OCPS leaders discuss district's progress in State of Schools

Orange County School Board Chair Teresa Jacobs and Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) Superintendent Dr. Maria Vazquez discussed the district's progress of ongoing programs as well as strategy, goals, budget, continuation of the half-cent sales tax and new initiatives while touching on the district's performance and impact on Orange County.

Even though Vazquez has been OCPS superintendent for two full school years now, this was the first time both women shared the delivery of the 2024 State of the Schools address, which took place on Monday, June 3, at Edgewater High School in Orlando.

succeeded Dr. Barbara Jenkins, who

retired after 10 years as superintendent.

Jacobs said she first met Vazquez over 25 years ago, when Vazquez was the assistant principal of an elementary school Jacobs' children was attending.

"I was an engaged and, I guess you could say 'a vocal parent," Jacobs said to Vazquez during the address. "But I quickly gained appreciation for your transparency and openness, and your ability to build relationships through trust and communication."

City Council unanimously approves several developments

Under business items of the Wednesday, June 5, meeting agenda, the City Council voted unanimously, 5-0 on the following items: Kelly Park multifamily phase 3 plat, the Marshall Lake Business Center major development plan, and the major development plan for the Plymouth Sorrento Apartments.

Kelly Park multi-family phase 3 plat

The Kelly Park multi-

family phase 3 plat is approximately 150-acre tract located on the northwest corner of Waypointe Boulevard and Kelly Park Road. This plat would combine parcels and create three lots, roads and other infrastructure required for the construction of a multifamily development.

This plat also serves to establish portions of Airy Spring Street, Fresh Flower Street, and Rainy Woods Street rights-of-ways to support the expansion of and connectivity within the Crossroads at Kelly Park development.

The plat is consistent with the major development plan for the Crossroads at Kelly Park phase 3 multi-family tract MF-P2-1. The City Council approved that major development plan on May 3, 2023.

The plat is also consistent with the construction site plan that the Development Review Committee approved on June 15, 2023.

Marshall Lake Business

A major development plan was submitted for consideration for the Marshall Lake Business Center, consisting of six buildings totaling 43,900 square feet in area that are comprised of office/warehouse and self-storage uses. Located at 780 Marshall Lake Road, the 6.43-acre property has an Industrial future

zoning designation of I-L (Light Industrial).

Plymouth Sorrento **Apartments**

The major development plan for the Plymouth Sorrento Apartments proposes to construct 242 multifamily units with a density of 18.55 dwelling units per acre. This proposed multifamily development serves as a transition from the commercially intensive

land use designation and a uses along U.S. 441 and adjacent to S.R. 429 to the existing single-family uses east of Plymouth Sorrento Road, according to city

documents. The Plymouth Sorrento Apartments planned development is a consolidation of two parcels, totaling approximately 13.04 acres, located west of Plymouth Sorrento Road, north of U.S. 441 and east of S.R.

Bracy challenges Thompson on district residency

Former Senator Randolph Bracy III intends to file a lawsuit against Senator Geraldine F. Thompson, challenging her legal residency and therefore her qualification to run in the upcoming State Senate District 15 primary and general elections.

Bracy called for a news conference at the Orange County Administration Building in Orlando on Wednesday, June 5. Thompson was there to give comments. This year, Bracy and Thompson are running for State Senate District 15, which encom-

passes northwest Orange County including Apopka.

According to the draft copy of the lawsuit provided by Bracy, he is suing Thompson "for declaratory judgement, seeking relief in various forms, most notably injunction relief regarding Thompson's illegal qualification as a candidate for The State of Florida Senate District 15 in the upcoming Primary Election on August 20, 2024, and the General Election held on November 5, 2024."

The lawsuit draft states that Thompson purchased Windermere home in October 1988, and the house has had an approved homestead exemption for many years with the Orange County Property Ap-

Bracy denied filing the lawsuit for any personal reason, but rather because it's about the truth. He alleges that Thompson owns one home that isn't in the district and she doesn't lease any property. Bracy said he owns numerous homes, but his homestead residence is in the district where he lives.

"Our leaders should lead with the truth, guiding this community to become their best selves so that they and we together can overcome obstacles and reach

Water safety reminders are necessary at this time of year

ORMOND BEACH, Fla.—

Today, Lieutenant Governor Jeanette Nuñez, Secretary of the Department of Children and Families (DCF) Shevaun Harris, State Surgeon General Dr. Joseph Ladapo, and Agency for Persons with Disabilities Director Taylor Hatch highlighted resources, education, and tips for water safety and drowning prevention.

"Governor Ron DeSantis and I know that Florida is the best place to be year-round, but especially in the summer," said Lieutenant Governor Jeanette Nuñez. "As Floridians and their families go outdoors to enjoy all that the Sunshine State has to offer, we want to make sure they do it in a way that is safe and enjoyable. As a result, it's important that we bring awareness to water safety and share things that families can do to prevent drowning and water-related injuries."

"The Department of Children and Families is committed to ensuring the well-being of all children and families and as we kick off a fun summer season, it is vital that children, parents, and caregivers exercise safe swimming practices," said DCF Secretary Shevaun Harris. "Sadly, we continue to see an increase in the number of preventable drownings across our state, and this summer and all year long, DCF is encouraging all Floridians to ensure that water safety measures are in place near any bodies of water."

Drowning can be prevented. The State of Florida collaborates with numerous state and local partners to provide education, tips, and resources on water safety and drowning prevention.

Here are some important steps you can take to ensure safety around the water: Always supervise children in and around water; Consider participating in


swim lessons; Learn CPR and first aid; Ensure that pool barriers and gates meet state law requirements; Follow life jacket laws and make sure life jackets are properly fitted; Check local conditions, such as weather, rip tides, and marine life before heading out to the water.

"Drowning can be silent and happen in the amount of time it takes to check a text on your phone," said State Surgeon General Dr. Joseph Ladapo. "By designating a Water Watcher and using barriers such as a fence, you can protect your children while safely enjoying activities at the pool and beach this summer."

"Florida's natural climate creates many enjoyable recreational opportunities centered around water, and that is why today'event is critical to amplifying the message of water safety for all Floridians," said Agency for Persons with Disabilities Director Taylor Hatch. "Some individuals with disabilities, such as those with autism spectrum disorder, are attracted to water's sensory impact. Therefore, it's critical to share proven steps that we can all take to promote water safety, minimize risk, and encourage enjoyable experiences."

In 2024, 46 children have tragically drowned in Florida. The majority of these incidents occurred in swimming pools, with 76.3% happening during non-swim times when a child is not expected to be in or near water. Let's work together to raise awareness about water safety and prevent such heartbreaking accidents.

Secondly, we went across the street to trim trees. Once we began, we exposed three homeless camps. Good grief. When you don't trim up your large trees, when weeds get over 18 inches, and hedges over three feet – this is what you get. We must be our brothers' keepers. Let's be considerate of what our lack of maintenance does to our neighbors. A nice elderly man for whom I'm concerned lives next door to these camps. We are contacting the owner to post No Trespassing signs and the Orange County Sheriff's Office to remove any more squatters. I would be remiss if I didn't mention that we must continue to work on building a homeless shelter so there are better options for the unsheltered.



our true potential," Bracy said. "But leaders can't lead in that way if they're in denial themselves. We've got to lead in a new way. Our prosperity, our happiness, our very lives depend on it."

Bracy was the Florida House District 45 representative from 2012 to 2016. He was State Senator for District 11 from 2016 to 2022. Thompson succeeds Bracy in this office and is the incumbent.

Thompson previously represented Florida House District 44 from 2018 to 2022, the State Senate from 2012 to 2016. and three terms in the Florida House from 2006 to 2012.

Thompson admitted she and her husband have owned their Windermere home since 1988. Although her home's information including the address is public record, she asked the media not to publish the address to protect her family because her husband is a judge.

Thompson alleged that Bracy filed the lawsuit out of personal retaliation: "The reason that we're here, as far as I can determine, is that the former senator unsuccessfully pursued a romantic relationship with a member of my family, and he now wants

to put my family in danger, in jeopardy."

Thompson has lived in the district longer than Bracy has been alive; the area underwent some redistricting over the years. Although she occasionally entertains at her Windermere home, most of the time she now lives in Ocoee with her daughter and two-year-old twin granddaughters to help take care of the girls.

Bracy attended the Thompsons' recommitment ceremony that his father, Rev. Randolph Bracy Jr., presided over. Bracy Jr. also presided over Thompson's twin grandchildren's dedication ceremony, Thompson pointed out.

"He (Bracy III) is someone that I've known, someone that I've cared about all of his life, and it pains me that he has veered into a direction that is troubling and very upsetting," Thompson said.

As to whether the lawsuit Bracy intends to file is personal, he called that "ridiculous" and that he's "happily married to my wife."

Bracy will consider when to file the lawsuit after qualifying for the election, he said. He also mentioned it's possible for him and Thompson to talk and reach a resolution without filing a lawsuit.





As I wrote to home-owners, the next step to take if we want to be successful, requires their participation. I follow law enforcement guidelines known as CPTED. They are best practices to keep people safe in their homes.

Number one is picking up trash. Criminals are attracted to areas where it looks

like people don't care or are unengaged. Second is trimming large tree limbs up

and hedges down. Third, law enforcement recommends adding lighting to your home and property. Small solar lighting is relatively inexpensive and readily available.

I will reprint this list of ideas which works in any community. I joke that too many folks hide behind weeds. There is some truth to this, however. Using a weed whacker to keep grasses down under 12 inches throughout the entire property, including the fence line, is vital.

Following is my list of recommendations, one more time.

Things to do to avoid crime and homeless activity: Lower all hedges to under 3 feet; hire a tree company to raise large tree canopies over 10 ft; reduce the amount of tall weeds on the property; trim vegetation over fence lines so the fence can clearly be seen; use a weed killer to keep grasses down on fence lines; place "No trespassing signs on the property".

I hope you implement these recommendations and join me in making all of District 2 safe and prosperous.

The properties have a future land use designation of HDR-25 (High Density Residential), permitting up to 25 dwelling units per acre, and is located within a PD (Planned Development) Zoning District. The PD was established with the adoption of Ordinance Number 3038 on January 3, 2024.

Board reappointment

The City Council voted unanimously to reappoint Benjamin "Butch" Stanley to a three-year term on the Apopka Planning Commission.

Stanley was originally appointed to the Planning Commission on June 6, 2018, and was reappointed on June 16, 2021. His current term expires on June 16, 2024.

Stanley has indicated he would like to be reappointed, according to a city staff report in the June 5 City Council meeting agenda packet.

The city's Planning Commission was established as a citizen board to review and recommend to the City Council. The commission approves or denies developement plans, zoning

map amendments, land development code amendments, proposed subdivision plats, proposed site plans, and future land use map amendments.

The Planning Commission is comprised of seven members appointed by the mayor and approved by the City Council. Members are appointed to three-year terms and must live within the city limits.

The Planning Commission meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. in the Council Chamber of Apopka City Hall.

United States flag's design began with a resolution on June 14, 1777



That the flag of the United States shall be of thirteen stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white in a blue field, representing the new constellation.

This was the resolution adopted by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777. The resolution was made following the report of a special committee which had been assigned to suggest the flag's design.

A flag of this design

on September 11, 1777, in the Battle of the Brandywine. The American flag was first saluted by foreign naval vessels on February 14, 1778, when the Ranger, bearing the Stars and Stripes and under the command of Captain Paul Jones, arrived in a French port. The flag first flew over a foreign territory in early 1778 at Nassau, Bahama Islands, where Americans captured a British fort.

Observance of the adoption of the flag was not soon in coming, however. Although there are many claims to the first official observance of Flag Day, all but one took place more than an entire century after the flag's adoption in 1777.

The first claim was was first carried into battle from a Hartford, Conn.,

celebration during the first summer of 1861.

In the late 1800s, schools all over the United States held Flag Day programs to contribute to the Americanization of immigrant children, and the observance caught on with individual communities.

The most recognized claim, however, comes from New York. On June 14, 1889, Professor George Bolch, principal of a free kindergarten for the poor of New York City, had his school hold patriotic ceremonies to observe the anniversary of the Flag Dayresolution.

This initiative attracted attention from the State Department of Education, which arranged to have the day observed in all public

schools thereafter.

Soon the state legislature passed a law making it the responsibility of the state superintendent of public schools to ensure that schools hold observances for Lincoln's Birthday, Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day and Flag Day. In 1897, the governor of New York ordered the displaying of the flag over all public buildings in the state, an observance considered by some to be the first official recognition of the anniversary of the adoption of the flag outside of schools.

Another claim comes from Philadelphia. In 1893, the Society of Colonial Dames succeeded in getting a resolution passed to have the flag displayed

on all of the city's public buildings. Elizabeth Duane Gillespie, a direct descendant of Benjamin Franklin and the president of the Colonial Dames of Pennsylvania, that same year tried to get the city to call June 14 Flag Day. Resolutions by women were not granted much notice, however, and it was not until May 7, 1937, that Pennsylvania became the first state to establish the June 14 Flag Day as a legal holiday. Flag Day is a nationwide observance today, but Pennsylvania is the only state that recognizes it as a legal holiday.

Bernard J. Cigrand, a school teacher in Waubeka, Wisconsin, reportedly spent years trying to get Congress to declare June 14 as a national holi-

day. Although his attempts failed, the day was widely observed. "Father of Flag Day" honors have been given to William T. Kerr, who was credited with founding the American Flag Day Association in 1888 while still a schoolboy in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

Both President Wilson, in 1916, and President Coolidge, in 1927, issued proclamations asking for June 14 to be observed as the National Flag Day. But it wasn't until August 3,1949, that Congress approved the national observance, and President Harry Truman signed it into law.

As the eighth-largest school district in the nation and fourth largest in the state of Florida, OCPS serves students from 199 countries who speak 174 different languages and dialects.

Accomplishments

Last December, the Florida Department of Education released the 2022-23 school grades. Vazquez pointed out that the number of "A" rated traditional schools continues to rise, with 77 earning that distinction in 2022-23 compared to 60 the previous year; 99.5 percent of OCPS traditional schools earned an "A," "B" or "C" grade this year.

In 2000, the OCPS graduation rate was less than 50 percent, compared to 2022-23 school year when the OCPS graduation rate among the district's traditional high schools was 95.5 percent. Including charters and alternative schools, the graduation rate was 89.1 percent, also exceeding the state average, Jacobs said.

This year OCPS had 122 Super Scholars, graduating seniors who were accepted into the nation's top colleges and universities as ranked by U.S. News & World Report or received appointments to militaryservice academies.

OCPS also had 54 Career and Technical Education (CTE) Scholars, students who are completing the Orange Technical College Dual Enrollment Program, earned credit in five or more advanced courses and earned a weighted GPA of 4.0 or higher.

Districtwide, 164 graduating seniors earned an OCPS diploma along with an associate's degree from Valencia College.

For the eighth consecutive year, OCPS was recognized as one of the Best Communities for Music Education in the United States. Awarded by The National Association of Music Merchants Foundation, this designation acknowledges the district's devotion to and support for music edu-

Half-cent sales tax referendum

Vazquez and Jacobs is asking residents to support renewing the half-cent sales tax for another 10 years, a referendum that, if voter approved this November will go toward school construction and renovation. Without this sales tax's continuation, OCPS will be \$4 billion short in meeting the district's needs, Jacobs

Voters previously approved the half-cent sales tax in 2002 and 2014.

The capacity of OCPS permanent facilities was so far behind district growth that over 3,000 portable classrooms were in use across the district, according to Jacobs. Since 2002, the sales tax has helped fund the renovation or replacement of 136 schools, reducing portables by 75

Many mechanical systems in OCPS schools have a life cycle of about 20 years, which means things like the roof and air conditioning in many schools will need to be replaced or upgraded less than 10

years from now, Vazquez explained. Since 2014, the half-cent sales tax has fully funded renovations and new construction. Districts no longer receive money from the state for capital renewal needs or new con-

For example, the new schools built at the beginning of the sales tax are now due for new roofs. In fact, 75 OCPS schools will be at least 25 years old by 2035. Capital needs for the next 10 years are estimated at \$8.9 billion dollars including additional new schools that must be constructed to accommodate the accelerating growth in areas like Lake Nona, Horizon West and Apopka, according to Vazquez.

While voters will get to decide if the tax is renewed, it's tourists and non-residents who pay over 50 percent of the sales tax revenue, according to Ja-

Challenges

As OCPS had its achievements so it faced challenges too, such as addressing educator and bus driver shortage and the sunsetting of a federal fund for the district.

The district has been pouring its effort into recruiting new teachers using methods such as a paraprofessional-to-teacher pipeline, future apprenticeship programs and alternative certification options.

OCPS also supports state efforts to expand teacher preparation options, including a new bachelor's degree program in elementary education that will be coming to Valencia Col-

"In order to retain and recruit teachers, OCPS has been committed to using every available dollar to raise salaries. This year we were proud to provide a historic average 9 percent raise to teachers, principals and staff members," Jacobs

Regarding the shortage of bus drivers - which nationwide - Orange County was about 100 drivers short. That meant some drivers were making two trips to schools, and students experienced inconsistent or delayed routes, according to Vazquez.

OCPS has been working on solutions to overcome this challenge such as bonuses for safe driving and attendance, but this was met with some competition because there are many Central Florida employment options in forprofit tourism and delivery sectors.

Come this September, the federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESS-ER) will sunset, leaving the district with a \$27-milliion budget gap, according to Jacobs.

The ESSER has helped school districts during and following the pandemic by supporting the staffing of the district's many positions including Exceptional Student Education services, student services and mental health, nurses, and additional interventionists or classroom supports.

The ESSER also allowed OCPS to implement technology and programs that have helped students recover from learning losses in core subjects.







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The Miracle of Existance

I have addressed the miracle of existence in my writings many times over the years, and not because I lack new topics worth addressing, but because at various times in my life it strikes me as extremely important—perhaps the most important or basic issue of our very being-but also because at different times in my life

I see the issue differently. The miracle of existence can be thought of both generally, and specifically (or individually). That is, in general, why does the world exist, and exist in the form in which it does?

As the philosopher Leibniz asked, "Why is there something rather than nothing?" This is perhaps the most fundamental metaphysical question.

But we can also wonder about our own existence. That is, why do I exist, and why in exactly the way I now exist? And will

I continue to exist after my death?

We must confess that we really don't know the answer to any of these questions. We can be certain that we do indeed exist, but we really don't know why, at least on a metaphysical level, and we certainly don't know what our existence will be like after death, or even if we will continue to

And for all you okra lovers, Okra Creole is from Southern Living All-Time Favorites. Fry up some bacon, drain it, crumble it all up and set it aside. You use frozen okra for this recipe and combine canned diced tomatoes, corn, onions, and seasonings and cook it in the bacon drippings and a little water for 15 minutes or so. Serve this lovely stuff over rice and top it with crumbled bacon.

We have a recipe from reader Sally Benton for Pimento Cheese Spread. She said, "We are absolutely hooked on it over here in the Melbourne area." Well, that's a good enough recommendation for me to try it!

Mrs. Meggett says, "I learned how to make this pineapple dish at the Dodge House. But I made it my own by creating my own brown sugar crust, the real star of this dessert. Pineapple upside-down cakes can be found throughout the American South, but my cake is one of the lightest and perfectly sweet versions in South Carolina. 3 ounces cream cheese

1) Drain juice from both jars of diced pimentos into a measuring cup. It will measure one half-cup. To simplify measuring the mayonnaise, add it to the measuring cup until it fills up to one full cup. 2) Pour mixture into a larger bowl. 3) Add three ounces room-temperature cream cheese to the mixture. Whip it up with a stick blender or hand mixer. 4) Add one jar of the drained pimentos and whip it in. 5) Gently fold in the grated block of cheese along with the other jar of diced pimentos.

It is a pretty wet mixture at first, but if you put the bowl in the refrigerator, the cheese will soak up the liquid after a few hours. It becomes a nicely spreadable concoction.

EMILY MEGGETT'S PINEAPPLE UPSIDE-DOWN CAKE Recipe from Gullah Geechee Home

For the crust: 1 cup packed brown sugar

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) unsalted butter, melted 1 20-ounce can pineapple slices

1/2 10-ounce jar maraschino cherries, drained

- 3/4 cup (1-1/2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened
- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 2-1/2 cups cake flour, preferably Swans Down
- 2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt

1) Preheat the oven to 350 deg Fahrenheit. 2) Make the crust: In a medium mixing bowl, combine the brown sugar and butter. Using a spoon, press the mixture into the bottom of a 10-inch round cake pan, ensuring that the bottom is fully covered. 3) Open the pineapple can. Drain the pineapple juice from pineapples, saving the pineapple juice. Place the pineapple rings on the brown sugar mixture in an arrangement of your liking. Place a cherry in the center of each pineapple ring. 4) Make the cake batter: In a large mixing bowl, using an electric mixer, beat all the ingredients and 1/3-cup of the reserved pineapple juice together. Once combined, pour the mixture over the pineapple. 5) Bake the cake for 45 minutes, or until done - an inserted toothpick should be clean when removed. 6) Remove the cake from the oven and allow it to cool completely.

Once cooled, turn the cake upside down onto a cake plate. You will get to see your pineapple and cherries on the top. Slice and serve with whipped cream, if you'd like.






