things occurring as we continue to finish the inspection process," Salimbene said. "I can't tell people that it's going to happen, but I'm optimistic that it will."

Salimbene said he and OCPS have been working every day to ensure the projects get done and the complexes are safe to occupy. He said he has been commu-

nicating daily with Apopka High School's principal, Lyle Heinz, to update him on construction and final inspec-

One of the more significant questions parents asked Salimbene in an early March meeting was if he had been down to the field to see the project with his own eyes. He had answered no. When I asked him this week if he had been down to the complex since that meeting, his answer was the same.

"I personally have not," Salimbene said. "This is a relatively small project among all the things that we have going on. My facilities exec-

Delgado dominates for Wekiva softball

Star sophomore aspires to play for Rollins College

Wekiva softball's Camilla Delgado is destroying the ball at the plate this season, giving new meaning to the saying of swinging a redhot bat. The Wekiva Softball team is 1–6, 1–0 in district, but Delgado bats like she is ready to play at the next level today.

According to MaxPreps, Delgado, who is only a sophomore, is ranked eighth in the state in batting average, second in slugging percentage, and 15th in on-base percentage. She also leads her team in nearly every offensive stat, including batting average, on-base percentage, hits, runs, RBIs, home runs, stolen bases, slugging percentage, triples and fielding percentage.

Delgado has a .800 batting average in seven games this season and an on-base percentage of .842, collecting 12 hits in 15 at-bats. With those 12 hits, she has collected 13 runs, 12 RBIs, two doubles, two triples, and four home runs. Three of her four home runs have come in her last two games, with all three being inside-the-park home runs that showcased her power at the plate, her ability to place the ball in the outfield, and her speed around the bases.

Delgado has a slugging percentage of a whopping 2.000, so she is averaging a double for every at-bat. She has also drawn the secondmost walks on the team with four, showing her ability to recognize pitches at the plate and not just swing. Delgado has not struck out so far this season.

Delgado is not just a menace at the plate, though, as she excels in every part of the game. Delgado is putting on a clinic on the bases, accounting for eight of her team's 21 stolen bases in seven games. She has been perfect in the field with a 1.000 fielding percentage, collect-

Be careful with the high winds while fishin' on the water

Hello Folks,

As the ol' sayin goes, March winds bring April showers! We aren't into April yet but we are definitely gettin' our share of March winds. Everyone I talk to says they are havin' a hard time gettin' outta the wind to fish.

My buddy was fishin' Taylor Creek and he reports that, even with his power

poles down, he was draggin' right along in the wind. The speck fishermen were havin' a hard time on Lake Monroe and Lake Jesup. I went across Lake Jesup on Monday, and it was white cappin' and the water was all muddy. To make matters worse we are havin' another cold front at the end of this week. I'm not tryin' to discourage you from goin' fishin'; you just need to be careful while you are on the water.

Folks are still catchin' some specks in the Kissimmee River... if you can get outta the wind, that is. Most of the specks are bein' caught around the pads. A few shellcrackers are startin' to show

up in the pads as well. Red worms, crickets, and grassshrimp work best for the shellcrackers. The bass fishin' has been hit or miss due to all the wind we've been get-

Folks are fishin' the Maitland Chain and the Butler Chain for bass, because you can get behind the islands and shorelines outta the wind. Most of the bass are bein' caught on shiners and artificial baits. You will do best throwin' a chatter-bait, swimjigs, or a plastic worm.

Some folks are free-linin a shiner behind the boat over the submerged hydrilla and eel-grass beds. And don't you forget to look for the schoolers feedin' on bait-fish. Be sure to have a lipless crankbait tied on to one of your rods so all you have to do is pick up the rod and cast to 'em before they stop feedin'.

I'm still gettin' some good reports about the bass fishin' down at the Headwaters. Of course, most of those bass are bein' caught on shiners durin' this time of the year. The guides are reportin' 20 to 30 bass bein' caught on each trip.

I would like to give a shout-out to our own Bobby Bakewell from Orlando. Bobby qualified for The Bass Master Classic bein' held over the weekend.

The Classic will be held

from March 21st til' March 23rd. Bobby qualified by winnin' the St. Croix Bassmaster Open at Lake Martin.

The Classic is bein' held startin' Friday, March 21 goin' through the 23rd, at Lake Ray Roberts, Ft. Worth, Texas. Here's hopin' for a great showin' by Bobby. We really wish him the best durin' the tournament.

Also, a shout-out and good luck to John Cox of Debary who will be fishin' the Classic, as well.

If you are plannin' on goin' to the Classic, there will be an Outdoor Expo presented by GSM Outdoors with over 200 exhibitors. There are 18 first time qualifiers for the Classic, includin' our own Bobby Bakewell. Each angler will bring to the scales five bass each day, that measure 14 inches long, at the weighin. After the first two days of competition, the top 25 anglers will move on to Championship Sunday. The angler with the most weight after three days of fishin' will be awarded \$300,000.00 for the win, and will be crowned the Classic Champion.

Logan Page, Camron Pennock and Jaggers have been dominating on the mound for Apopka this sea-



The girls sit atop the 7A District 3 stands, above Lake Brantley, Ocoee, Seminole, and Lake Mary. According to MaxPreps, as of Monday, March 17, Apopka is ranked 76th in the state.

Last week, head coach Mike MacWithey told me this might be the best team he's had since he started as a coach at Apopka in 1983. He pointed to the Blue Darter's performance at the plate and said they have never had this many home runs (11) this early in the season.

Taylor Smith, Ava Gon-

zalez, Shylah Pino and Riley Ford are leading the Blue Darters at the plate. Smith boasts a .679 batting average and a .722 on-base percentage, with 21 runs, 21 RBIs, one double, two triples, four home runs, and 19 hits in 28 at-bats.

Gonzalez has a .522 batting average and a .556 onbase percentage, recording 11 runs, 15 RBIs, two doubles, two home runs, and 12 hits in 23 at-bats. Pino has a .367 batting average and a .457 on-base percentage, tallying 18 runs, six RBIs, one double, and 11 hits in 30 at-bats. Ford maintains a .667 batting average and a .667 on-base percentage, with six runs, 11 RBIs, two doubles, one triple, two home runs, and 10 hits in 15 at-bats.

Sydney Bartkin, Alicia Lopez and Reese Kernz have also been run-producers for the loaded Apopka lineup, combining for 22 RBIs, 30 runs, seven doubles, two

home runs and 29 hits.

Apopka has also stolen 55 bases for an average of 6.11 stolen bases a game.

Ava Millspaugh and Bartkin have been phenomenal on the mound for the Blue Darters. Millspaugh is the team's ace pitcher and has proven it this season. Millspaugh has appeared nine times for Apopka, accumulating one win, 38 strikeouts and 11 walks. She has allowed 18 runs (11 earned) and 23 hits, leading to an ERA of 2.51 over 302/3 innings. Bartkin has appeared five times for the Blue Darters, recording one win, nine strikeouts and four walks. She has given up six runs (five earned) and 10 hits, posting an ERA of 2.63 over 13 1/3 innings.

This season, Apopka has a .938 fielding percentage with 135 putouts on 210 total chances. The Blue Darters have accumulated 62 assists, three double plays, and 13 errors in nine games.

Catching up with Apopka spring sports

Big week for Apopka sports looms after spring break

This week, our Apopka High School athletes are enjoying a much-needed breather for spring break. This provides a perfect opportunity to examine the performance of the rest of Blue Darter spring sports programs so far this season.

Boys volleyball

The Blue Darter boys volleyball team rebounded from a three-game losing streak last Thursday, March 13, securing a 3-1 victory against Forest Lake Academy (FLA). As of Monday, March 17, the team holds a record of 3-3 for the season, ranking 57th in the state and 563rd nationally, according to MaxPreps.

The boys are just over a third of the way through the season and need some wins as soon as possible to keep the expectations of a deep playoff run alive. When the Blue Darters are winning, they dominate, with their three victories being 3-0 (FLA), 3-0 (Wekiva), and 3-1 (FLA). However, when they lose, it's also in lopsided fashion, with their losses being 3-0 (Lake How-

(Timber Creek).

The team sits fourth in 3A District 4 below Windermere, West Orange, and Ocoee in that order and above Evans. Apopka has not posted any stats for the season as of Monday, March 17.

When they return from spring break, the Blue Darters will play two games. The first is at West Orange on Tuesday, March 25, starting at 6:30 p. m., and the second is at Windermere on Thursday, March 27, beginning at 6:30 p.m.

Boys lacrosse

The Apopka boys lacrosse team has been on a great run recently, going 5-1 in their last six games. The team is 6-3 and 2-2 in district matchups, sitting fifth in the 2A District 5 standings under West Orange, Olympia, Lake Minneola, and Windermere and above East Ridge, Ocoee, and

ell), 3–0 (Horizon), and 3–1 South Lake. The Blue Darters are ranked 124th in the state and 380th in the nation, according to MaxPreps as of Monday, March 17.

> The boys have scored 63 goals and allowed 61, a twopoint positive scoring differential for the season. Cooper Johnson and Colt Hoyt lead the team in goals. Johnson and Hoyt combine for 35 of the team's 66 goals, or 53.03 percent. Brennan Walsh and Hoyt lead the team in assists, with both accounting for four apiece, making up half of the team's 16 assists.

Johnson (12), Marshall Rutledge (9), and Walsh (8) led the team in ground balls, combining for 29 of the team's 77 ground balls. At the midfield line, Apopka dominates with three faceoff specialists combining for 83 face-off wins. Hoyt leads the team with 60 face-off wins, followed by Jayden Burton with 12 and

Hayden Pugh with 11.

Apopka's goalkeepers have been doing phenomenal this season, with a combined save percentage of 59.3 percent. Parker Aho is leading the team in the cage, allowing just 15 goals with 32 shots on goal in 144 minutes. Following closely behind is Nya Makonnen, who has allowed 28 goals on 71 shots on goal in 143 minutes in the cage.

When the team returns from spring break, it will have just four games left in the regular season. That week, Apopka will play two games: the first is at home against Lyman High School on Tuesday, March 25, at 6 p. m., and the second is at Olympia on Thursday, March 27, at 5:30 p.m.

Girls lacrosse

The girls lacrosse team is having a tough season after falling to 3–8, including 1–1 in district matchups. Apopka is

on a six-game losing streak and has not won a game since Feb. 21 against Boone. The Blue Darters have scored 73 goals and allowed 109 for a negative 36 scoring differential.

According to MaxPreps, as of Monday, March 17, the team is third in 2A District 6, 124th in the state, and 380th in the nation. The team has not entered any stats for the 2025 season.

The girls have just four more games until the end of the regular season, with three taking place the week they return from spring break.

Girls water polo

The girls water polo team is 3-10 on the season and 1-2in district matchups. According to MaxPreps, as of Monday, March 17, the Blue Darters are ranked 60th in the nation and 47th in the state. They are currently on a six-game losing streak — although one member of the team is ranked in the top 10 nationally.

Apopka's goalkeeper on the girl's water polo team, like the boys team, is making waves at the national level. Apopka's Katherine Berens, the Blue Darters goalkeeper, is ranked 10th in the nation and Florida in saves with 114 for an average of 9.5 saves a game.

Other Blue Darters having a great season include Alexis McReynolds, Taylor Sellers and Brooke Bemiss. McReynolds leads the team with 28 goals for an average of 2.3 goals a game while leading the team in assists with 13. McReynolds also has 35 steals, 41 points, 18 drawn ejections and a 38.9 shooting percentage. Sellers has 14 goals, nine assists, 17 steals, 23 points, four drawn ejections and a 32.6 shooting percentage. Bemiss has 12 goals, nine assists, six steals, 21 points, 10 drawn ejections and a 44.4 shooting percentage.

When the girls return from spring break, they will have two games during the week and three at a tournament that weekend. First, they will host Colonial at Lake Brantley on Tuesday, March 25, for a match set to start at 7:30 p. m. They will then travel to Lyman High School for a game on Friday, March 28, and Saturday, March 29, for three tournament matchups against Gainesville, Wekiva and Venice.

ing 14 putouts on 25 total chances.

Delgado is the keystone of the Mustang defense, as her perfect fielding makes up for the team's .735 fielding percentage this season. She has also collected 11 assists and one double play in the field.

In her last two games, against Cypress Creek and Freedom High School, Delgado went 5-for-6 at the plate and racked up five runs, five RBIs, two doubles and three home runs. She accounted for 10 of her team's 12 runs in the two games.

Delgado is quick to say she's a team player first and sees her success as part of the team's overall success. She considers the most significant moments for her this season to be when her team is trying to get the energy up to rally.

"We try our best to communicate with each other, to keep everything going, no matter if the game is going up or down, we try to get the energy going in the dugout," Delgado said. "We are always cheering

on our teammates. I feel like, as a team, we lift each other with lots of positivity."

Delgado says the team's energy is a huge catalyst in how they rally when they are down. She says there are moments when the Mustangs' energy and positivity can reach the other team. Delgado told me that when that happens, the other team starts making errors, which can create a flow that leads to a rally.

Delgado told me that she attributes her amazing play

this season to all the training she does when she's not on the field. In the off-season, she filled her time with watching film of her at-bats, learning how to improve her technique. Delgado told me it's also about confidence and her mental strength, which she has been working on immensely since her freshman season last year.

"While I work on lots of physical stuff, softball is 90 percent mental," Delgado said. "I really want to work on my confidence staying up because I know that going into a slump can really put down my confidence. I want to keep lots of positivity. I think that's really what affected my games this season. To be quite honest, I try to keep everything positive and keep everything going up."

Delgado told me that her main goal right now is to keep her GPA up and focus on her academics. She knows that is as important as her play on the field if she wants to play at the next level. Her dream is to play for Rollins College, so she will need to be a two-way star on the field and in the classroom.

Delgado said the most significant challenge she has faced in her softball career has been learning new positions. When she joined the team, she had to find a spot on the field where she helped the team best, which meant moving around a lot. She said she has played everywhere on the field for Wekiva in the past two seasons and that it has been a challenge but a welcome one, as she knows it only improves her game.



Checking in with Wekiva spring sports

baseball accounts for three of their five wins this season in last six games

This week brought spring break for all Orange County schools, so it's time to check in on Wekiva High School spring sports, including baseball, softball and volleyball.

Baseball

The Wekiva baseball team hit the break with a 5–11 record, although 1-0 in district play and heating up of late. The Mustangs are ranked 577th in the state of Florida, according to MaxPreps.

Wekiva has scored 102 runs and allowed 176 for a negative 74-run scoring differential. The team sits second in 6A District 5, below Lake Minneola and above Evans and South Lake.

The team has turned a corner in the past two weeks, accounting for three of their five wins this season in the past six games. In their last six games, Wekiva has lost to Lake Buena Vista (10-0), Mainland High School (24-2) and Gateway High School (17–4). They have beaten Jones (23–1), Evans (7–6) and Oak Ridge (10-6).

Leading the Mustangs at the plate this season are Brady Reinert, Jaden Graham and Emil Flaquer.

Reinert has a .405 batting average and a .569 on-base percentage while collecting 15 hits, 18 runs, seven RBIs and one double over 37 at-bats in 16 games. Graham has a batting average of .368 and an

Two Mustangs stand out with their fielding: Cody Bowen, who plays infield and outfield, and Reinert, who plays infield and catcher. Bowen has a .956 fielding percentage with 82 putouts in 90 total chances, while collecting four assists and four errors. Reinert has an .837 fielding percentage with 39 putouts in 49 chances while collecting two assists, one double play and eight errors.

The week the Mustangs return from spring break, they will have three games. The first is at Mount Dora on Monday, March 24, set to start at 6 p. m. Wekiva will then host Evans on March 27 and visit cross-town rival Apopka — if

Softball

The Wekiva softball team is 1–6 this season, but also 1–0 in district play. The Mustangs are ranked 459th in the state, according to MaxPreps this week.

Wekiva has scored 39 runs and allowed 99 for a negative-60 run differential. The team sits fifth in 6A District 9, below Edgewater, East Ridge, Osceola, and Poinciana but above East River.

The team's only win this season was a dominant 19-0 win over Edgewater on Feb. 20. Since then, the team has been on a five-game losing streak.

Leading the Mustangs at the plate this season are Camilla Delgado, Janelle Rodriquez and Arianna Garcia. Delgado has been a one-woman wrecking crew on offense

(see feature story on 1B) and leads the team in a range of hitting statistics.

Rodriguez has also raked at the plate in limiting playing time, posting a .667 batting average and a .714 on-base percentage while collecting four hits, four runs, two RBIs and a home run in six at-bats over four games. Garcia has a .571 batting average and a .667 onbase percentage while collecting eight hits, two runs, eight RBIs and three doubles in 14 at-bats across seven games.

Garcia and Delgado have been on the mound for the Mustangs this season, with Garcia being the go-to. Garcia has appeared on the mound seven times for the Mustangs and has accumulated 26 strikeouts and 20 walks. She has allowed 86 runs (53 earned) and 69 hits, leading to an ERA of 16.37 over 22.2 innings. Delgado has appeared twice on the mound for Wekiva and

has accumulated three strikeouts and 10 walks. She has allowed 12 runs (11 earned) and one hit, leading to an ERA of 25.67 over three innings. Garcia and Delgado are the only pitchers for Wekiva.

On the bases, Wekiva is doing a pretty good job, tallying 21 stolen bases in seven games. In the field, they are struggling with a .735 fielding percentage and 35 errors. The Mustangs have collected 77 putouts on 132 chances, 20 assists, 35 errors and two double

Following spring break, the team will host Lake Buena Vista at 6 p. m. on Wednesday, March 26.

Boys volleyball

According to MaxPreps, the Wekiva boys volleyball team is 0-5, 0-0 in district matchups, and ranked 115th in the state. The Mustangs have won one set out of 16 and have played in five matches.

Wekiva's one winning set was in its most recent match against West Port. In set two, they outscored the Wolf Pack 25-19 after being outscored 26-24 in set one. This game looked like it had a chance to be Wekiva's first win until West Port bounced back in sets three and four. The Wolf Pack won set three 25-12 and set four 25-16.

The Wekiva boys' volleyball team has entered no stats for the 2025 season. The week Wekiva returns from spring break, the team will have one match. They will host Ocoee on Thursday, March 27, for a match set to begin at 7 p. m. After that game, the team will be at the halfway mark of the season with just seven games left to play in the regular sea-

utive director (K. Mike Winter) has been out on multiple occasions."

Salimbene said that Winis the facilities executive director and is responsible for the construction program, so he has been the district's onsite presence. Salimbene said that Winter had also been to the field at the time of the early March meeting, and he has been there since then. Salimbene said White is responsible for OCPS construction projects.

At the time of the meeting with parents in early March, Salimbene gave a list of what needed to be finished before both complexes were safe for occupancy.

For the baseball complex, the roof needed corrective work, the plans for installing new bleachers needed to be resubmitted, they still needed to pass the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's (FDEP) wastewater clearance, foul ball netting needed to be in-

stalled, electrical installation documentation needed to be corrected and resubmitted for final inspections and the design inconsistencies between the home and away dugouts needed to be addressed.

Since then, the roofing problems have been resolved as OCPS contractors removed roofing sections, replaced them, and passed the final inspection. The bleachers were removed and reinstalled to meet safety requirements and have passed inspection. On Tuesday, March 18, testing of the water and wastewater systems was completed, and FDEP granted clearance.

The final certification of occupancy and final electrical inspection still needs to be completed. Salimbene said that a design issue has been identified that must be fixed before the electrical system can pass inspection. Salimbene said that he believes that it will be finished by the end of spring break.

But the foul-ball netting won't be done by the end of spring break. Foul ball netting is needed to prevent balls from damaging the property of neighbors and fans.

"Clearly, netting was needed, and we're going to install the netting as quickly as we can," Salimbene said. "It's not something that's going to be available when we first occupy the facilities. It may not be available for the season, but we're going to install the netting."

While both complexes are unfinished, the softball team seems very happy with how their new complex looks, the baseball team has had some complaints — starting with the home dugout. Salimbene told me he was unaware of the difference. He said he would have to look into that and determine if work needs to be done.

"I think I would need to investigate that to be able to answer the question as to whether there's something planned to make them look similar," Salimbene said

Another question baseball parents had was if there would be a window to watch the games in the concession stand as there was in the old complex.

"We've assessed that, and I really do need to communicate an update on those outstanding design issues to the community," Salimbene said.

The softball complex was very similar, with the roof needing corrections before passing final inspections, electrical documentation needing to be corrected and resubmitted, and bleacher construction needing resubmission for approval of more concrete.

"Specifically for softball, we removed and replaced portions of the roof to allow inspection to occur, and the roofs have passed inspections," Salimbene said. "We also resolved electrical system design concerns, and

the softball electrical systems have passed inspections. We also resolved concerns about the bleachers anchoring, and the bleachers have passed inspections."

With the electrical design concerns fixed and inspections done, the contractors could energize the baseball and softball buildings in order to complete all other inspections for the air conditioning, fire alarms, and more. All individual system inspections for softball have passed and were waiting on the final inspection on Wednesday, March 19, but the district had not announced final results by press time.


