Ground breaks on 215-acre development at S.R. 429 Beltway

The groundbreaking of the 215-acre mixed use development in the northwestern corner of Orange County will boost economic development, relieve the regional affordable housing crisis, and bring more vibrancy to the Orlando area, according to several ing were Joseph Beninati, Wyld speakers at the event.

The groundbreaking ceremony for Wyld Oaks took place on Friday, January 19, off the newly completed 429 Beltway and West Kelly Park Road Interchange in Apopka.

Wyld Oaks will contain up to 200,000 square feet of retail and outparcels, two hotels, 3,000 to 4,000 multifamily and condominium residences, expansive a collaboration of this size and

outdoor entertainment venue, up to 200,000 square feet of office space, a 10-acre park and preserve called Yonder, and a section named Wyld Green that will include a multi-use trail network. The first 325 residences have been designed and will break ground this year.

of this magnitude in something that is going to be a connection for those who are coming out to enjoy our Northwest Rec Center, our amphitheater that is bustling and booked almost every single weekend," said Cate Manley, president/CEO of the Apopka Area Chamber of Commerce. Baldwin Park, Celebration, and "Now we'll have hotels and locations where people can live, work and play. And that is what we are all about.

At the groundbreaking ceremony, attendees got the chance to preview the Wyld Oaks master plan. This year's demand for Wyld Oaks retail is estimated to be nearly \$1.1 billion, while supply is only \$700 million, leaving a gap of about \$400 million, according to a Wyld Oaks press release.

As of 2023, approximately 12,900 current and future households are growing in the Apopka area surrounding Wyld Oaks.

While discussing the Wyld Oaks master plan, Beninati illustrated the grand scope of Wyld Oaks compared to other local communities: New Broad Street/ downtown Winter Park. Each of these communities fit only inside Wyld Oak's town center and doesn't include Wyld Oaks' future sections such as its industrial park, homes on the groundbreaking site, or the homes and commercial properties on Kelly Park Road.

"I actually spent a bunch of time with our planners and architects trying to put in context the overall site plan, which here approximates over 300 acres because this portion (of the master plan) will be Cadence, a 1.5-million square foot industrial development and (Cadence Partners

In addition to the city of Apopka's election date of March 19 for the races of Seats 3 and 4 of the City Commission, Florida's 2024 Presidential Preference Primary (PPP) election is also set for March 19.

There will only be a PPP for the Republican party this year, inasmuch as the Florida Democratic Party already chose President Joe Biden toward the end of 2023 for this November's ballot. Only registered party members can vote in their PPP election.

Following backlash from party members, Florida Democrats said in a statement, "The process to be on the Florida Democratic primary ballot was made publicly available and clearly states that the deadline to submit nominations for the ballot must be submitted to the Secretary of State by November 30, 2023. This is the standard process."

Michael Steinberg, a former chairman of the Hillsborough County Democratic Party, filed a lawsuit Dec. 5, citing the Florida election law that allows a party to dictate which names appear on its presidential primary ballot. He also said his constitutional rights as a voter were violated by the decision to exclude Minnesota Congressman Dean Phillips from the ballot. U.S. District Judge Allen Winsor denied Steinberg's request for an emergency court order on Jan. 12, ruling that Steinberg's case does not show a "substantial likelihood of success" based on its merits.

*Early voting period (mandatory period): Saturday, March 9 through Saturday, March 16

*Deadline to request that a ballot be mailed: Thursday, March 7

As for who is on the ballot, Ballotpedia says these candidates are seeking the Republican nomination: Former President Donald Trump; Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis (who has since withdrawn from the race and is now supporting Trump); Former U.N. Ambassador Nikki Haley, and Texas businessman and pastor Ryan Binkley.

Florida's PPP is a closed-primary election. You must be a registered voter in the party for which the PPP is being held, which in this case is Republican.

However, local nonpartisan elections might be held at the same time as the PPP Election, as is the case with Apopka's race for Seats 3 and 4 of the city commission. In those elections, all eligible voters can vote for those local races. And, it is a cost savings.

For those who want to register to vote in Florida, you must:

*Be a Citizen of the United States (a lawful permanent resident,



For more information about who these agencies are, visit the National Voter Registration Act (NVRA) webpage.

* By mail or in person.

If you need to update your information on your registration before any of the upcoming elections, head to RegistertoVoteFlorida.gov or reach out to your county Supervisor of Elections. In Orange County, the deadline to register for the March 19 elections is Tuesday February 20, which is 29 days before the local and PPP elections. Remember that Monday, February 19 is a national holiday and the OC-SOE office is closed.

Florida's statewide primary is on Tuesday, Aug. 20, for the purpose of nominating party nominees to be voted for in the general election to fill a national, state, county, or district office.

A primary election is held 11 weeks before the general election.

The General Election is on Tuesday, Nov. 5. This election is open to all voters regardless of party affiliation.

Again, the dates to be aware of before the national general election on Tuesday, November 5, are: Tuesday, March 19 for the City of Apopka city commission seats 3 and 4, and the Republican PPP election, the statewide primary on Tuesday, August 20, and then the general election nation-wide on Tuesday, November 5.







Last week of January was full of historical moments such as deserter execution

January 25

1533 - King Henry VIII married his second wife, Anne Boleyn, in defiance of Pope Clement who had refused to annul his first marriage. The King later broke all ties with Rome and became Supreme Head of the Church of England.

1579 - Holland, Zeeland, Utrecht, Gelderland, Friesland, Groningen and Overvssel formed the (Protestant) Dutch Republic with the signing of the Union of Utrecht to defend their rights against Catholic Spain.

1947 - Gangster Al Capone, who once controlled organized crime in Chicago, died in Miami at age 48 from syphilis.

1959 - An American Airlines Boeing 707 made the first scheduled transcontinental U.S. flight, traveling from California to New York.

1961 - President John F. Kennedy conducted the first live televised presidential news conference, five days after taking office.

1971 - In Uganda, a military coup led by Idi Amin deposed President Milton Obote. Amin then ruled as president-dictator until 1979 when he was ousted by Tanzanian soldiers and Ugandan nationalists. During his reign, Amin expelled all Asians from Uganda, and ordered the execution of more than 300,000 tribal Ugandans.

Birthday - Scientist Robert Boyle (1627-1691) was born in Lismore, Ireland. He formulated Boyle's Law concerning the volume and pressure of gases. January 26

1788 - The British established a settlement at Sydney Harbor in Australia as 11 ships with 778 convicts arrived, setting up a penal colony to relieve overcrowded prisons in England.

Labor leader Samuel Gompers (1850-1924) was born in London. He emigrated to America at age 13, worked in a cigar factory, eventually becoming head of the Cigar Workers' Union. He later brought together several national unions under the name American Federation of Labor and became its first president.

- German Kaiser Wilhelm II (1859-1941) was born. He was a grandson of England's Queen Victoria and ruled Germany from 1888 through World War I. Although he had military training, he left conduct of the war mainly in the hands of Generals Paul von Hindenburg and Erich von Ludendorff. In 1918, amid the defeat of Germany, he abdicated and fled to the Netherlands where he lived in seclusion until his death. He was given a military funeral by Hitler.

January 28

1547 - King Henry VIII of England died and was succeeded by his son, Edward VI. Henry had ruled since 1509 and had broken all ties with the Roman Catholic Church over the issue of divorce. He married a total of six times. Edward VI was the son of his third wife, Jane Seymour. Edward became king at age 10, but died of tuberculosis at age 16. He was followed by his half-sister, Mary

1871 - The Franco-Prussian War ended as Paris surrendered to the Germans after a four month siege. Peace terms imposed on the French included yielding the greater part of Alsace and Lorraine to the Germans and a \$1 billion fine. German troops also outraged the French by marching triumphantly through the streets of Paris causing enmity between the two nations which lasted for decades.

1915 - The U.S. Coast Guard was created by an Act of Congress, combining the Life Saving Service and the Revenue Cutter Service.

1891 - Hawaii proclaimed Liliuokalani as its queen. Renowned for her song Aloha Oe, she had a reign of only four years until she was forced to abdicate in 1895 under pressure from powerful businessmen.

1916 - During World War I, the first aerial bombings of Paris by German zeppelins took place.

1919 - The 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution (Prohibition Amendment) was ratified. For nearly 14 years, until December 5, 1933, the manufacture, transportation, and sale of alcoholic beverages were illegal in the United States. The Amendment had the unexpected result of causing enormous growth of organized crime which provided bootleg liquor to thirsty

Americans. Birthdays-Common Sense author Thomas Paine (1737-1809) was born in Thetford, England. His pamphlet, published in 1776, provided inspiration to undecided Americans that a new nation, independent from Britain, might eventually become "...an asylum for mankind!" He served in the Continental Army and observed the hardships of American troops fighting the world's most powerful army. He then published The Crisis series pamphlets which began by stating, "These are the times that

try men's souls." He refused to accept the profits from his writings and wound up destitute after the Revolution.

William Mc Kinley (1843-1901) the 25th U.S. President was born in Niles, Ohio. He was elected in 1896 and re-elected in 1900. Early in his second term, on Sep-

pistols misfired and the president was unharmed.

1933 - Adolf Hitler was appointed Chancellor of Germany by President Paul von Hindenburg. Hitler went on to become the sole leader of Nazi Germany. He then waged a war of expansion in Europe, precipitating the deaths of an estimated 50 million persons through military conflict and through the Holocaust in which the Nazis attempted to exterminate the entire Jewish population of Europe.

1948 - Mahatma Gandhi was assassinated in New Delhi, India, by a religious fanatic. Gandhi had ended British rule in India through nonviolent resistance. "Nonviolence is not a garment to be put on and off at will. Its seat is in the heart, and it must be an inseparable part of our very being," he had stated in 1926.

1968 - Beginning of the Tet Offensive in Vietnam as North Vietnamese troops attacked 36 provincial capitals and 5 major cities in South Vietnam, including an attack on the U.S. Embassy in Saigon and the presidential palace. Although U.S. forces eventually fended off the massive surprise attack and achieved a military victory, Tet became a propaganda victory for the Vietnamese due in part to graphic news reports on television which helped turn U.S. public opinion against continuation of the war.

1972 - In Londonderry, Northern Ireland, 13 Roman Catholics were killed by British troops during a banned civil rights march. The event became known as Bloody Sunday.

January 30, 1973 - During the Watergate scandal, Gordon Liddy and James McCord were convicted of burglary, wire-tapping and attempted bugging of the Democratic headquarters inside the Watergate building in Washington, D.C.

January 30, 1992 - Argentina allowed access to numerous files of Nazis who had fled to South America from Germany after World War II, thus aiding the hunt for Nazi war criminals.

Birthday - Franklin Delano Roosevelt (1882-1945) the 32nd U.S. President was born in Hyde Park, New York. Despite crippling polio, he led America out of the Great Depression and through World War II and is widely considered to be one of America's three greatest presidents (along with Washington and Lincoln). "When peace has been broken anywhere, the peace of all countries is in danger," he stated in 1939.

January 31

1943 - German troops surrendered at Stalingrad, marking the first big defeat of Hitler's armies in World War II. 





The local beltway footprint paved the way for managed growth and projects such as Wyld Oaks, she added.

Repeating what Demings had said about how 1,000 people per week are moving to Central Florida, Martinez said that phenomen has been happening for the last 60 years. In addition, over 500,000 college students are within 100 miles of downtown Orlando, and Orlando is consistently ranked as a top large metro area in the nation in which to start a business.

Martinez noted that Wyld Oaks will attract new businesses, expand the tax base, and bring vibrancy into Orange County and Central Florida, as well as help address the local affordable housing crisis.

Try Spinach au Gratin for a delicious casserole that is also very healthy

We have a meat dish made with cubed beef steaks from Paths of Sunshine. It is called Italian Braciole, and



the meat and sauce are served over cooked spaghetti similar to the way we serve spaghetti and meatballs.

When Katharine Lune and her husband Rob bought their land in Archer and ended up naming it *Heir*loom Country Farms, they wanted to do something to help pay for the property but that would also contribute to their community. Farming seemed right even though she had no prior experience. "I figured it out as I went along," she says. She runs the day-to-day operations while her husband is a web developer. Among the four-footed and web-footed residents of the farm are Gloucestershire Old Spot pigs, an endangered heirloom breed noted for a higher fat-to-meat ratio rather than conventionally raised pork. Many consider the meat to be more flavorful because of the marbling.

We have Oyster Stew from Emily Meggett's Gullah Geechee Home Cooking, that will serve 10 to 12 people. You can use frozen oysters if you don't have access to fresh.

We have Spinach au Gratin from Charleston Receipts that looks like a dish suitable for a special occasion. It was contributed by Mrs. Thomas A. Huguenin (Mary Vereen).

Mrs. Marilyn Guest contributed this recipe for Lemon Meringue Pie to a favorite source of ours, *Plains* Pot-Pourri, that was published in 1977 by the Plains Jr. Woman's Club of Plains, Georgia.

ITALIAN BRACIOLE Recipe from Florida Federation of Garden Clubs Inc., Paths of Sunshine 6 cubed beef steaks 1/2 cup chopped onion 1/4 cup chili sauce

- 1/2 cup beef broth 1 (4-ounce) can sliced
- mushrooms
- 2 tablespoons chopped bell pepper
- 2 tablespoons sliced pimientoolives
 - 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1/8 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- Hot cooked spaghetti
- 1/2 cup cold water 3 tablespoons flour

Season cubed steaks. Spread onion on steaks and roll. Secure with toothpicks. Place seams down in 10 x 6 x 2 baking dish. Combine chili sauce, broth, mushrooms, pepper, olives, sugar, Worcestershire sauce, oregano, garlic and pepper. Pour over beef rolls. Bake at 350 degrees about 1-1/4 hours. Arrange meat rolls atop spaghetti on serving platter. Keep warm. Pour pan juices in measuring cup, skim off fat. Add enough water to make 1-1/2 cups liquid. Blend flour with cold water. Add to meat juices and cook to desired consistency. Spoon sauce over meat and pasta. Serves 6.

- PORK AND VEGETABLE STEW Recipe from Field to Feast
- 1 (2 to 2-1/2 pound) bone-in pork shoulder or pork sirloin roast
- 3/4 teaspoon coarse salt 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground
- black pepper 4 tablespoons olive oil, divided
- 5 to 6 small potatoes
- 3 carrots, cleaned and chopped into 2-inch pieces
- 3 cloves garlic, peeled and smashed
- 2 stalks celery, leaves reserved, bottoms cut into 2-inch pieces 1 medium onion, cut into half-
- moon slices 1/3 cup all-purpose flour, seasoned lightly with salt and
- pepper 2 cups water, divided
- 3 sprigs fresh thyme, leaves
- removed and crushed lightly

- 1 to 2 large tomatoes, roughly chopped or 14-ounce can diced tomatoes 1 to 2 bay leaves

1) Trim roast well to remove excess fat. Season pork generously with salt and pepper; set aside. 2) Heat 2 tablespoons oil in a large, heavy skillet over medium heat. Add potatoes, carrots, garlic, celery and celery leaves, and onion. Cook for 10 minutes, stirring, until vegetables are softened and golden brown. Transfer mixture to a slow cooker. 3) Heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil in the same skillet over medium-high heat. Add pork roast and sear each side until browned, about 12 minutes total. Remove roast from pan and coat in seasoned flour. Place roast over vegetables in the slow cooker. 4) Add 1/2 cup water to the skillet, place over medium-high heat, and deglaze pan, scraping any brown bits from the bottom. Pour into slow cooker. 5) Add thyme, tomatoes, bay leaves, and remaining 1-1/2 cups water to slow cooker. Cover with lid, cook on low 6 to 8 hours. 6) Before serving, discard bay leaves. Remove pork roast and pull meat into large pieces. Discard bone.

Serve with vegetables, broth, and crusty French bread.

Recipe from *Gullah Geechee Home Cooking* by Emily Meggett 1/4 cup unsalted butter plus set aside 2 tablespoons unsalted butter 1-1/2 cups diced celery 1/2 onion, diced 3 cups whole or 2-percent milk 1 cup half-and-half Seasoning salt, to taste 1 quart shucked oysters Worcestershire sauce to taste Oyster crackers or saltines,

and bring water in the bottom of the double boiler to a boil. 3) Add seasoning salt to taste. Cook for 3 minutes. 4) Drain the oysters and place in a saucepan with the remaining 2 tablespoons butter. Cook the oysters over medium heat until curled. 5) Transfer the oysters to the top of the double boiler with the milk mixture. Gently stir together. Serve with Worcestershire sauce and crackers.

MRS. THOMAS A. HUGUENIN'S SPINACH AU GRATIN

Recipe from Charleston Receipts 2 pounds fresh spinach 4 tablespoons melted butter 2 tablespoons flour 1-1/2 cups sharp cheese (grated) 4 hard-boiled eggs (chopped) Salt and cayenne to taste

Wash spinach thoroughly, then place moist spinach in a saucepan without adding more water. Cover and cook for seven minutes or until tender. Drain well. Mix two tablespoons butter and the flour and add spinach. Season well with salt and cayenne. Add the other tablespoons melted butter, chopped eggs and one cup grated cheese. Mix well. Put in buttered casserole and cover with 1/2 cup grated cheese. Brown for 25 minutes at 350 degrees. Serves six.

The City Council had a January 10 workshop to review the city charter. Prior to that, the last charter review happened in 2014. At recent city council meetings and the workshop, much debate had transpired about the feasibility of amending the charter from strong mayor form to council-city manager form.

According to Nesta, the commissioners' role in the city charter isn't defined in any capacity, but rather that the commissioners act as the board of directors and the mayor is the CEO, involved with the city's daily operations that includes hiring and firing

power to express residents' concerns and thoughts to the city manager. The council would also have the power to hire and fire the manager.

"I don't have a preference. I listen to the residents. The residents have told me that they want a manager form government, and I'm fine with that," Nesta said.

As for single-member districts, Nesta believed that need would arise down the road.


Anderson said she hasn't decided yet which government form she would support, and she is researching the topic before figuring out where she stands on it.






Happy New Year from the Kinder Pups! We missed our teachers and friends while on Winter break but we


