Community honors 29 legends for Black History Month



The city of Apopka honored 29 legends – one individual for each day of this month – who have left a legacy in the community for the city's second annual Black History Month book project and event celebrating the legends

The Celebrating Legends of Apopka in Honor of Black History Month event took place at the Apopka Community Center/VFW Building on Tuesday, February 27.

Volume 2 of "Celebrating Legends of Apopka in Honor of Black History Month" was compiled by the Apopka Youth Council, the Apopka Museum, and the city of Apopka. Apopka Youth Council members read a biography of each individual at the event while a free book was given to the honoree's family.

"The people who we are honoring tonight, I knew. I grew up with this generation," said Francina Boykin, Apopka Historical Society vice president and local historian. "They were my leaders, they were my guides, and I learned a lot from them. I've taken that with me wherever I have gone, and I continue and I am who I am, I do what I do, and I love what I do. And that is documenting the very rich history of

this community."

Boykin discussed the history of the Apopka area as dating back to the first half of the 19th century, when the first slaves arrived from Georgia to the area and settled in the Rock Springs area, currently known as Kelly Park. These slaves belonged to Major William Delk, a plantation owner at Rock Springs.

Among the slaves that Delk eventually freed was Anthony Frazier, who became a landowner and Orange County road commissioner. Frazier was one of the Apopka legends honored in 2023. "I urge you to visit our local museum to get involved, and we are accountable to our history,"

Wildlife Drive is back open

The Lake Apopka Wildlife Drive is scheduled to reopen on Friday, March 1. The closure was a precautionary measure to ensure the safety of visitors.

Festival marks Wekiva Parkway's completion

The Florida Department of Transportation held a festival on Saturday, February 24, in Sorrento to commemorate the Wekiva Parkway's completion. The event featured a plaque dedication by government partners and community leaders.

Last weekend, hundreds of people helped celebrate the completion of the Wekiva Parkway – and Central Florida's beltway – at a community festival organized by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT).

FDOT held the festival on Saturday, February 24, at the Neighborhood Lakes Trailhead in Sorrento to thank government partners and the community for their contributions to the Wekiva Parkway vision and for their patience during construction.

The event highlighted the Wekiva Parkway's 10mile trail, with guided nature tours and organized bike rides. The trail enhances pedestrian and cyclist safety and makes it easier to get to the Lower Wekiva River State Preserve, Rock Springs Run State Reserve, Seminole State Forest, and Wekiwa Springs State Park.

The key theme touted by speakers during a ceremony at the event was the environmental stewardship that went into developing the much-needed Wekiva Parkway.

"Wekiva Parkway is a project that has been decades in the making and involved many thought leaders, collaborations with several agencies, and

Independent Voters must secure voting rights for primary elections

LetUsVote is launching across the country today, dedicated to organizing independent voters to stand up for their rights. Independent voters are the largest group of voters in America today, but they are treated like second-class citizens. They've been marginalized because they are unorganized. Until now.

- New Report Independent voters across 22 states challenge the conventional wisdom that they are just partisans in disguise.
- Independent voters are shut out of voting in primary elections across the country -state by state rules.
- Election Administration partisan by design. Independents cannot even work as poll workers or serve on election boards in almost every state! Our system is designed by partisans for partisans - leaving independents as second-class citizens.

LetUsVote is launching amid record-high registration for independents across the country, even as millions of independents are barred from voting in crucial primary elections. Gallup announced in January that independent identification is tied for an all-time high. 24 states bar independents from voting in presidential primaries altogether, and 15 states deny independents from voting in state and federal primary elections. Walkability is important for growth

I am reading two great books about walkability and new urbanism by Jeff Speck – "Walkable City: How Downtown Can Save America, One Step at a Time" and "Walkable City Rules: 101 Steps to Making Better Places.'

While most of my commission seat is located either in a municipality, suburban area, rural settlement, or corridors to blighted urban areas, I still believe the principles shared in these two books can make walkability a reality in our areas. Walking and biking on interesting streetscapes are beneficial for every citizen – a child

walking to school, a senior getting a bit of exercise, or even someone walking to

Author Jeff Speck says, "walkability is an end and a means." Walkability is useful as it contributes to urban vitality. Since the mid-century, most American cities have effectively become no-walking zones. Downtowns, according to Speck, have turned into places that are easy to reach, but not worth much once you get there. Outdated building codes, uninviting streetscape, and antisocial building styles have created public spaces that are unsafe, uncomfortable, and just plain boring.

What are his solutions for fixing the unwalkable conditions? Let's explore three of Jeff Speck's 101 ideas and apply them to portions of unincorporated District 2.

Idea 97: Rebuild or re-

Career training is important now

Last week, I wrote about the difficulty many students are having obtaining admission to our fouryear state universities. As expected, the acceptance rates for the University of Florida confirmed that once again many students did not receive the acceptance they were hoping for last

Friday. UF received over 70,000 applications this year; just three years ago it was 52,000. It's not surprising the application size is going up with the graduation rates in the state steadily increasing every year. dren of Florida residents in 2022.

It is becoming more and more important to expose our children to all the various pathways they have to explore other ways to have a successful future other than immediate admission to a four-year university.

Last week, I mentioned the very attractive path that begins at a local state college first and then transferring to a four-year university as a junior. This option is a great one that allows students to make a slower transition to college life with smaller classes and campuses to navigate.

However, an ever-increasing popular option is the abundance of career and technical programs that are available that students can take while they are in high school that prepare them for a career immediately after graduation or while attending college.

Students who pursue this path have numerous options provided by Orange Technical College (OTC). These classes are offered at the home schools as well as at our five Or-



Walt Disney's dream was for everyone to relive childhood memories

On Sunday July 17, 1955, in Anaheim, California, Disneyland opened its gates at 2:30 p.m. and Walt Disney himself christened his new 500-acre park with these words. "To all who come to this happy place: welcome. Disneyland is your land. Here age relives fond memories of the past...and here youth may savor the challenge and promise of the future. Disneyland is dedicated to the ideals, the dreams and the hard facts which have created America... with the



hope that it will be a source of joy and inspiration to all the world."

Disneyland was one of Walt's greatest dreams come true. He designed it and orchestrated the

construction of the park. Walt wanted a park where adults could relive childhood memories and children could lead the way. Because of the popularity and success of Disneyland, Walt and his brother Roy planned a similar park in Central Florida. In 1965, Walt and Roy announced their plans for a theme park and started purchasing enough property for their new park. Twenty-five square miles, to be exact.

Unfortunately, Walt

died two months later, leav-

ing Roy to be the one to set up what he named Disneyworld. If Walt were alive today to see what his family-oriented park has become, he would be flabbergasted. The deal about Dis-

neyworld being sovereign and setting up its own district (Reedy Creek) was an agreement between Walt Disney and Orange County. Reedy Creek was agreed to because of time saving, costly trips to Orange County for permits to construct and operate different

rides, buildings, and other structures that needed permits. Orange County and Reedy Creek were to cohabit that part of the state together and be in tune with what the state of Florida thought relevant to "family ideals, the dreams and hard facts which have created America," according to Walt's christening statement for Disneyland.

When Disneyworld reared its ugly "woke" ideals and made a huge statement about their involvement with the "woke" generation, it broke the bond of those ideals and dreams for a family-oriented, joyful place as an inspiration to the entire world. Governor Ron DeSantis stood up for the families of Florida and all those who bring their children to experience the magic of Disneyworld and started the process of bringing Reedy Creek once more under the authority of Orange County and the state of Florida.

Our governor is try-

countless discussions with residents and environmentalists," said Mike Heffinger Jr., FDOT District Five Director of Transportation Operations. "And the result of all of the combined hard work is a sprawling 25-mile roadway that completes Central Florida's beltway, but more importantly honors the natural treasures and wildlife found throughout."

The FDOT developed the \$1.6-billion parkway as a joint venture with the Central Florida Express-

way Authority. Florida's Turnpike Enterprise oversees the toll operations on the FDOT sections. The last section of the 25-mile Wekiva Parkway opened on January 27, making the final connection between State Road (S.R.) 429, S.R. 417, and Interstate 4 (I-4).

The parkway completed what is now a 100-plusmile beltway around the region, while helping to protect the natural resources along the Wekiva River.

The completion of the

PHMSA Environmental Review Notice of Availability

In cooperation with the Lake Apopka Natural Gas District, Orange County, Florida, the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA), has prepared a Tier 2 Environmental Assessment (EA), as required by the National Environmental Policy of 1969, for the proposed replacement of approximately 13.13 miles of vintage steel and vintage plastic polyethylene (PE) pipe in multiple areas of the system with modern polyethylene pipe. PHMSA published a Tier 1 Nation-wide EA for the Natural Gas Distribution Infrastructure Safety and Modernization Grant Program (NGDISM) on November 9, 2022. The stated purpose of NGDISM is for municipality or community owned utilities to repair, rehabilitate, or replace its natural gas distribution pipeline system or portions thereof or to acquire equipment to (1) reduce incidents and fatalities and (2) avoid economic losses by providing grant opportunities to municipality or community owned utilities. The Tier 1 EA is available at https://www.phmsa.dot.gov/sites/phmsa.dot.gov/ files/2023-07/Tier-1-PHMSA-2022-0123-0001.pdf. The Tier 2 EA is available for review and comment on the web at https:// www.phmsa.dot.gov/about-phmsa/working-phmsa/grants/pipeline/tier-2-site-specific-environmental-documents and a copy is available at Lake Apopka Natural Gas District, 1320 Winter Garden Vineland Road, Winter Garden, FL 3478. Please submit all comments to: PHMSABILGrantNEPAComments@ dot.gov and reference NGDISM-FY22-EA-2023-20 in your response. Pursuant to the National Historic Preservation Act, PHMSA has issued a No Historic Properties Affected finding which is available for review in the Tier 2 EA. Comments on the Tier 2 EA are due by March 11, 2024.



ange Technical campuses throughout Orange County.

At Apopka and Wekiva High Schools, students can dual enroll with OTC, meaning they start their day at their home school and ride the bus to the OTC West, South or Main campus for courses. Dual enrollment programs available include: Building Construction Technology, Carpentry, Electricity, HVAC/ Refrigeration, Plumbing and Welding Technology, 3-D Animation Technology, Automotive Collision and Service Technologies, Digital Cinema Production, Digital Media Design, Hotel and Resort Business Management, Modeling Simulation Design, Pharmacy Technician, Medical Assisting and many others.

If you haven't checked recently, these are very well-paid lines of work these days as the trade industries are desperate for new hires.

For example, welders can enter the field making \$80,000 a year. Students graduate from these programs with industry certification ready to work in these high-demand fields. Remember: that is without a college education debt to pay back.

Students don't even have to leave their high school campus to get these great training courses. OCPS has worked hard to bring back these CTE (Career Technical Education) classes to our high school

campuses because the demand is so high for these programs and the trained workers they produce within our community.

Apopka High School offers the following CTE classes on its campus: Agritechnology, Animal Science and Services, Horticulture Science and Services, Digital Photography, Digital Video Technology, Accounting Applications, Business Management and Analysis, Early Childhood Education, Applied Robotics, Engineering Pathways, Biomedical Sciences, Fundamental Foodservice Skills, Entrepreneurship, Diesel Systems Technician.

Next year, they will be bringing Building Construction Technologies to the campus as well, and

we are very excited for this program to be offered at Apopka High School.

Wekiva High School offers many CTE courses, as well. Those include Agritechnology, Animal Science and Services, Agriculture, four different Digital Video Technology classes, various Engineering Pathways courses, several

Culinary Arts and Hospitality and Tourism courses as well as Entrepreneurship.

Next year, the school will be adding more Hospitality and Tourism Management courses and additional Entrepreneurship courses. They are also very excited to bring Medical Assisting to the campus which will provide another great career option for our

stripe wide roadways.

This was completed in 2010 in Lancaster, California, creating a \$282-million impact. They spent only \$11.2 million retrofitting their main street. The effort doubled pedestrian activity, reduced injury crashes by 49 percent, pedestrian crashes by 78 percent and led to 57 new businesses opening. It also provided more than 800 new housing units and created around 2,000 jobs. All I can say is, WOW! What did they do? They restriped the fourlane roadway and created a beautiful on-street parking area in the middle of the road. This could work on Park Avenue in Apopka.

Idea 100: Don't give up on sprawl, or retrofitting suburbia.

This idea has many potential applications in District 2. The author describes the "monotony of sprawl." That is what our people organizations are endeavoring to eradicate this year through a new contest, "The Most Creative Corridor." Thus far, People of Lockhart are preparing

blighted fencing for students to paint an extravaganza of roses on Rose Avenue. People of Wekiwa Springs are working with supportive subdivisions to create more interest. Chelsea Ridge is planting jasmine to jazz up their pond. Sweetwater will be wrapping trees in beautiful solar, rope lighting. Majestic Oaks will create a rock garden respite under a large oak tree.

I'll be adding decorative cups on county pond fencing with a \$50 investment. None of this needs to be expensive. The idea is to create interest and break up the monotony of suburbia while enticing walkers to core areas for a cup of coffee, ice cream, drink, or even watching a movie. We just want happy, healthy, walkable communities.

Idea 101: Dream big,

The author lists projects in Chicago and Michigan that have built large parks and transit options. Mayor Daley in Chicago constructed the \$200-million Millennium Park in the early 2000s. Within 10 years, the city saw \$3 billion invested in new private construction near the park, which incidentally now attracts five million visitors annually.


Another example in the book is Grand Rapids, Michigan. After the secret service wouldn't allow a parade in the downtown for President Gerald Ford due to so many empty spaces, local business owners pledged to move operations downtown. They also built a new arena and convention center. A medical school and several hotels followed shortly thereafter. Before long, Grand Rapids enjoys one of the healthiest downtowns in the entire Midwest.

Time permitting, I will discuss more ideas from the "Walkable City" books by Jeff Speck. I hope you are inspired and join one of the three exciting groups implementing these ideas: People of Lockhart, People of Wekiwa Springs, People of Clarcona-Ocoee, and soon the People of Southern Apopka.

Together, we can make our communities more livable, walkable, and the best they can be.

beltway means added convenience for area residents, businesses, and visitors. Previously opened sections of the parkway are seeing more than 21,000 vehicles a day, making travel easier and reducing commute times. The public's right to know cannot be abandoned in favor of cost savings that are elusive.

Consider that less than 10% of U.S. citizens view a government web site daily, according to the U.S. Census Bureau. This contrasts dramatically with the percentage of adults who read a community newspaper every week, according to the National Newspaper Association.

Furthermore, a public notice printed in the newspaper produces a permanent record. A newspaper is archived for years, and is not subject to computer crashes and hackers.

Newspapers are easily verifiable, fully transparent and represent an impartial third party. Giving government singular responsibility for distributing public notices is like putting the fox in charge of the hen house.

Newspapers are your watchdogs. Keep it that way. Contact your government officials and voice your opinion about publication of the public notices.




