City Council public comments not livestreamed

Wednesday, The August 7, City Council meeting livestream ended without having public comment, after city officials had discussion about whether public comment should take place at the beginning of the meeting.

The city of Apopka YouTube livestream of the meeting ended after Mayor Bryan Nelson gave the mayor's report. According to the August 7 agenda, public comment was scheduled after the mayor's report.

Before that, public comment usually took place after presentations, more toward the beginning of the meeting.

After discussion early in the meeting, City Commissioner Nick Nesta made the motion to do public comment immediately after the presentations. City Commissioner Diane Velazquez seconded. The motion was rejected 3-2, thus keeping public comment at the end of the meeting.

Nesta mentioned Resolution 2016-16, stating that the City Coun-

cil has to make the decision of when during the meeting public comment should take place.

The City Council last discussed the public comment schedule was on February 1, 2023, and February 15, 2023, when both times City Council approved and agreed to have public comment just after presentations, according to Nesta.

"Again, not sure why this was moved I don't see why it was moved," he said. "It doesn't seem like any reasonable efficiency. It seemed like it was to attack the residents, and if we spent more time serving the residents, then these attacks would be able to get the union contract done, we'd be able to take care of our infrastructure, maybe have a balanced budget without going into reserves." City attorney Cliff

Shepard confirmed that meetings minutes showed

City conducts Back to School safety program



Apopkans from all walks of life said their goodbye to John Ricketson, publisher and co-owner of *The Apopka Chief* and *The Planter* newspapers at a community-wide memorial service August 3. John and Eileen Ricketson have faithfully served this community for 45 years, and helped shepherd Apopka through its amazing growth and success. John was 84.

Probably members from every civic club, many governmental officials, regular citizens, business leaders, educational leaders and so many other people came to show their respects to a man who cared for an entire city. Every race, many cultures, and those young and old all gathered at Victory Church across from City Hall, to remember and celebrate the publisher of these local newspapers.

VFW Post 10147 set the tone of the gathering with its presentation of colors, and Jim Neshit played "Amazing Grace" on the bagpipes as the memorial and remembrances kicked off.

how his dad, WR "Mac" McGuffin, chose the Ricketsons from a number of companies that wanted to buy the papers in 1979, because of Ricketson's integrity, values, and heart for a community. JR originally moved to Apopka as a youngster in 1958, before he enlisted in the army as a paratrooper. (That paratrooper comment probably gives you an idea of how courageous and committed he was to whatever he took on.)

Mike Manley read comments from Cate Manely who was out of town. Cate was the former president of the Apopka Area Chamber of Commerce, who worked for years with Ricketson to help build the businesses in the city.

The Apopka Chief is 101 years old, having been established on January 2, 1923. For decades, it was the only mass media to serve local interests in Northwest Orange County. Even today, as an award-winning publication, noted by the Florida Press Association, The Apopka Chief continues to do whatever it takes to build the community, cover the events, and en-



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Orange County's June TDT collections was \$30.5 million

Orange County Comptroller Phil Diamond announced on Tuesday, August 6, that Tourist Development Tax (TDT) collections received by Orange

County for the June 2024 TDT collection month were \$30,547,500. June 2024 collections were higher than June 2023 collections by \$519,200 or 1.7 percent.

Compared to last month, June collections were higher than May collections by \$2.2 million or 7.6 percent. On a fiscal year to date basis, collections are

down by \$475,700 or 0.2 percent. The chart below shows the monthly yearover-year dollar amount change in TDT collections since October 2021.

Ask Rusty: Why are earnings limited?

I try to read your article in the Carmichael Times each week and appreciate the information you provide. I am 62 and considering my retirement options and when I should do that to get the most benefit. I understand my full retirement age is 67, but what I don't understand, and I hope you can answer, is why there is such a thing as the Social Security earnings limit? I know that if I was to retire before 67, my benefits would be reduced. But since I have been paying into SS for 45+ years, and that money is technically money I have earned, why does SS care if I make more than the earnings limit? It doesn't affect them or my benefits. Can you tell me about the reasoning behind the earnings limit? I will, for many years after "retiring," continue working in my field.

This is a great question and, as a point of interest, our parent company, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), advocates doing away with Social Security's earnings test which affects those collecting benefits before reaching their SS full retirement age (FRA). In AMAC's view, it discourages people from working and, thus, paying Social Security taxes on their

the earnings test will not apply to you. And, if you lose any benefits before your FRA due to the earnings test, when you reach your FRA you'll get time credit for any months that benefits were withheld, resulting in a somewhat higher monthly payment after your full retirement age.

One final point: if you continue to work after starting your Social Security benefits and your recent earnings are higher than any of those in the inflation-adjusted 35 years used to originally calculate your benefit, your entitlement will be recalculated to give you credit for those higher recent earnings.

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
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



assess the situation by looking out their windshield.)

They are on the lookout for three things: roadway accessibility for safe passage, power outages (look for signs of electricity, or check the meter), and property damage from fallen trees, wind or water.

"We don't want to send anyone home that doesn't have electricity or water, or if they have wind or water damage," said Steve Harrison, manager for the Orange County Mosquito Control Division.

Safety checks are swiftly implemented — usually within about four hours, he said. "We want to get these done as quickly as possible so our cli- safely." ents can get back to their homes."

These county employees radio special needs shelters with real-time

updates of damages, or all-clear. Harrison said that though his team often flies under the radar, he's

especially proud of their team spirit during and after a storm. Along with safety checks, employees deliver supplies to shelters and assist with logistics during a storm. "We have to do whatever it takes

to fulfill the mission to protect people from public health threats," he said. "There are fragile individuals within our population who need extra care, and we're eager to provide the care and ensure they can get back home

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

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

How about **Baby Back Ribs** Chicken) (or done in the slow cooker?

In his book Hearty Country Cooking, Mark Sohn says,

"With this slow-cooker barbecue, you combine opposites: old and new, fast and slow. The combination of slow cooking and fast grilling makes these ribs tender and crisp. When you add a few grilled vegetables, you have another opposite that brings balance: light vegetables and rich pork (or chicken) barbecue. "Slow cooking results in tender ribs, and fast cooking yields flavor. I cook the ribs indoors in a slow-cooker, and outdoors on a grill. The result is a tender, succulent serving, soft meat inside and crisp with burned edges outside."

From *Hearty Country Cooking*, we also have Mark Sohn's Fried Green Tomatoes, with step-by-step instructions for a successful fry! He even gives a healthy choice alternative. Mark says, "In the movie Fried Green Tomatoes, the characters eat fried tomatoes for breakfast, a birthday celebration, an afternoon snack, and fresh out of the skillet at the Whistle Stop Café. I suggest serving fried green tomatoes for breakfast with bacon, eggs, and corn bread, or for dinner as a side-dish vegetable.'

Mark's Peach Cobbler recipe from Hearty Country Cooking has only seven ingredients, two steps, and 45 minutes of baking. He says this recipe is moderate in difficulty. You can find peaches in your market now, but if you have another fruit you would like to use, say apples or berries, they would certainly work, as well. If berries, you may want to hold the cinnamon, but add a little lemon juice or lemon zest.

Mark says, "From the Alleghenies to the Smokies and from the Blue Ridge west to the Highland Rim, this shortcake-style or biscuit-type cobbler is a favorite." And, I say, right here in Central Florida, where we love all sorts of fruit, we are sure to love this recipe!

Mrs. Hilda Vincent contributed her recipe for Lurvada's Bread Pudding. to Stew-Pot Favorites of Zellwood There is a note at the bottom that declares, "This is a Plymouth Citrus Produce Cooperation recipe."

From Stew Pot Favorites of Zellwood, we have Cheese Biscuits from Mrs. Ruth McGowan. She says they

MARK SOHN'S **BABY BACK RIBS** Recipe from

Hearty Country Cooking Ingredients:

- 2 sides baby back ribs (racks weigh 1-3/4 pounds, and are to 24 inches long)
- 2 cups Texas-Style Barbecue Sauce or commercial sauce such as Kraft Thick 'n Spicy or Mesquite

Smoke)

Yield: 6 servings

Cut each side of ribs so that it will fit into your slow-cooker. Cut the side of ribs into as few pieces as possible. Place the ribs in the slow-cooker and cook at medium for 10 hours. The temperature in the crock pot should stay at about 165 degrees Fahrenheit.

Fifteen minutes before serving time, heat a gas grill. When the grill is hot, move the ribs from the slow-cooker to the grill. Watch the ribs carefully or you may burn them. After you grill the ribs for 2 minutes on each side, use a pastry brush to brush the top (tips down, convex side up) side of the ribs with barbecue sauce. To keep the sauce from burning, I don't put it on the bottom. Put the ribs back on the grill, sauce side up, and grill for another 1 to 2 minutes. Add more sauce and grill 1 more minute.

Tip: to grill soft vegetables such as eggplant, summer squash, bell peppers, and mushrooms, cut them up, put them on a skewer and grill for 10 minutes. For hard vegetables such as onions, celery, carrots, and beets, boil until tender and then grill 10 minutes.

While you can serve grilled foods immediately, there is no need to rush your vegetables or ribs to the table. They'll be just as good after they have cooled some. Do not cover them or they will lose their crispiness. For a complete summer meal, serve with salad, grilled vegetables, a baked potato, and dessert.

MARK SOHN'S **BARBECUED CHICKEN**

Recipe from Hearty Country Cooking

Using chicken quarters, follow the same procedure as the Baby Back Ribs, above, reducing the slow-cooking time to 3 hours.

For my family, I fix 1 rack of ribs and about 2 pounds of chicken quarters.

MARK SOHN'S **FRIED GREEN TOMATOES** Hearty Country Cooking

Fried green tomatoes are prepared in three steps: slice the tomatoes, coat them with cornmeal, and fry. But if you have never seen fried green tomatoes, you'll have many questions: What kind of shortening do you use? Do the tomatoes need to be peeled? Do you coat the tomatoes with a batter, flour, or cornmeal? Do you flavor the batter with sugar, black pepper, cayenne, or hot sauce? Be sure to select firm tomatoes that do not show any signs of ripening.

Steps: In a 10-inch cast-iron skillet over medium heat, melt the lard until it starts to smoke, or until it reaches 325 to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. If you are smoking up the kitchen, the lard is too hot. Reduce the heat.

1) Cut the tomatoes into 3/8-inch slices. If you want batter to stick to the edge of the slices, peel the tomatoes. (I skip that step.)

2) In a mixing bowl, combine selfrising cornmeal mix, salt, and pepper, and coat the tomato slices with the mixture. Fry about 2 minutes on each side, or until golden brown. The tomatoes will be cooked through, but not overly crusty on the outside.

3) Drain on a wire rack and serve. If you let the fried tomatoes sit, what was crisp will be soggy!

4) Healthy Choice Alternative: In this recipe, the light coating of cornmeal does not absorb a lot of lard. For a light oven-fried tomato, after dipping the tomatoes in the cornmeal, place them on a cooling rack over a cookie sheet, and bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees Fahrenheit. Broil to brown.

MARK SOHN'S **PEACH COBBLER**

Hearty Country Cooking FOR THE FILLING: 3 cups sliced fresh peaches 3/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar 1 tablespoon cornstarch 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon FOR THE CRUST: 3/4 cup all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 cup heavy cream

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit. Arrange the sliced peaches in an 8 x 8 x 2-inch baking pan. 2) In a small mixing bowl, combine the 3/4 cup sugar, cornstarch, and cinnamon. Whisk until the lumps of cornstarch are gone. Pour over the fruit, and place the pan in the oven to warm.

3) Prepare the crust: In a small mixing bowl, whisk together the flour, 2 tablespoons sugar, and baking powder. Stir in the cream. Pat the crust into a flat 8 x 8-inch shape, cut into guarters (for ease of moving it to the pan), and lay it over the peaches. With a knife, slash four steam vents. Return the pan to the oven, and bake for 45 minutes, or until the fruit mixture bubbles up through the center. Healthy Choice Alternative: Replace the heavy cream with skim milk, making the crust less tender. Then, without salt, eggs, or fat, this dessert should fit into a variety of diets. To cut calories, reduce the sugar in the filling to 1/2 cup. Serve warm from the oven, topped with ice cream, heavy cream, or whipped cream. Serve in bowls with a hard sauce or Buttermilk Glaze. Yield: 8 servings.

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
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

City: Commissioners want public comment moved back to the beginning of the meetings

the public comment topic was last raised on February 1 and February 15, 2023; however, on February 15, City Council made no motion.

According to the City Council reports of the February 15, 2023, minutes, "Commissioner Velazquez stated that she'd like to see public comment be moved back to where it was on the agenda as opposed to being at the end. She also stated that she discussed with the mayor that before public comment starts, he can read his expectations of flow before it starts. Commissioner [Kyle] Becker stated that he gets why the changes were made, but he agrees with moving it back to the beginning of the meeting. Commissioner Nesta also supports public comment being at the beginning. Mayor said okay."

Velazquez said she told the city administrator on Tuesday, August 6, that "there has been a backlash" over moving public comment to the end of the meeting. She recommended that the City Council holds a workshop to address the topic rather than only Nelson deciding.

local municipalities, Ocoee is the only one that holds public comment at the beginning of the agenda. In comparison, the other seven cities hold their public comment at the agenda's end: Altamonte Springs, Casselberry, Edgewood, Maitland, Sanford, Winter Garden, and Winter Park.

Nelson also referenced a Tampa Bay Times newspaper article that was published last month, "Clearwater council suspends open public comment to quell YouTube 'circus'".

Velazquez noted that in the previous administration, the City Council tried to streamline public comment to three minutes and move the period.

"At that time, we had a lot of pushback," Velazquez said. "I do remember that you [Nelson] were the county commissioner at that time and you sat in our audience during that administration. Part of that was you supported to keep the public comment where it was at and also to keep it at four minutes. I mean, I have a lot of that documentation from the previous administration."

Nelson wanted to read a state-

Nelson pointed out that of eight ment from city economic director Michelle Boylan, but Velazquez refused to accept the statement unless Boylan was at the meeting herself to read it. Velazquez clarified that over a year ago, the City Council determined no individual's comment would be presented if that person wasn't present at the meeting.

According to Nelson, Boylan attended an economic development conference, where she sat on a panel that talked about site selectors, who search social media for happenings in cities when deciding whether to invest into that city.

"When they [site selectors] see things that are very controversial over issues and that, [the investors think] is that a city they really want to be a part of?" Nelson said. "So, her thought was putting it [public comment] at the end and still we're giving plenty of access to the people here at the dais, and yet we're not bogging down people that are trying to do business here, the city of Apopka. Her thought was, we ought to look at putting it at the end.'


