Christians remember Christ's suffering on Good Friday

April 18 is Mourning Friday, Long Friday, Silent Friday, and Holy Friday.

I'm sure you're thinking to yourself: isn't today Good Friday?

They actually are all one and the same — the day Christians remember when Christ was executed, put to death by the power of the state. The other names are used in languages such as German, Swedish, French and Spanish.

Why is it called Good Friday in English? Why would a day on which Jesus was beaten and killed be called good? After all, many churches will hold solemn services today, and some of those will end in darkness in the church.

While there are several theories on the origin of the name, the one that is most widely accepted is that it stems from a time when the word good was used to mean the same thing as pious or holy. So Good Friday has stayed with us since the Middle Ages.

Others think it may come from the expression "God's Friday."

When you think about it, it is a Good Friday for Christians because they know how the story ends. After his death and burial, Christ would rise on the third day, on Easter. Although he was crucified, they see his death as resulting not only from the actions

of the authorities, but also because of the sins of each person.

His death and resurrection meant salvation would be available to all mankind. The cross, intended to be a symbol of shame, became a symbol of victory.

For many, Easter itself has become associated with chocolate Easter bunnies (and Peeps), egg hunts, and gifts for children. Good Friday has remained primarily a religious holiday, although it is a government-recognized holiday in a number of countries and several U.S. states.

As with many holidays, there is a traditional food for Good Friday: hot cross buns. While hot cross buns as we know them originated in England, cakes marked with a cross may have been baked in Greece 1,500 years ago. Hot cross buns are still baked and eaten by many people today.

For example, Ree Drummond, known as the Pioneer Woman on her website and TV show, says "friends who gift one another with Hot Cross Buns every year are said to remain friends for life."

Good Friday is part of Holy Week, which began last Sunday with Palm Sunday, a remembrance of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem.



Applications open through April 30


Returning this summer, the yearly Apopka Youth Works program is taking applications now until April 30 from students ages 15 to 19 for internships and from businesses seeking interns.

The program intends to equip area youth ages 15 to

19 with work experience, practical skills and career possibilities.

To prepare youth for the workforce, Apopka Youth Works program will provide one week of work readiness training 1-5 p.m. from June 2 through June 4 at the Apopka Community Center.

The training program will contain three different tracks, depending on age range, monetary incentive and lessons:



In Explore, students ages 14 and 15 years can make up to a \$1,200 incentive while learning about careers, college life and financial aid.

In Engage, students ages 15 and 16 years can make up

to a \$1,200 incentive while being involved in different workplaces and growing a portfolio.

In Experience, students ages 17, 18 and 19 years can make \$15 per hour for 30 hours per week during a four-week paid internship and one week of skills training.

Apopka Youth Works is a partnership between city of Apopka and CareerSource Central Florida, which will pay the interns, thus alleviat-

ing participating employers from any financial burden while encouraging interns to succeed.

Participating employers can guide and mentor youth, lend to area talent development, and foster relationships with budding employees.

For participating businesses, the Summer Youth Program Experience Track will have two sessions, each four weeks long with interns

available to work 30 hours per week: Session A, from June 9 to July 6; and Session B from July 14 to August 8.

As he brings other parks and recreation colleagues into management positions, his hours as interim city administrator will increase until he transitioned full-time into his new position.

Williams is succeeding Jacob Smith, whom Nelson

had terminated last month due to a communication breakdown between the two. The breakdown culminated in Smith deleting emails from the governor's office and the Florida League of Cities, according to information from the city of Apopka information technology department. In the emails, the state Department of Government Efficiency was requesting municipalities to send reviews of their financial solvency for an April 8 deadline.

"Paul is committed to reclaiming our institutions from





Durin' your time of reflection and prayer this week, I hope you have a chance to appreciate how blessed we are to live in the United States of America! We are thankful for HIS resurrection and the blessings the Lord bestows on us each day.

If you're an angler, you

couldn't find a better place to live and fish. We have so many lakes in Florida to fish, and I hope you get a chance to enjoy them as much as I do.

The fishin' has been pretty good in most of the lakes in our area. I'm still gettin' great reports from Lake Kissimmee on bluegills and shellcrackers. Some folks are gettin' on the water early and catchin' their limits by 10 a.m.

Folks are gettin' in those lily pads and catchin' 'em as fast as they can pull' 'em in the boat. Most folks are usin' red worms to catch 'em.

The bass fishin' is still goin' strong in most of the

lakes in our area. The Fishers of Men tournament trail held their fourth tournament of the year on the Harris Chain last week.

Congrats to John Brazzell and Josh Davis on their win on the Harris Chain. They won their tournament last week-end by bringin' five bass to the scales that weighed 24.99 pounds. They also had the big bass of the tournament that hit the scales at 9.47 pounds. Congrats to all 19 teams that fished that day. The X-treme Bass Series held their tournament on John's Lake.

Congrats to Thad Lacinak and Eric Bourne on their win.

They were able to bring five bass to the scales that weighed in at 16.80 pounds. They also took home big bass honors with a 10.31 pounder.

Guys, any time you can catch a double digit bass, it's always exciting. The bass fishin' on the Butler Chain is still doin' pretty good. Folks are fishin' with chatter-baits, swim-jigs, and plastic worms. There are still a few bass on the beds but most of 'em have already spawned. And they can still spawn even in the month of May, so make sure you check it out when you are on the water. If you do catch a big female off the bed, make sure you take a

picture and get 'er back in the water REAL QUICK. That will insure bass fishin' will still be around for our children and grandchildren.

The Maitland Chain has been hit or miss here lately. Folks are catchin' some bass out in deeper water around the submerged hydrilla and eel-grass beds. Chatter-baits, lipless crank-baits, and slow sinkin' Senko type baits have been workin' the best.

My buddy Rich and I took my boat out for a spin last Friday. The boat had been sittin' for a while and it needed to be run. I talked to an angler who fished the Harris Chain

that day, and he said the fishin' was really good for him. He caught plenty of bass between 1 and 3 pounds. He also reported that he caught a few biguns. He wouldn't tell me what he caught 'em on, but that's ok. They were bitin' and that's all I needed to know!

Well folks, y'all have a great week. I might have back surgery again; I'll keep you updated in the weeks to come. In the meantime, get out there and enjoy this coolish weather, and ... y'all catch some fish!

ing at the half-field line for the Darters, giving Apopka a chance at victory with easy possessions.

The Apopka goalies saved nine shots and allowed 10 for a save percentage of 47.36. Nya Makonnen allowed eight goals and had five saves, while Parker Aho allowed just two goals and had four saves.

Season Recap

The Blue Darters finished the season with a 9-5 record with four home wins and five away wins. Apopka scored 106 goals and allowed 92 for a positive scoring differential of 14 goals. The Blue Darters averaged 7.7 goals per game and 2.2 assists per game.

When it came to scoring

goals this season, Apopka's Cooper Johnson, Nick Lucas, Hoyt, and Willis stood out. The four combined for 74 of the team's 106 goals. Johnson led the team with 27 goals, with Lucas scoring 17, Hoyt scoring 16, and Willis scoring 14. The team also brought in 31 assists this season, with Brennan Walsh, Hoyt and Willis accounting for 16.

Apopka also collected 144 faceoff wins in 14 games, an average of 10.28 faceoff wins per game. The team also brought in 124 ground balls, an average of 8.9 per game.

The Apopka goalies had a great season, particularly Makonnen and Aho. Makonnen led the team in save percentage with a 59.1, allowing just 56 goals on 137 shots on goal. Aho allowed 23 goals on 51 shots on goal for a save percentage of 54.9.

The team will lose seven seniors this year, so it will be looking for new leadership in the coming season. Luckily for the Apopka lacrosse team, they had 16 juniors on the squad this year, meaning next year, the team will be very senior-heavy. That experienced team will be looking to bounce back from the early exit from the 2025 post-season.
