The Apopka City Council decided to table setting the city's 2024-25 millage rate for the Wednesday, July 17, regular

### City downtown brought up as concern for FY25 funding

The city is considering setting aside funds in the fiscal year 2025 budget for a downtown revitalization program, while the city is searching for a new community development director – who will also serve as the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) District director - following the previous one's retire-

At the first of three budget workshops for the fiscal year 2025 city budget on Monday, July 8, City Commissioner Nick Nesta suggested tentatively putting a line item for \$50,000 in community development

for Main Street Apopka in the fiscal year 2025 budget and moving that around as needed "because it looks like they're underspending in that department this year by \$700,000."

Main Street Apopka is a revitalization program dedicated to building a strong economic foundation for downtown Apopka's business district. The program is based on Main Street America, a federal program that has been helping strengthen and reenergize downtowns and neighborhood commercial

Nesta said he wanted to make sure the city has been allocating funds to Main Street Apopka so that

no special budget amendment is needed for this in the future.

The request for a Main Street Apopka budget allocation hasn't been approved yet due to an ongoing review of a service agreement that the city has been working on, according to Michelle Boylan, city economic development

Boylan explained that the city would need to identify the appropriate budget for the Main Street Apopka funds to come from as well as other details such as who would be responsible for the oversight of the contract, and who would col-

### **Future education may** change to training system

At the numerous presentations I give during the year, I am frequently asked this question: What is the most important issue facing the country? Since I know the question is coming, I'm always thinking about it. Also, since I've been making public presentations for almost half a century, my answer has often changed.

What is my current answer? I think the most prominent issue today is ensuring we have a training system in place that qualifies workers to perform the tasks needed in the future.

Notice the words I've chosen. I used "training system" instead of "education" to emphasize that there are ways of learning skills in addition to formal education programs.

Also, recognize I used the word "tasks" rather than "jobs" or "careers." This, too, was on purpose. As I will explain, many experts think modern technology will eventually divide many jobs into tasks done by machines and tasks performed by people.

The major reason I assert our training system for the tasks of the future is our most pressing issue is because I think both key components of my statement, training and tasks, are facing pressure to change. Consider the formal educational system, which dominates today's broader training system. Many K-12 schools are struggling to recover from the educational losses suffered during COVID. Also, many K-12 schools are still trying to find educational methods and tools that can achieve success for all students.

At the higher education level, the two big issues are relevance and cost. Recently, more employers — one survey found half — have concluded college degrees are no longer needed for many jobs. At the same time, the surge in college tuition and accompanying student debt are putting higher education out of reach for many young peo-

While questions about training are being asked, technological developments appear poised to change the nature of work in a dramatic way. Of course, this is not new. Beginning at least 300 years ago, the creation of machinery and new tools changed what workers did.

The most recent version of this was the development of the computer. I've had a front-row seat to watch the

implementation of the computer in numerous jobs, including mine as a college professor.

But many observers say the next phase, artificial intelligence, will generate impacts we've never seen before. The new and unique impact of AI is that it will be able to accomplish cognitive tasks, something that up to now, only humans have been able to do.

The conclusion is the workplace will be shaken up like never before. There will be a re-sorting of the work tasks humans do and the work tasks that technology — specifically AI will do. For people, this means a big change in the training we will need for the redesigned human tasks.

This is why I believe understanding the restructuring of workplace tasks and the necessary training for humans to do those tasks pose our most important future challenge.

It shouldn't be surprising that there are pessimists and optimists about our ability to succeed with this challenge. Some pessimists see traditional technology combined with AI ultimately performing most of the work tasks needed in the economy. Hence, there will be little work left for humans. As a result, most households would need to be supported with public financial payments. Education and training would be confined to teaching people how to enjoy life and pursue hobbies. While some may consider this result desirable, pessimists argue such a lifestyle would leave a void of purpose that most humans need.

The optimists think human work will not disappear, but it will be very different. Perhaps ironically, many optimists predict the very technology generating the job disruption, AI, could be used to quickly train workers for new tasks.

How would this happen? One idea is using AI to create personalized learning instructors for students, potentially for all levels of education. The AI tutor would use information about the student's academic strengths and weaknesses to develop customized learning programs implemented at a pace specifically for the student. Rather than a one-size fits-all method of teaching, the AI tutor would be the ultimate in a "specific size for each student" approach.



In Apopka, the CRA director position resides within the community development director position. Before his retirement last spring, Jim Hitt, the previous city community development director, also served as the CRA director.

According to Jacob Smith, city administrator, the city is approaching the end of the recruitment process and waiting to hear from the recruiter. The city is also using the job recruiter to find a candidate to fill the community development director position.

In the meantime, the community development director duties are delegated to city planner Bobby Howell, according to Jacob

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Smith, city administrator.

Velazquez brought up how before Hitt left, there were approvals of some CRA district projects. According to Radley Williams, city parks and recreation director, two CRA projects have begun: the skate park/pump track, for which its design had begun; and the Downtown Apopka Trail, which went out to bid

on Sunday, July 7. The wayfinding signage is a CRA project too, but public service is handling that, not parks and recreation. The city is finalizing two different contracts for the project, one for the sign itself, and the other for the cement base to install the sign, according to Mayor Bryan Nelson.

Amira Melnichenko, Main Street Apopka

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advisory board member, Apopka Youth Works prothanked Nesta for bringing up Main Street Apopka "because it's incredibly important that we get on this budget," she said.

Melnichenko plained Main Street Apopka has raised money on its own thanks to local sponsors, donations and more, but the bulk of the Main Street Apopka launch would come from the city: "Essentially the big bulk of getting (the Main Street program) started is to get funds from your city. Then after the city funds are in, we can start applying for other grants, show that our community has skin in the game essentially for us to move forward. It's really important that we get these funds sooner than later. That's what I'm here to stress."

#### Administrative budget

The first budget workshop, which occurred on Monday, July 8, covered administrative, legal services, city clerk, human resources, community development, and economic development budget.

The city administration budget consists of the mayor's budget, the city administrator, and special assessments. This budget saw an increase of about 1.10 percent overall for special assessments; the mayor's budget, 8.51 percent; and the city administrator's budget, 2.97 percent, according to Blanche Sherman, city finance director.

The 8.51 percent increase for the mayor's budget was primarily due to the transfer of \$42,200 for the

gram from the finance budget to the mayor's budget. There was also a slight increase in office supplies, operating supplies, and membership fees for various organizations, Sherman

The administrative services budget increased about 2.97 percent, which was primarily related to travel and training for a new city administrator in the amount of \$5,300.

The city's special assessment budget's increases were related to the increases in street light fees, repairs, and maintenance for various properties.

In regard to legal services, the city clerk, and the human resource budgets, the city saw some slight increases and decreases, Sherman said.

The city legal services budget increased 44.71 percent because the city has been adding funds to cover legal fees. This is over and above the amount for the salaries and wages for an inhouse city attorney. So, the city is adding an additional \$336,000 for that; labor attorney for \$60,000; collective bargaining, \$10,000; and a position recruiter for \$25,000, Sherman said.

The city clerk's office budget increased about 24.87 percent due to the new staff transferring into that department. Some of the old staff has left the city, Sherman said.

Human resource budget went down 74.07 percent. The city included a 2.7 percent contingency





We are required by state law to provide transportation to all students who live more than two miles from their home school, but the funding received from the state covers less than half of what is needed and it is not keeping up with the cost of inflation.

I'm not exaggerating here. Here are the numbers:

\*In Fiscal Year 2020, transportation expenses were \$60,815,524, categorical revenue from the state

was \$30,180,510; fifty percent of our costs was covered

\*Fiscal Year 2021, expenses were \$55.603.679. categorical revenue was 30,535,040; 55 percent of our costs was covered.

\*Fiscal Year 2022, expenses were \$62,994,571, categorical revenue was \$29,998,479; 48 percent of our costs was covered.

\*Fiscal Year 2023, expenses were \$72,381,245. categorical revenue was \$33,624,162; 46 percent of our costs was covered.

\*Our fiscal year 2024 budget estimates expenses at \$77,362,898 and our categorical revenue at

\$34,960,759; 45 percent of our costs was covered.

Over the past four years, the cost of providing transportation has increased nearly \$20 million, but funding from the state has only increased by \$5 million over the same time period.

So how do we pay for the rest?

We pay from other parts of our operating budget, which means less money for operating costs that often limits our ability to provide all of the educational options we would like or provide the salaries we would like.

So "pay them more"

is not always as easy as it sounds, though we certainly try. In fact, the district is currently offering numerous bonuses like a \$1,500 perfect attendance bonus, a \$300 safe driver bonus, a sign-on bonus of \$2,000, up to \$9,000 in bonuses for drivers who drive combo routes and a \$300 referral bonus. The district will also pay for a new hire to get their commercial driver's

license training. As I've shared before, this is just another example of the grossly underfunded public education system in Florida. Education is now only around 40 percent of the state budget where it used to be around 60 percent in 1985. Our public K-12 schools are receiving less of that 40 percent as well with the instate university system, charter schools, and now homeschooling and private school vouchers.

Remember, there is no state law that requires any of them to provide transportation. That is only applicable to your public K-12 schools. Thus, a private school can use vour tax dollars for anything

also a worry that educational institutions won't be able to adapt quickly enough to the new tasks workers will perform. As a result, some experts anticipate more companies training their hires on the job.

Many higher education programs would then focus primarily on basic skills like communication and use of technology. As a result, the average time spent in college or university could be reduced to one or two years. But would this limit students' exposure to broader topics like history and literature, and what would be the consequences?

Of course, most of this discussion is speculative. Still, I think there is a coming overhaul of education and training as a result of the upcoming disruption in the labor market due to technology like AI. Do you think this is the biggest issue facing us in the future, and if so, how should we respond? You decide.





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


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### Postal carrier is hero








### DeSantis signs some of the last bills to wrap up 2024 legislative session

Governor Ron DeSantis recently signed some of the last bills to wrap up the 2024 legislative session.

House Bill 1347 allows consumer finance companies to increase annual interest rates, of which they can charge up to 36 percent on the first \$10,000 of principal amounts; 30 percent on amounts that exceed \$10,000 up to \$20,000; and 24 percent on amounts between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

DeSantis vetoed a bill in 2023 that would have implemented the same changes. The bill went into effect on Monday.

Senate Bill 1600 streamlines the Florpeople who have licensed professions in other states or territories.

New laws would require boards in the Florida Department of Professional Regulation, or the department itself if no board exists, to allow licensure by endorsement for any applicant who meets the specified criteria.

The Florida Department of Health would be required to issue a license by endorsement to a qualified applicant within seven days of receipt of required documents for specific health care professions, including certified nursing assistants, registered nurses, radiation technicians, midwives, occupational therapists and pharmacists.

SB 770 amends the ida licensure process for Property Assessed Clean Energy program, which allows property owners to make qualifying improvements, such as enhanced energy efficiency, wind resistance and sustainable building improvements, to their properties and finance the cost through annual non-ad valorem tax assessments.

The bill restructures the program to enhance protection for consumers entering into program contracts, ensuring oversight for contractors installing improvements, and expands the list of improvements this financing could be used for installing improvements.

SB 736 changes various services and programs administered by the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles. Specifically, it revises the requirement for a rightful heir to transfer ownership of a motor vehicle or mobile home if the previous owner died with a legal will. DHSMV or tax collectors would also be unable to charge an additional fee for reissuing a certificate of title if it is lost.

HB 619 revised statutes that treat contractors providing monitoring and inspecting services for the state as agents of the state for the purpose of sovereign immunity protections.

Under the bill, liability protections are extended from consultants to contractors performing monitoring and inspection services for the Florida Department of Transportation that are required for state road and infrastructure projects.






