OCPS gives backto-school preview ahead of first day

Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) administrators, school board members, and local law enforcement gave the community a preview of the upcoming 2024-25 school year and what the district is doing to make returning to school a success.

OCPS conducted the 2024 back-to-school news conference on Friday, August 9, at Winter Park High School in Winter Park, in time for the district's first day of school for students on Monday, August 12.

Winter Park High School is currently under construction thanks to the half-cent sales tax that voters originally voted for in 2024. The half-cent sales tax is up for continuation this year when county voters will vote on the referendum on November 5.


The newly redesigned flag will be introduced in time for a few upcoming city hallmark celebrations. This fall, the city will celebrate 142 years of its in-


There is a right way and a wrong way to handle City business. We are the second largest city in the county, and as such, we should conduct business in a professional and dignified manner.



Once again, OCPS was named an 'A' school district by the state Department of Education. Eighty-eight of OCPS traditional high schools have earned an 'A,' up from 77 traditional high schools. Sixty-nine percent of OCPS traditional schools has earned an 'A' or 'B'.

"That's up 7 percent, but we are not resting on our laurels this year. The district is taking stock of our priorities so that we can roll up and roll out our strategic plan for 2030. This plan will be laser-focused on producing graduates aligned with the skills our community needs," Jacobs said.

construction OCPS projects comprise of 10 projects this year, including Atwater Bay Elementary School, Howard Middle School, Innovation High School, and a new Orange Technical College Main campus, Vazquez said.

Mina emphasized that the students' safety, health and well-being are the Orange County Sheriff's Office's top priority.



the eastern portion of the beltway around Orlando. Many of you take this roadway to reach the University of Central Florida or perhaps, Orlando, or MCO Airport.

I remember when the western portion of SR 429 was opened. I remember this portion of the beltway being named after my friend and our current congressman, Daniel Webster. Congressman Webster, while he was Speaker of the Florida House, was responsible for securing the state funding. In fact, I packed up my two young children and their bi-

cycles to ride on the roadway at the dedication. Seeing that these two are now both parents themselves, you know this was about two decades ago

The final segment, about 25 miles through the environmentally sensitive areas of the Wekiva River, was incredibly challenging. The Wekiva Basin is fed by 19 springs and connects with the Floridan Aquifer. Additionally, the Wekiva River was designated in 1988 to be a "natural resource of state and regional importance." The roadway designers

and engineers had to create a complex construction plan that minimized potential development and any impacts. The bridge had no pillars in the water and required temporary berms to keep construction runoff from running into the river.

about any possible damage the highway could create. The bridge over the river is elevated without piers to allow unfettered access to wildlife and recreational users. It was constructed from the top down to further protect the river.

The book, "The River and the Road", states the inspiration for the Wekiva Parkway was the Blue Ridge Parkway which is in North Carolina and Virginia. That roadway is considered a national treasure. The Wekiva Parkway also "conforms to the contours of the land. It has lush landscaping and the overpasses and bridges are custom designed, and display... warm earth tones."

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
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Flag: Current design doesn't meet any of association's standards, says city worker

corporation as the town of Apopka City, and the 100th anniversary of the City Hall building, which will be in May 2025.

Quoting the North Vexillologi-American cal Association (NAVA), Cribb said that according to the group, "A well-designed city flag can foster civic pride and community cohesion. It can support the city's branding and promotion. And a simpler flag usually costs the city and its residents less, leading to its broader use."

At the time of the City Council meeting, the flag was flying at half-mast. Hoisted up that high, it's difficult to see the small details on the flag, Cribb said.

The city flag is outdated, and missing an identity and culture, Cribb said. As well, the flag isn't unique because three other county flags in the state have a design similar to Apopka's, which has the green cross with the city seal in the cen-

ter. Cribb said he spoke with community historians and the city clerk about when the current flag was adopted.

"We haven't really been able to find anything as far as when our current flag was adopted. The response I keep getting was 'We've had it a long time,'" he said.

City Commissioner Diane Velazquez emphasized the necessity of mar-

keting to get community participation in the flag redesign contest. She also asked Cribb if the city is attracting local students to enter the contest.


Cribb said he and Mayor Bryan Nelson were going to schools promoting the flag redesign contest, and the city will also create a contest flyer for distribution.

City Commissioner Alexander H. Smith asked what the contest prizes

would be. Prizes have not yet been decided, Cribb said in response.

The city of Orlando conducted its flag redesign competition in 2017, Cribb said. The Orlando redesign competition saw 1,100 submissions including 950 from Orlando, 23,000 social media interactions, 156,000 visits to the city of Orlando website. The competition produced a win-

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July rainfall returns to above average, ending a five-month dry streak

PALATKA - After average. five consecutive months of below-average rainfall, July brought a much-needed increase in precipitation to the St. Johns River Water Management District's 18-county region. Eleven of these counties saw above-average rainfall, with northern and central areas benefiting the most. However, southern counties experienced a shortfall, including Brevard which was nearly 2.5 inches below compared to the July

Hurricane Debby had

a mixed impact across the District. Southern counties and the central east coast, extending up to Flagler County, received minimal rainfall from the storm. In contrast, areas closer to the storm's center, particularly the west and northern portions of the District, saw substantial rainfall. Nassau and Baker counties, for instance, averaged over 8 inches of rain, and one area in Nassau County reported

five days.

A full report outlining July's hydrologic conditions was presented at the District's Governing Board meeting. Highlights included:

Rainfall

*Districtwide average rainfall was 7.17 inches, 0.33 inches above the monthly average.

*County-wide monthly rainfall totals ranged from a high of 9.71 inches

more than 10.5 inches over in Nassau County to a low of 3.84 inches in Brevard County.

*Cumulative rainfall for the past 12 months was 50.33 inches, 0.68 inches below the long-term average.

*Twelve counties are now below their annual average, with Alachua County having the greatest deficit of nearly 5.5 inches below its average.

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

this time of year, but showing an increasing trend.

Flows for 4 Spring

*Silver Springs recorded a mean monthly flow of 544 cubic feet per second (cfs), or 352 million gal-

lons per day (mgd), a 16 cfs decrease from May, which remains just within normal range for this time of year.

*Blue Spring station in Volusia County reported a mean monthly flow of 146 cfs, or 94 mgd, within the

normal range. *Rock Springs experienced a slight increase in mean monthly flow and remains in the normal range at 58 cfs (37 mgd). *Wekiwa Springs ex-

hibited a slight increase,

recording a mean monthly flow of 62 cfs (40 mgd), and is also in the normal range for this time of year.

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

The Dump Cake recipe will make pleasant aroma while baking

How about buttersome milk chicken? Marvin Woods' Southern-Exposed Fried Chicken sounds as if it is going to be



spectacular. Marv says in his book, The New Low-Country Cooking, "Almost everybody likes good fried chicken, but I don't think everybody knows to make good fried chicken. It is best to start with the tastiest meat you can buy, but sometimes massproduced chicken, even top-quality birds, can use a little extra help. I often use marinades and rubs to give my meat and poultry more character.

"In this particular recipe, the most important ingredient is the buttermilk in the marinade. In earlier times, people hand-churned their own butter, so this was a great way to use the liquid that was left over. The acid content of buttermilk lends a tenderizing effect when marinating poultry, fish, or meat."

Spicy Shrimp Casserole from Southern Living's 1996 ANNUAL *RECIPES* will make your supper with maybe a little salad on the side.

Marvin Woods gives instructions for a very basic food that we love and use in many of our dishes: White Rice! He says, "Cooking rice can be tricky sometimes. Since this book calls on rice often, I've included a basic rice recipe. This can be eaten quite simply as white rice, or you can prepare the rice ahead of time and use it for other dishes like Hoppin' John or just plain.

From *Treasures and Pleasures* cookbook, here are Sweet and Sour Carrots. This recipe, which you can serve either hot or cold, was contributed by Irene Ustler.

Shirley Keck, the wonderful wife of our fishing expert, Jim Keck, who writes the weekly article, Goin' Fishin', treats us to her Dump Cake. This is very simple, and it is delicious, too! We know because she brought this dessert to one of our celebrations here at *The Apopka Chief* and The Planter newspapers. (And we didn't let her have her cake-taker back until she promised us the recipe, which follows below. Ha ha ha!)

SOUTHERN-EXPOSED FRIED CHICKEN

- For the buttermilk marinade:
- 1 quart buttermilk
- 1 tablespoon paprika
- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1-1/4 teaspoons salt

- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons paprika

all of the marinade ingredients. Place the chicken pieces in a large dish. Pour the marinade over the chicken, cover, and refrigerate for at least 4 hours and up to 24 hours. 2) Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. 3) In a shallow bowl or pie plate, combine all the breading ingredients. Remove the chicken from the marinade, letting the excess run back into the dish. 4) Dredge the chicken in the breading mixture to lightly coat; shake off any excess. 5) In a large skillet (preferably cast iron), heat the oil over medium heat. When the oil is hot (about 350 degrees Fahrenheit), carefully lower as many pieces of chicken into the pan as will fit without touching. (The chicken needs a little room so it can cook properly.) 6) Cook until the chicken is golden brown, 3 to 5 minutes per side. Using a slotted spoon, transfer the chicken to a baking sheet and bake for 20 to 30 minutes longer, or until cooked through. 7) Check the chicken for doneness by sticking the tip of a knife to the bone to see if the chicken is no longer pink. (If you prefer to finish frying the chicken in the skillet, reduce the heat if necessary so the grease does not get too hot and burn the chicken.

ally, until cooked through, about 20 minutes. But do keep in mind that finishing your chicken in the oil makes for a greasier product.)

Marv adds a note: "I don't believe you will have a hard time finding buttermilk, but if you do, you can substitute 1 quart of plain yogurt. Or try a mixture of 1 tablespoon vinegar or lemon juice plus enough milk to equal 1 quart and let stand for 5 minutes at room temperature."




