New plan introduced to rid traffic fatalities from city

Plan will detail specific

An initiative was introduced, intended to eliminate fatalities and several injury crashes from the Apopka area's roadways.

Pamela Richmond, city traffic coordinator, explained the plan at the Wednesday, January 3, City Council meeting in City Hall. Since this plan was not an action item, no vote was taken.

"I'm a little passionate about this because I've been here seven years now. We've had quite a few fatalities – pedestrian, bicycle, and a few auto-related," Richmond said when introducing the plan. "So, I take it a little personally."

Under Vision Zero, MetroPlan Orlando awarded funds through U.S. Department of Transportation's Safe Streets for All (SS4A) grant program. There are \$5 billion in appropriated funds over five years, from 2022 to 2026. The funds initiatives to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries, and there are regional, county and local municipality action plans.

Apopka's Vision Zero plained.

strategies and projects that will eliminate fatal and severe injury crashes for roadways in Apopka. Under the plan, the city would ensure that it addresses specific issues affecting the city and not general concerns of roadway safety.

"Most of our pedestrian and bicycle fatalities, for example, occur on state roads and are not the fault of the driver of a vehicle. but are caused by the pedestrian or cyclists," Richmond explained.

According to Richmond, Vision Zero is an idea that has been embraced by the U.S. DOT and Florida DOT metropolitan planning organizations and local governments that envisions a safe and connected transportation network where people, regardless of age, race, ability, and chosen mode of transportation can travel safely.

The primary tenet of Vision Zero is that all traffic deaths are preventable by changing the traditional approach to what is called the Safe System approach, a data-driven, holistic, and equitable method to roadway safety, Richmond ex-

"It's based on an ethical position where it can never be acceptable that people are seriously injured or killed on the roadway network," Richmond said. "So, we have a scope with a consultant that's been furnished to us by MetroPlan Orlando, and these are the key tests. There are seven primary tests that will be followed to develop the city's plan."

The safety action plan's development and elements include an agency adoption of a Vision Zero resolution, public engagement, policy assessment, identification of projects and strategies, and a plan to measure progress.

Apopka's Vision Plan launched last month with a kickoff meeting on December 11, 2023, comprised of city staff, city partners, and a member of the public, Richmond said. Held in the Edward Bass Conference Room at Apopka City Hall, the meeting was not open to the public but intended for the working group that would guide the plan.

The city will start public engagement later this month, in which the city



Florida needs more physicians, entertainment tax changed

(The Center Square) -

A report by the Florida Legislature's research arm says Florida will need more physicians to deal with an aging population despite massive increases in tax dollars going to graduate medical education.

According to a report from the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability released in December, recent studies have estimated that Florida will have the second largest physician shortage by 2030 among all states. This comes despite Florida investing heavily into graduate medical education - using Medicaid funds — which have increased by 1,205 percent since 2013.

The report states that while there has been an increase in practicing physicians thanks to the state's investment into graduate medical education, demand is outstripping supply as Florida is one of the fastest-growing states in the U.S. and third largest by population, behind Texas and California.

State funding for graduate medical education has increased from \$80 million in fiscal year 2013-14 to \$718.4 million by fiscal year 2021-22, increasing the number of positions from 4,686 to 8,065. Researchers stated that physicians would often stay in the state where they completed their training, so increasing the number of available

According to the report, there are approximately 98.11 percent of all physicians working in urban counties, while only 1.89 percent work within Florida's 31 rural counties. The report further states that 34.17 percent or 19,396 physicians are 60 or older.

The Florida Legislature's research arm released a report documenting issues with some of the Sunshine State's economic development incentives and programs.

A review of Florida's entertainment industry incentives by the Office of Program Policy Analysis and Government Accountability showed that 1,409 production companies had reported spending an estimated \$1.3 billion on average. Companies also saved around \$22 million in sales tax, and 57 percent of production companies said the incentives affected their decision to work in Florida.

However, the passage of House Bill 5 in June repealed the Entertainment Industry Tax Credit. It was reported in February that the Entertainment Industry Financial Incentives program only returned approximately seven cents for every dollar spent.

VISIT FLORIDA, the official state-funded tourism marketing corporation reported that Florida's tourism employment grew by 21 percent or 278,540 employees between 2013 and 2022. Visitor numbers broke the previous 2019 record of 131.4 million visitors in 2022 by 5 percent, totaling 137.6 million international and domestic visitors. The watchdog agency noted that improvements could be made to enhance its evaluations of marketing activities, recommending the revision of internal measures to improve the organization's performance rather than maintaining already achieved targets and improving consumer awareness. A review of the Florida Sports Foundation found that it had met its contractual performance obligations and reported that sporting events that had received foundation grants had generated more than \$1.8 billion in economic activity and attracted more than 2.5 million domestic visitors from out of state.

The report recommended that strategies be implemented to increase physician retention rates. Florida lacks state-level planning that includes clear objectives and policy priorities, hindering the state's ability to track progress. It was further recommended that lawmakers direct the research agency to conduct periodic assessments of the graduate medical education system to enhance data collection and reliability.

A policy document from the Florida Hospital Association issued in August stated similar findings in its summary, projecting that the physician shortage could be 18,000 by 2035 and recommending that funding be increased for graduate medical education to address this growing issue.

The 2023 Florida Physician Workforce Annual Report states that most physicians are located in the more populous counties and within larger urban areas. Across the state, 35.82 percent of Florida's 67 counties have fewer than 10 physicians for every 10,000 people.


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Usable information can be gained from everyone we chance to meet


Our colleges today are

For 110 years, the Apopka Chamber has encouraged the community and businesses to patronize chamber members. This includes our local banks.

On December 6, 2023, Apopka City Commissioners passed a policy to move city investment funds out of local banks to use Zephyr Group | Morgan Stanley of Denver, Colorado for investment advisory (\$40,000), and has touted an increase in the city income at 1 million dollars in revenue, with an added increase in transparency.

Please note the timeline: Federal fund rates were 0.09% on August 31, 2021, 2.33% on August 31, 2022, and August 31, 2023, it was up to 5.37% with our local banks. The increase in interest rates, and

of the budget is the reason for any increase in revenue thus far, as funds haven't been moved yet.

the city's administration

Based on the Morgan Stanley investment program presentation that was accepted by council, the current investment account holdings are \$147,138,796.77. The portfolio plan reflects a money market allocation at 10% of the funds, which is nearly 15 million dollars. It is not a defined number, leaves room for adjusting the portfolio and doesn't specify the notification process for doing so. It also states that they will quantify risks in the banking system, specifically Florida regional and community banks. The disclaimer page states there is no guarantee that this investment strategy will work.

We know numbers hold NO bias or reframe history. Adopting a bid policy change increase from 3% to 10% for local bid preference and adopting a minority small business bid preference policy would go a long way for the business community and citizens of Apopka.

Guzmán López, one of the leaders of Los Chapitos, was extradited from Mexico to the United States in September to face trial for fentanyl trafficking.

As reported in a previous article by Federal Newswire, his expedited extradition is seen as a potential sign that law enforcement agencies in both countries are intensifying their efforts against fentanyl trafficking.

over 978,000 jobs and attracting more than 28 million visitors. The watchdog agency noted, however, that there is a lack of an oversight entity to ensure franchises comply with some statutory requirements.

The report states that Space Florida met its contractual obligations by collaborating with both private and public entities to grow the state's aerospace industry. This includes establishing 40 documented partnerships with nonprofit, public, and private entities.

Some stakeholders reported to the watchdog agency that the organization needed improvement regarding transparency and efficiency.

It was recommended that Space Florida consider working with the Department of Commerce to go beyond what has already been achieved and set more ambitious goals, and to work closely with stakeholders to enhance transparency in its operations.

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



According to Brochu in an interview with The Apopka Chief, one quote out of several given to her for a new driveway would be \$10,000. Even Cox Media Group volunteered to get the driveway done for free.

Last week, Brochu set up a GoFundMe fundraiser to raise money for a new driveway. Within days of the launch, the fundraiser raised \$13,543. Brochu closed the fundraiser to new donations.

Right now, Brochu said that she intends to get permits from the county for the company to install her driveway so she could proceed with selling her home.

"I would really like for the contractors who came to my house, who took out the concrete to just reach

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on money, so it would be nice if they would reach out and say who they are," Brochu said in the interview.

Brochu put her house on the market with the contingency on a new house that she would sell her current one.

About a week after she listed her house, strangers flocked to Brochu's house to measure her driveway, explaining that someone named Andre sent them at the request of his wife, the homeowner. Brochu was the homeowner and therefore never asked anyone to replace her driveway, so she contacted the OCSO on December 13, 2023. An OCSO deputy contacted Andre, who advised he mistakenly provided the wrong address and would correct it.





2 tablespoons olive oil 1 (4-1/2 pound) rolled boneless

pork loin roast

1. Heat oil in a heavy skillet over medium-high heat. Add roast; brown on all sides. Place roast in a roasting pan, and cool slightly. 1 tablespoon mustard seeds 3 tablespoons cracked black peppercorns or multicolored peppercorns

2. Combine mustard seeds and peppercorns in a heavy-duty, zip-top plastic freezer bag; seal. Crush spices with a meat mallet or rolling pin. 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour

- 2 teaspoons dried thyme 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- 1/4 cup butter, softened
- 2 tablespoons Dijon mustard

2 large russet potatoes 4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter

1 teaspoon chopped fresh parsley 1 clove garlic, finely minced Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

1. Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper (or use a nonstick baking sheet).

2. Cut the potatoes into 8 wedges each and arrange on the prepared baking sheet. Melt the butter over low heat, add the parsley and garlic and give the mixture a quick whisk. Brush the butter mixture over all sides of the potato wedges. Reserve the remaining butter mixture. Season all sides of the potato wedges with salt and pepper.


