

Nelson dismisses city administrator after 9 months

Communication breakdown led to termination

By Teresa Sargeant Reporter

Apopka Mayor Bryan Nelson told the Apopka Chief that he fired the city administrator because of a pattern of poor communication culminating with an unreported letter from the state Department

of Government Efficiency (DOGE).

Nelson terminated Apopka city administrator Jacob Smith on Friday, nine months after he started the job.

"I'm his boss, and you'd think he would communicate with me, but yeah, so in four weeks since his daughter got married, he'd been to see me in my office once," Nelson said in a Monday phone in-

A Tuesday, March 18,

letter from Gov. Ron DeSantis's office — reviewed by the Chief — explained that the Executive Office of the Governor (EOG) has set up an EOG DOGE Team "which will use advanced technology to identify, review, and report on unnecessary spending within county and municipal governments and recommend legislative reforms to promote efficiency, maximize productivity, and eliminate waste in state and local

government."

To that effect, the EOG DOGE Team is requesting municipalities to submit financial solvency reviews to the office no later than April 8, which was three weeks after the letter was sent. The letter requested confirmation about whether the municipality has any financial emergency or distress such as inability to pay loans or

County commissioners vote to cooperate with ICE

Immigrant rights organizations decry 5–2 vote

The Orange County Board of County Commissioners voted 5-2, on Tuesday, March 25, to ratify a memorandum of agreement for Orange County to cooperate with federal immigration officers in upholding immigration laws.

District 2 Commissioner Christine Moore, who represents Apopka, voted with the majority. District 5 Commissioner Kelly Martinez Semrad and District 1 Commissioner Nicole Wilson voted against the mea-

Orange County has set up a memorandum of agreement with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to participate in the Warrant Service Officer Program (WSO).

"The WSO facilitates the custodial transfer of specific aliens in Orange County Corrections Department (OCCD) facilities to ICE for removal purposes at the time of the alien's scheduled release from crimi-

nal custody," the March 25 county commissioner board agenda packet states. "Selected OCCD personnel will be trained, certified, and approved by ICE to perform certain immigration enforcement functions within OCCD facilities."

At the board meeting, Orange County Mayor Jerry L. Demings said the Florida Association of Counties called him on Feb. 19. The association informed him that his county was the only one out of the state's 67 that didn't sign the agreement. To not do so will result in Orange County losing federal funding.

Demings said that as "the CEO for Orange County, I can't let that happen," especially after speaking

Council approves revised athletic summer camp

Some residents question camp's affordability

The Apopka City Council voted 5-0 at its Wednesday, March 19, meeting to approve the newly revised athletic summer camp program, which will have 100 camper slots per session for youth ages 6 to 13.

The camp will run from 7:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. Monday through Friday at the Fran Carlton Recreation Center. The location is a walkable distance to Edwards Field for outdoor athletics, the Apopka Action Sports Park and the splash pad at Kit Land Nelson Park for water days.

Camp participants will get transported to Phillis Wheatley Elementary school gym for indoor athletics, the Northwest Recreation Complex for outdoor athletics, and go on a one-off field trip

The initial plan was to approach schools in the area to run the program there during the summer. City staff did work on that program model and met with the schools. However, because

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

State weighs local priorities

This week I got a chance to go to Tallahassee for the League of Cities Legislative Days and work with over 350 of Florida's City Mayors and Commissioners in support of local home rule. I also had time to lobby for some funding projects that would benefit Aponka and its reside



We could draw high school students from Apopka, Ocoee and Wekiva High Schools and even farther to give them firefighter training. This training facility would offer fire and EMS training and provide a direct pathway to certification and career readiness in the fire and emergency services field. We have asked the Legislature for \$1.25 million to accomplish this goal. We have also received

a letter from the school board recommending this project for funding.

The second funding request is to replace asbestos cement drinking water pipes with PVC. We have asked our friends in Tallahassee for \$1,057,500 to replace 2,500 linear feet of 6"

and 8" asbestos pipes within the City of Apopka's potable/drinking water asbestos cement distribution and service pipelines. The goal is to improve the drinking water quality and protect the public health in the predominantly low and moderate-income (LMI) areas within the established City's potable/drinking water service area.

We have just completed phase one of this project, which includes asbestos pipes in front of Apopka High School and east into the residential neighborhood. Once we complete the asbestos pipe removal, we need to replace more than 5 miles of galvanized pipe that is over 50 years old.

We appreciate Representative Doug Bankson and Senator Keith Truenow for helping shepherd these two projects through the legislative process.

Infrastructure projects in works for northwest Orange County

It is Orange County's budget season, when all department heads brief commissioners on planning for Fiscal 2026. My very first briefing was from Orange County Public Works. There is nothing more important to me than working on maintaining quality public infrastructure and planning for future infrastructure needs.

With revenues flat, maintenance delays are likely. I hesitate to share these large budget numbers, but it is my style to be transparent. Resurfacing increased from \$110k per linear mile to \$225k. Our level of resurfacing services went from 15- to 39-year cycles. Mowing and landscaping contract costs are also increasing by roughly 60 percent.

The Public Works Department has 574 positions with an operating budget of \$182 million, and the capital improvement budget is \$268 million.

In our District 2, improvement plans are encouraging. The county spends \$3.3 million per year from the gasoline tax on

building new sidewalks. An additional \$6 million for the bonded Accelerated Transportation Safety Program (ATSP) sidewalk program results in \$2.1 million to add sidewalks along Welch Road from Ustler Road east, to west of Crown Point Isle. Several county streets abutting Lakeville Road will also receive sidewalks.

Another \$3.3 million is planned for intersection improvements at Powers Drive and North Lane in Pine Hills and Sadler Avenue at Dora Drive in Tangerine.

The county-wide roadway lighting program includes up-

grading streetlights on portions of Ocoee Apopka Road, Old Dixie Highway from Boy Scout Blvd. to W. Highland Avenue, Round Lake Road from the county line to West Ponkan Road, and W. Highland Avenue from River Rock Blvd. to Plymouth Sorrento Road.

Large scale construction projects include improvements or widening to Kennedy Blvd. and All American. Rock Springs Road from Lester Road to the Publix will be in design.

Unfunded construction projects still include Edgewater Drive, Pine Hills Road Extension, Lake Destiny Drive and the NOWOCATS study on transportation for all of northwest Orange County. There will be plenty of future advocacy in store for me to secure funding for increased capacity improvements.

While budgets are flat and many transportation needs are unmet, District 2 still has many projects for which to look forward. I hope you find this information helpful.

summer months were the time for schools to get a lot of facility maintenance and upgrades done, there was a lack of space for the athletic camp

"The staff went back to the drawing board a little bit and adjusted the model, and the current plan is to operate the camp out of the Fran Carlton Center," Radley Williams, city parks and recreation director, said.

The cost of the camp is \$125 for residents and \$150 for non-residents. There is intent to add registration capacity if demand grows, Williams said.

While Mayor Bryan Nelson and Williams discussed the athletic camp's budget, Williams pointed out that the aim is to break even and that resident discounts are traditionally offered to taxpayers.

"One of the reasons the resident discount is traditionally in place for the program, especially recreation programming, is because for the consideration that taxpay-

ers of the city are contributing taxes to the budget that is paying for the program," Williams said.

AdventHealth offers \$15,000 worth of scholarships annually to help city residents afford the camp, but some residents questioned the program's affordability.

Leroy Bell brought up the camp's affordability in light of the city's most recent water rate increases. "You have people over in South Apopka that would like to probably use this also, and they get some pretty hefty water bills over there," Bell said. "They had nothing to do with what happened with the city, with raising it. So, would that pertain to the residents over there also? I just see you said there's opportunities for the residents of Apopka. What about those that are not residents?"



The city's new athletic summer camp program will take place at the Fran Carlton Center this summer.

In response, Williams said that the scholarships are available only for city residents with reductions of 25% or 50% off the tuition.

Virginia Street compared the camp's cost to other local programs and the inclusion of field trips in the price. Williams clarified that the program includes transportation and materials, and field trips will be announced once reg-

istration opens.

"Just like Mr. Bell said, the people on the other side of the tracks are not going to be able to have any access to any of the scholarships, right?" Street said to Williams. "I'm not going to let it go because the people on the other side the tracks paying the high water bill, as he said, we really need to be a little more fair about that exception there."

It's More Than Just Cremation;

Sylvester Hall asked about the scholarships' true cost and also emphasized the importance of seeing that the camp gets a good turnout. To echo Bell's point about the other side of the tracks, Hall recommended that the city thinks about the needs of residents in South Apopka as well as Apopka. He called for annexing South Apopka to unify the community.

"When we do these things, let's try to have a little more concept that we try to embrace everybody. You hear some people say that, 'Well, I don't like being called South Apopka. It's just Apopka.' Well, if that's the case, let's make it Apopka, and let's try to uplift and back to what my gentleman said here earlier, the annexation. That's long overdue."

After the Council vote, Commissioner Nick Nesta offered to meet with Williams separately to review some of the funding and how Nesta could add to the scholarship.

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City Council appoints new public works director

Public works director has over 30 years of engineering experience

The Apopka City Council approved the appointment of Momtaz Barq as city public works director at the Wednesday, March 19, meeting with a start date of April 28.

During the discussion, Barq's full-time starting salary

was disclosed as \$180,000. However, in order for him to transition from his consulting business to his new position, there was discussion about Barq working part-time first before moving on to full time.

As the CEO/Director of engineering for Terra-Max Engineering, Inc., Barq has over 30 years' engineering experience and holds a professional engineer license in Florida and Texas.

Joe Patton, city human resources director, presented Momtaz Barq at the Council meeting as requesting appointment as public works director. vironmental engineering. He has Patton listed Barq's career credentials and educational background.

"Montez has an extensive career in expertise in engineering and technical initiatives like project management, hydraulic hydrology and groundwater modeling, hydraulic system design, planning and development, construction plans, personnel management, organizational behavior and financial and budgeting," Patton said. "I know that you've all read his resume. He has a master of arts degree in ena master's in business administration, and he has a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering."

Barq was selected out of the three applicants that were reviewed and interviewed for the public works director.

Initially, human resources advertised the position as public services director on Jan. 22 until Feb. 10. However, the position was renamed public works director because of operational needs, according to the city staff report in the March 19 meeting agenda packet.



debts, uncontested outstanding claims from creditors over 90 days old and more.

"If we do not receive a response from you within 45 days, it will be presumed that your municipality is in possible statutory violation and in need of assistance," states the letter, which was signed by "the EOG DOGE Team."

According to the mayor, Smith received that correspondence and never told him about it.

"He got two emails, one from the governor's office and one from the League of Cities about this DOGE requirement, that was it. I was done," Nelson said.

Nelson said he himself

didn't really try reaching out to Smith during the four weeks of limited communication. He cited an opendoor policy and said all the other department heads communicate with him about their departments.

"I've had numerous conversations with every department head other than him," Nelson said. "Every couple days, I'm having conversations with department heads. So why is he different?"

As for submitting the DOGE financial solvency review, Nelson said either himself or city finance director Blanche Sherman will take care of the DOGE financial solvency review.

Smith began employment with the city of Apopka in June 2024. Had he stayed under contract with the city for an entire year, the city would have to pay the employment headhunter 40 percent of Smith's yearly \$170,000 base salary plus benefits, or about \$68,000. Nelson said avoiding paying the headhunter was not the reason for terminating Smith's contract.

Smith said in an interview with The Apopka Chief that Nelson never gave a reason for the termination, but only walked into Smith's office last Friday, told him that he "was done"

and Smith saw all of his city devices were deactivated.

Smith said that communication with the mayor was good until the winter, when he said the mayor began giving him "the cold shoulder." Smith said he had visited the mayor's office two to three times a day, but "a lot of times he wasn't there." He said Nelson did not respond to messages left with his secretary.

Smith said he hasn't been in touch with Nelson for the past four weeks because he was out of town for his daughter's wedding and then came down with an ill-

Smith said he never re-

ceived any communication from DOGE or about DOGE.

"It was just great working for Apopka," Smith said. "I have no ill feelings towards anybody. And I was shocked. But everybody kind of expects that this is what would happen."

Vice Mayor Diane Velazquez said she was surprised to hear about the termination because she was not aware of Smith doing anything inappropriate.

Upon hearing Nelson's rationale, Velazquez said it was interesting he gave the Chief that information but nobody else. She said she

was in constant communication with the city administrator no matter who was in that position. Velazquez said she always emailed Smith or copied him on the emails she would send.

"I had a good relationship with him, so if the mayor is saying that he hasn't had any communication with the administrator, that was something that I was unaware of," Velazquez said.

When asked if Smith informed Velazquez about the March 18 letter about DOGE, she said Smith never told her.

"He did not," she said. "I don't recall him discussing that letter."

with Orange County Corrections Chief Louis A. Quiñones, Jr. and attorneys.

Demings clarified what Orange County's role is in the enforcement of immigration laws.

"We are not in the business of going out into the community and doing the immigration enforcement for the federal government," Demings said. "That's not the role we play. Our role is to house individuals that law enforcement brings into our custody. We do not support the inhumane treatment of anyone, whether they are here legally or unlegally — unlawfully, I should say. We're here to essentially follow a process, a mandate of the law that we do not have the discretion."

Any local official found

to be derelict in their duties by refusing to obey immigration laws could be removed from office, according to Demings.

In a Tuesday, March 25, statement, Hope Community Center and the Immigrants Are Welcome Here Coalition, representing 30 local and state immigration and human rights organizations, said they "strongly condemn the Orange County Board of County Commissioners' approval of an agreement that essentially turns the county's correction officers into ICE

"This is a devastating decision for our immigrant neighbors and a shameful moment for Orange County," Felipe Sousa-Lazaballet, Hope Community Center executive director, said in the state-

ment. "Instead of engaging in democratic governance, our commissioners were forced into compliance by a governor who rules through intimidation. However, the fact that two commissioners voted against this agreement shows that our voices are being heard, and our fight is far from over."

The March 25 statement claimed that "several commissioners privately acknowl-



edged that they felt compelled to vote in favor of the agreement for fear of retaliation" from Gov. Ron DeSantis, which would include removal from office.

"Democracy perishes when elected officials are too afraid to vote their conscience," Tessa Petit, co-executive director of the Florida Immigrant Coalition, said in the statement. "This vote was made under duress, not through fair debate. Orange County residents deserve better from their representa-

On Wednesday, March 26, Orange County District 2 Commissioner Christine Moore told The Apopka Chief that the county commissioners had no choice but to vote for the agreement.

"We didn't really have a choice," she said, adding that Orange County must keep immigrants in jail for two days, and the Sheriff's Office will take care of matters. "I mean, it's federal law and state law, and our attorney said that we needed to cooperate with the

legal authorities. The governor said if we didn't, we would all be removed from office."

Moore disagreed with Hope Community Center's statement about the commissioners fearing retaliation from DeSantis.

"I don't fear him, but I'm required, when I take an oath of office, I have to follow state and federal law, and that's what they said," Moore said. "We really didn't have a choice to do it. Really, it was in a consent agenda."

which was once ARC's largest event.

The group chose the Renaissance era theme because of falcons' huge link to that historical time, according to Nicole Jones, ARC administrative assistant and volunteer coordinator. In those days, kings and queens owned, flew and used falcons. Falcons were also valued as currency to some extent, as they were traded in the Middle East and then brought back

ARC volunteers and staff create and use traditional falconry equipment such as rope knots.

ARC shelters almost 30 educational ambassador birds and administers a revolving number of raptors in rehabilitation of falcons, owls and hawks. A bird could stay with the center ranging from a few days to several months, depending on the seriousness of the bird's injuries.

For support, ARC relies on non-governmental monetary donations and 25 to 30 regular volunteers who come from different backgrounds, from high





From Cooking with Foliage La Sertoma of Apopka, we have Mary Demetree's Chicken Cacciatora, which (according to Wikipedia) refers to a meal prepared "hunter-style" with onions,



herbs, usually tomatoes, often bell peppers, and sometimes wine.

Marvin Woods shares his recipe for Spicy Pulled Pork Shoulder in his book titled The New Low-Country Cooking. He adds in a note, "Ask the butcher to bone the shoulder. Basically, you want to tie the pork several (five to seven) rings around to ensure that it doesn't fall apart during the cooking process. Leave 1 to 2 inches between the rings."

Marv adds, "I created this all-purpose flavoring mixture (Marv's Chili Paste, below) using three different types of chiles. The ancho is a smoked chile that registers around 6 or 7 on a heat scale of 1 to 10. Jalapenos rank about 5 or 6, and habaneros (or Scotch bonnets) are at 10. This paste has two purposes. One, of course, is to provide heat. The other is to add complexity to whatever you use it in because of the smoky flavor of the ancho chiles. I strongly suggest that you use this paste a little at a time and then taste the dish. Remember, you can always add more, but can't take

We found in this Southern Living's 1997 Annual Recipes, Potato Latkes from Julie Benson of Louisville, Kentucky.

Mark Sohn says, "I can't guarantee that this recipe for Country Biscuits will yield a biscuit like those you grew up with, but I hope it will get you started down the right path - the path of homemade biscuits. Use this master recipe for your special biscuits and modify it with variations. He rates this recipe as Easy, with only six ingredients. And he adds, "You may be surprised how fast you can make these biscuits."

MARY DEMETREE'S CHICKEN CACCIATORA

1) Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. 2) In a small bowl, stir together the garlic, herbs, Chili Paste, salt, and both (cayenne and black) peppers. Rub the pork all over with the mixture. Tie the pork before cooking (see note). 3) Place the vegetables in the bottom of a roasting pan, and cover with the water. Place the pork on top of the vegetables and cook for 40 minutes. Turn the pork. Continue cooking for about 40 minutes per pound, or until the pork is tender enough to be shredded with a fork. 4) When the pork is done, remove it from the pan. Let the meat cool down to the point where you can work with it without burning yourself. Using a fork, pull pieces off until you have shredded all the meat. (There may be some big pieces that you have to cut with a knife.) 5) Transfer the vegetables and juices in the bottom of the pan to a blender or a food

processor fitted with the metal chopping blade. Process until almost smooth. Strain through a medium sieve. Serve this as a sauce, a spread, or add chicken or vegetable stock and use to reheat the pork in.

MARV's CHILI PASTE

The New Low-Country Cooking by Marvin Woods

1 cup dried ancho chiles 1/2 cup warm water

4 to 5 fresh jalapeno peppers, stemmed 1-1/2 to 2 cups fresh habanero or Scotch bonnet peppers, stemmed

1/4 to 1/2 cup vegetable oil

First and most important, use gloves when you are working with the chiles.

Place the ancho chiles in the warm water and let stand for 15 minutes. Remove the chiles and drain off the excess water. Place the ancho chiles, jalapenos, and habaneros in the container of a blender. While adding the oil in a slow steady stream, process the peppers until a puree is formed. Store in a covered glass container in the refrigerator for up to one week.

JULIE BENSON'S POTATO LATKES

4 medium baking potatoes, peeled

1 small onion

1/4 cup all-purpose flour 4 large eggs, lightly beaten

MASTER RECIPE: BISCUITS

Ingredients:

1-3/4 cups all-purpose flour

1-1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

1-1/2 tablespoons butter or lard, softened 1-1/2 tablespoons butter or lard, chilled 1/2 cup milk

Steps:

1) Place the oven rack in its lowest po-

sition, and preheat the oven to 450 degrees Fahrenheit. In a large bowl, combine 1-1/2 cups of the flour, baking powder, and salt. Using a pastry blender, cut the chilled butter and the softened butter into the flour until the mixture forms crumbles the side of rice grains. Make a well in the center of the mixture and add the milk. Stir lightly until mixed. Turn out onto a cold, floured surface, and knead five times. Do not over-knead. 2) Sprinkle some of the remaining 1/4-cup flour over the dough and pat out the dough to a 1/2-inch thickness, using the extra flour to keep the dough from sticking to your hands. Fold the dough in half and pat it out to a 3/4-inch thick thickness. 3) Using a 2- to 3-inch biscuit cutter, cut out the biscuits and place them 1 inch apart on a baking sheet. Press the scraps of dough together, pat out the dough, and cut until all the dough is used. 4) Bake for 10 minutes. When the biscuits are cooked and the bottoms are brown and crusty, broil the tops to brown them. Yield: 8 biscuits or 6 servings

Alternatives:

Buttermilk Biscuits: Replace the milk with 1/2-cup plus 2 tablespoons fat-free cultured buttermilk.

Ham Biscuits: Also called Filled Biscuits. Cut 8 slices of country ham or Canadian bacon and put 1 slice inside each biscuit after baking. Sausage Biscuits: Fry 8 patties of pork sausage; fill each baked biscuit with 1 sausage patty. Serve with Fried Apples, or add several slices of Fried Apples to make a fried appleand-sausage biscuit sandwich.

Ginger Sorghum Biscuits: To the Master Recipe, add 1/2-teaspoon ground ginger and 1/4-cup 100-percent pure sweet sorghum syrup. Reduce the milk by 3 tablespoons. Baste the biscuits with melted butter. This biscuit does not rise very high, and the top breaks like a sugar cookie. Serve with Sorghum Butter or Hot Sorghum.

Cheese Biscuits: In one variation of this biscuit, we roll the dough out as if we were making a cinnamon roll or jelly roll, spread cheese over the dough, roll, cut, and bake. In another variation, we cream butter and cheese, use an equal volume of flour and cheese, and add no liquid. No liquid! This dough melts together, and it comes from the oven rich and cheesy. More often we add cheese to the biscuit dough. To the Master Recipe, as you stir in the milk, add 1 cup (4 ounces) coarsely shredded or diced sharp Cheddar cheese or a mixture of Cheddar and Swiss cheese.

Barberville Pioneer Settlement offers history lessons

The motto at the Barberville Pioneer Settlement is "Discover Yesterday Today." And that's precisely what you will get at the 30-acre campus of this living history destination in Central Florida.

When it opened in 1976, there were only two buildings on the grounds: the Joseph Underhill House, currently under renovation, and the Barberville Central High School, built in 1919. Today, there are 20 historic structures on the grounds, although that isn't all.

"We are not just about preserving buildings," said Erick Nielsen, associate director of Barberville Pioneer Settlement. "We are also about preserving the arts, crafts, tools and technologies of the pioneer lifestyle in Florida."

The high school building, a National Register of Histor-

ic Places site, is center-stage and one of the first things you see when you walk on the grounds. It was first built to accommodate elementary, middle and high school students and was the only school in the area to offer college preparatory classes.

But county officials abandoned the school after a time. Nielsen said the building was saved thanks to the efforts of a group of art teachers who founded the Pioneer Settlement for the Creative Arts, Inc., as a not-for-profit organization.

"They petitioned the school board to use the high school building to teach lost arts such as spinning, weaving, blacksmithing and woodworking," Nielsen said.

The high school is the settlement's prize building and the reason Pioneer Settlement opened where it is.

"It is one of the jewels of the settlement and the whole reason the settlement came about," Nielsen said.

At first, the teachers leased the school building from the Volusia County School Board, but in 2001, the school board ceded ownership to the Pioneer Settlement Board of Directors.

Over time, other buildings were moved to the location, giving birth to the Settlement.

"Most buildings are regional, and a lot came from just 10 miles away," Nielsen said. "The furthest building is the Lewis Log Cabin, which comes from South Georgia."

The train depot on the property was built in 1885. If connected to a railroad path, it could be used as a functional depot. It also contains a history lesson: the depot had two waiting rooms, one for African Americans and one for whites because it was built during segregated times.

The fire station, Model A Ford shop, clubhouse, and blacksmith shop are standouts, especially the blacksmith shop.

"It's been our most successful workshop and partnership," Nielsen said. "They petitioned the school board to use the high school building to teach lost arts such as spinning, weaving, blacksmithing and woodworking."

The settlement also promotes the art and entertainment that dominated during pioneer times, with two major folk festivals during the year: the Spring Frolic on the first weekend in April and the Fall Country Jamboree on the first weekend in November.

The festivals include contra dancing, musical workshops and historical demonstrators who show off different tools and trades, such as wheelwrighting, chair caning and pottery.



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Apopka baseball, softball fields limp into action

JV baseball game canceled due to lighting failure

Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) confirmed Monday that Apopka's baseball and softball complexes were ready for the scheduled home games starting Tuesday, March 25, but problems would arise throughout the week with each complex.

Apopka had to cancel its junior varsity baseball game on Tuesday when the lighting at J. Barnes Field failed to function properly. OCPS and Apopka High School personnel were working all day Tuesday to get the lights to work, but to no avail. The varsity game was moved up to 5 p. m. in order to play the game before sundown.

The baseball scoreboard also was not working, because the antenna is bro-

ken and can't receive signals from the game scorers.

The softball field's scoreboard was also not working as of Wednesday, March 26, although the lights are functional. Head softball coach Mike MacWithey said that JV will be the first team to play at home on Thursday, while varsity is set to at play home Friday against Windermere.

The softball team played its first 10 games of the season on the road, posting a stellar 8–2 record. The baseball team played 14 straight road games to start the season and compiled an 8-6 record.

Apopka's first home game came a week after Rory Salimbene, the school district's acting chief facilities officer, told The Apopka Chief he was hopeful the fields would be ready after spring break, pending final inspections and approvals. Those were ultimately secured, and Salimbene advised Apopka High School staff on Friday, March 21, that all future home contests for the baseball and softball teams could proceed as scheduled.

As of spring break, several items needed to be finished before both complexes were deemed safe and ready for use, including final electrical inspection and occupancy certification at the baseball complex. The softball complex also needed to pass its final building and site inspection.

Even though the complexes are ready for use,

some outstanding questions and problems with the baseball complex remain unaddressed. One of the more significant issues with the Apopka baseball complex is its lack of foul ball netting. Salimbene said the district will have to install the net after the season ends.

Another issue among baseball parents was the design inconsistencies between the home and away dugouts.



In the field, Apopka was perfect once again with a 1.000 fielding percentage with 21 putouts on 21 total chances while also collecting two double plays, one coming from Hamrick and one from Spaid.

"We're a good team," Brewer said. "We're a really good team, and we're tough to beat. When the pitching is good, the defense is good, and we're putting the balls in play and making them make difficult plays, we are a great team. The strikeouts and the pop-ups — if we eliminate those things and play our game, we'll be fine."

Apopka vs. St. Cloud (6-3) Win

Apopka enjoyed their very first home game of the season at J. Barnes Field on Tuesday. The Blue Darters defeated the St. Cloud Bulldogs 6-3, using a four-run second inning to break open the game.

The four-run rally all came with two outs. Reef VanKuren stepped to the plate with runners on first and second and singled on a line drive to send in Apopka's first run. Rieli then slapped a grounder through the infield to send in the second run. Apopka's next two runs came in courtesy of Ty Livingston, who doubled to left field to score two more runs and put the Blue Darters up 4–0 going to the third.

"We have actually done that two or three times this year," Brewer said. "I'm not saying that we've got .300 hitters all up and down our lineup, but I will say that we have guys up and down our lineup that give you good atbats. So even with two outs, the next guy up, even if we get to the bottom of our order, there's still guys that will give you a quality at-bat."

St. Cloud scored three runs in the fourth to pull within a run, but Apopka tacked on single runs in the

fourth and sixth innings to seal the 6–3 win.

Livingston, Rieli and Andy Diaz paced the Apopka offense. Livingston went 2-for-4 at the plate with two RBIs and a double. Rieli went 3-for-4 with one run and one RBI. Diaz went 1-for-2 and scored twice.

Jaggers pitched a complete game for the Blue Darters on the mound. He allowed seven hits and three runs (one earned) while striking out five. Jaggers ended the game with a 1.00 ERA after throwing 88 pitches.

What's next

After the win over East River and St. Cloud, Apopka had two more games this week. On Thursday, they traveled to East Ridge to face off against the Knights. On Friday, March 28, Apopka will host the Wekiva Mustangs for a game beginning at 6 p. m. After this week, the team has just six games until the end of the regular season.

The two wins improve the Blue Darters to 10-6 on the season, including 1–1 in district play, and ranked 181st in the state according to MaxPreps on Wednesday, March 26.

The Blue Darters are 4-2 in their last six games, overcoming East River (8–1), The Villages (6–2), East River again (14-0) and St. Cloud (6–3), while falling to Dr. Phillips (5–4) and Lake Nona (11-9). Apopka has scored 88 runs and allowed 51 for a positive 37-run scoring differential.



Healthy living can help delay dementia onset, progression

Newly available drugs also help slow Alzheimer's, treat symptoms

At 82, Gainesville resident Julie Gray Burns remains mentally sharp, but she can't stop wondering occasionally whether she might be susceptible to dementia.

Her mother had dementia, and a sister and a brother have both died of Alzheimer's disease. A brother, who is three years younger than her, got tested to see if he had the Alzheimer's gene, but he got an all-clear.

Burns says she's not going to do any testing. She says she has concerns but tries not to dwell on it.

"It crosses my mind, but I still play mahjong and a French card game," she said. "I used to play bridge and backgammon. I was always a game person."

During the pandemic, Burns went a step further and studied French online. She also reads incessantly.

Burns sometimes forgets a name but says she doesn't worry about it too much.

"If I can't think of a name, I know it will come to me in two or three hours," she said. "I don't let (worry about dementia) affect my life. I still drive. I still go out. I still see people."

Dementia, Alzheimer's disease, and other aging and memory disorders are front and center these days as reflections of concerns about the cognitive capabilities of aging political candidates. However, it is also getting attention because of the Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) recent approval of pharmaceutical advances that may reverse the course of the disease.

Last July, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved the use of Donanemab, an intravenous infusion therapy to be taken monthly. When taken in the early stages of Alzheimer's, it can slow the progression of the disease, giving people more time to participate in daily life and live indepen-

"This is real progress. Today's approval allows people more options and greater opportunity to have more time," said Alzheimer's Association President and CEO Joanne Pike in a prepared statement. "Having multiple treatment options is the kind of advancement we've all been waiting for — all of us who have been touched, even blindsided, by this difficult and devastating disease," she said.

Lecanemab is another intravenous infusion therapy approved by the FDA in 2023 that helps slow disease pro-

A third drug which slows cognitive decline, Aducanumab, received FDA approval in 2021, but its manufacturer, Biogen, discontinued production last year to refocus resources elsewhere.

Other drugs, like donepe-

zil, rivastigmine, and memantine, treat symptoms. While they do not stop the damage Alzheimer's causes to brain cells, they may help lessen or stabilize symptoms for a limited time by affecting certain chemicals involved in carrying messages among and between the brain's nerve cells, according to the association's

"Because multiple FDAapproved Alzheimer's treatments are now available, early detection and diagnosis are even more critical to ensure individuals receive the most benefit," said Dr. Shellie-Anne Levy, a clinical neuropsychologist and assistant professor in the Department of Clinical and Health Psychology at the University of Florida. "Access to these treatments should not be delayed at any stage or by any entity — not the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) coverage with evidence development policy, private insurers, health systems or doctors."

Pike also said clinical trials for Alzheimer's drugs need to improve the representation of all affected populations, given that the rate of dementia and Alzheimer's is twice

as high for African Americans and one-and-a-half times as much for Hispanics when compared to aging white individuals. Experts are still trying to figure out why.

"These groups are severely underrepresented in treatment studies," Pike said. "It is critical that clinical trial study populations reflect the communities these treatments intend to serve."

However, not all memory or cognitive issues are a result of Alzheimer's disease.

"Sometimes people are deficient in certain vitamins, and because of that metabolic disruption, it can cause thinking and memory changes in your day-to-day activities," Pike said. "But those things are modifiable. And with treatment, dementia symptoms can reverse."

Florida is second in the nation for the number of people living with Alzheimer's, with more than 580,000 Floridians aged 65 and older living with the disease. Overall, in 2023, the association reported 7 million people with Alzheimer's in the United States, with 1-in-3 seniors reported as dying of Alzheimer's or another type of demen-

Here in Orange County, some 164,000 people have

some form of dementia or mild cognitive impairment, according to Alzheimer's Orange County. It's the No. 3 cause of death in the county.

Experts say keeping your mind active, healthy eating, physical exercise, a good night's sleep, and social interaction are all things that can help delay dementia. In other words, whatever is good for your health is also a tool to help prevent dementia.

"In truth, dementia prevention begins in the womb," says Glenn Smith, principal investigator for the 1Florida Alzheimer's Disease Research Center, a consortium of institutions working to promote prevention and treatment of Alzheimer's and related dementias.

"Higher educational attainment is strongly associated with reduced dementia risk because higher education builds cognitive reserve," Smith said. "The better we do at educating people and helping them obtain advanced education, the more we reduce their risk."

While higher levels of education are associated with a decreased risk for dementia, other health-related conditions and behaviors can increase risks.

"Head injury has an association with dementia," Smith said. "Smoking is associated with dementia. So is high blood pressure. Being socially and cognitively active protects against dementia."

Julie Roca, host of the podcast Aging Gracefully, says something often not considered is the impact of hearing loss on dementia.

"Hearing loss doesn't cause dementia, but hearing loss can make dementia progress faster," Roca said. "People with hearing loss feel isolated. They don't understand what is being said, so they don't participate as much in the conversation."

Now that a few drugs have become approved to treat early Alzheimer's disease or mild cognitive impairment, there's even more of an imperative to stay healthy longer.

However, treatment access also depends on an individual's willingness to see their doctor about their concerns, as no one can be put on a course of drug treatment without a prescription, said Roca, who is also a healthcare relations representative for Community Hospice & Palliative Care and a volunteer with the Alzheimer's Association.

"You must have a diagnosis, and that's where a lot of people miss getting help because they are trying to avoid what they are seeing," Roca said. "They say 'No, it's OK. This is just a part of aging.' ... They are not going and asking doctors to check it out and investigate it. Maybe they don't want to know, but we need to know now that there are things out there that can help."

Experts caution every forgotten name doesn't necessarily mean dementia is lurking in your brain.

"When you have your senior moments, that's typical aging. Everyone, as they get older, has changes in their thinking ability," said clinical neuropsychologist Levy. "They may slow down a little bit. They may not remember the name of the person. That's typical.

"You guys will have your senior moments all the time, but it doesn't necessarily mean something wrong is happening," she said.

So, while not every forgotten name is a roadmap to dementia, staying aware of the signs of potential problems helps people to get an early diagnosis and, if needed, early medical help, experts say.
