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Apopka topples Ocoee for second year in season opener

The 2024 regular season didn't start as planned for Apopka as inclement weather forced last Friday night's game on August 23, to be rescheduled. But knowing Apopka's fervor for Blue Darter football, the team was able to play the next day on Saturday, August 24, and came away with the victory.

When I talked to head coach of Apopka, Jeff Rolson, this week he told me that it was an important win as the first game of the regular season and also because it's a district game. But, he said the team still has a long way to go. Defensive linemen coach Matt Anderson was also

in the field house and was praising Apopka's D-line and had this to say when I asked about the game. "It was a good win, and we scored five times as many points on them this year than last year," Anderson said while alluding to Apopka's 2-0 win over

Ocoee last season. Apopka beat Ocoee 10-0 which makes two seasons in a row for Apopka shutting out the Knights. Apopka looked better on both sides of the ball in this game than they did in the preseason game against Tampa Bay Tech. Rolson says most of the guys are getting more comfortable and confident in their roles now and should only get better as the season progresses.

A stat breakdown for the game shows that Apopka was ahead in every stat except passing yards and completion rate. Apopka ran 54 plays to Ocoee's 30, Apopka had 247 yards to Ocoee's 99, Apopka had 185 rushing yards to Ocoee's -32 (yes negative

32), Apopka had 18 passing yards to Ocoee's 131 passing yards, and Apopka had a 27.3 percent completion rate and Ocoee had a 64.7 percent completion rate.

I think Apopka's most important stat for this game besides their rushing yards is their third down conversion percentage. Apopka had a 58.3 percent conversion rate on the third down compared to Ocoee which had a 16.7 percent conversion rate. That disparity allowed Apopka to have a lot more possession which keeps the ball in Apopka's hand for more opportunities to score and keeps it out of Ocoee's hand.

Besides all of the good that Apopka had, it could have been better and Rol-

son agreed. We talked about the multitude of opportunities that the Blue Darters had to run up the scoreboard from Ocoee's mistakes. Ocoee was fumbling the ball all night and Apopka was recovering most of them. From bad snaps to just dropping passes and thinking the ball is dead, Ocoee kept giving the ball away. The problem was that Apopka wasn't doing much to capitalize on those opportunities.

Ocoee fumbled the ball two times and both times Apopka recovered the ball. But more than that, Ocoee had multiple bad snaps that killed their drives and even a bad snap on a punt which gave Apopka the ball right out-

side of the Knights' red zone.

Apopka's first drive was a 15-play drive that ended with an incomplete pass on fourth and nine on Ocoee's 28-yard line. And in the second half, Apopka had the ball inside of Ocoee's forty-yard line twice and couldn't get points on either drive.

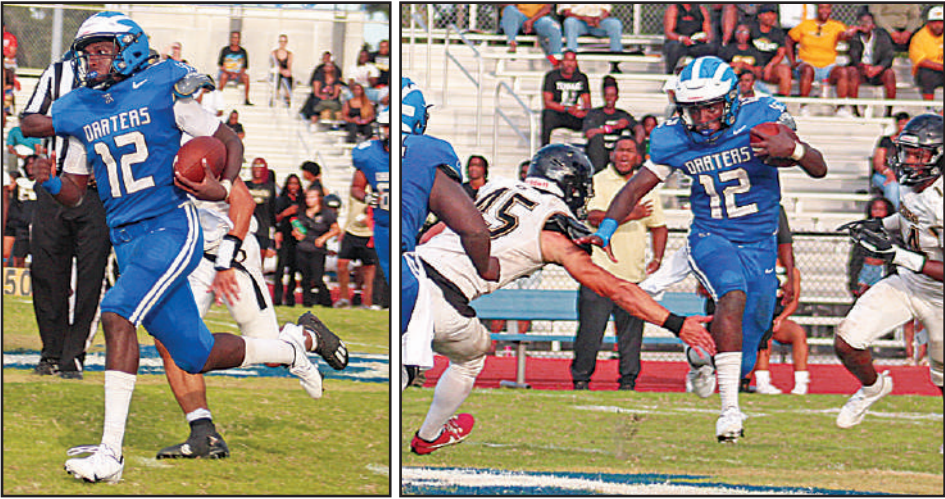
"Everybody in our program understands that if you're starting on the 40 going in, there needs to be some points that come from that, whether it's a field goal or touchdown, there's got to be some points," said Rolson

Rolson went on to say how important it is, especially when given the op-

Mustangs travel to West Orange for season opener

The Wekiva Mustangs continue to renew the oldest of rivalries tonight, Friday, August 30, and as the road team against the West Orange Warriors. All but a handful of programs in the Central Florida area were postponed last Friday, making the contest tonight the regular season opener for both teams.

Only three season schedules faced by the Mustangs have not included the Warriors as an opponent: 2013, 2014, and 2020 (dropped due to the pandemic). The teams meeting during the second round of the 2018 FHSAA playoffs brings their total to 16 since 2007 (when Wekiva opened). The high number of meetings between the Mustangs and Warriors is buoyed by membership in the same district during 10 seasons.

Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m. at Raymond Screws Stadium on the West Orange campus.

"There is work to be done improvement-wise as

is always the case," Gabriel reiterated since the first regular season contest was postponed. "Good teams consistently get better as the season progresses. We are excited to get the regular season underway and begin the process of making that improvement beyond just practicing. Some of the answers might not be liked, but the only way to improve is taking on better teams."

The current count of the rivalry is 9-6 in the Mustangs' favor entering the contest tonight.

Scoring was unexpectedly at a premium during last season's contest. Decided by a 12-9 score, Wekiva moved the ball just enough to eke out the victory. Total yards gained were in favor of the Mustangs at 331-258. Seventy percent, or 233 of the 331 yards, was gained on five plays though. As is usually the case with a low score, three turnovers also had a role. Possession was held by Wekiva for the last 4:43 and changed because of an interception.

Both teams are at-

tempting to regain perennial FHSAA playoff qualifier status. A reputation for consistency with the play on the field as well as records and qualifying for the playoffs has been developed by the Warriors. Over the last 10 seasons, West Orange has earned a berth eight times while under the leadership of two different head coaches. The Warriors have also won at least one contest during six playoffs as well as advanced to four regional finals (last eight).

Questions surrounding West Orange are many as the 2024 season begins. The record slumped to 3-7 last season. Then, less than a handful of starters return for the 2024 season.

However, outcome of the Preseason Kickoff Classic against the Horizon Hawks was impressive with a 36-5 victory. An opportunistic defense and the versatile play of athlete Brian Dillard set up the Warriors' scoring throughout the contest.

West Orange also en-

Apopka faces off against Evans Trojans in week two

Today Friday, August 30, the Apopka Blue Darter football team will face off against a familiar foe, The Evans Trojans. Last year Apopka faced off against the Trojans twice, once in the regular season and once in the playoffs. Both times Apopka came away with strong wins so it's fair to assume the Trojans will be coming to Apopka with some animosity.

Apopka will be Evans' first opponents of their reg-

ular season because their game last week against West Orange was postponed like Apopka's. But in their Kickoff Classic game, they faced Haines City that they beat 26-0. Evans is currently ranked 135th in Florida, 29th in Orlando, and 23rd in Division 6A. Haines City is currently ranked 146th in Florida, 33rd in Tampa, and 25th in Division 7A.

Haines City is no pushover so a 26-0 win is impressive and should be a red flag for Apopka's defense. But preseason games are not what the teams real-

ly are as coaches and players are using it as a chance to try things and adjust their game plan.

Evans bounced from the pass to the run effectively looking like they play a 70/30 run-to-throw ratio focusing on trying to catch the defenders when they over or under commit to the run or the pass. A lot of Evans' pass game was centered around screen plays. Their passing game was working at the start of the game but once Haines City

figured out they needed to focus on underneath routes and screens Evans had to stick to the run as it was the only thing working.

Evans' run game revolves around a back named Li'darious Pryor. The junior running back collected 115 yards on 12 carries and had a 57-yard rushing touchdown. But he also has great hands and collected 29 receiving yards on two catches.

The Evans defense looked great. Keeping any team to zero points while you run up the score is hard

to do. The Trojans were able to do this with good coverage and an even better defensive line. The Trojans' defense had three sacks, 11 quarterback hurries, and ten tackles for loss. But that's not all! The Trojans' secondary also collected two interceptions, one of which turned into a 75-yard pick-six.

Apopka's defense looked great last week in the win over Ocoee but now faces another team that showed a high-level offense in preseason. If you remember, Ocoee put up 40 points and allowed zero in their preseason game. So,

it's not like Apopka wasn't ready for an explosive offense last week. I think if they keep up the same work they did last week, the game will be very much in their control.

It's safe to say this doesn't look like the Evans Trojans that Apopka faced last year who were constantly fumbling the ball and couldn't keep their snaps in their quarterback's hands.

I think this will be a very even match-up for Apopka and a game that will test the limits of the new Apopka Blue Darters.

Apopka: Focus is on securing points when inside the 40-yard line

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portunities Ocoee gave them, to secure points early and often every time you're in a scoring position.

"You know, for me, it's like when we kicked that field goal and there's, I don't know, about a minute and a half left, whatever it was. I mean, that is such a sigh of relief knowing that they can't throw it over your head, or you can't miss a tackle and now you've lost. So, we've got to be able to, when we have an opportunity, put some points on the board and get a cushion. We have to find a way to get that done. So, I think everybody understands that, and my kids are going to work and get better."

Getting to the game, it started quiet and from the score, you can tell it stayed quiet for most of the game. After Apopka failed to convert on a fourth down right outside of Ocoee's red zone Ocoee fumbled just outside of Apopka's red zone which Apopka recovered as the first quarter came to a close at 0-0.

In the second quarter, Apopka's first drive ended in a punt and Ocoee followed that drive up with a punt of their own. Apopka's next drive consisted of 17 plays that ended in a rushing touchdown from Tyson Davison. The biggest play of the drive came from Davison, a scramble for 30 yards. Davison rolled right out of the

pocket, looked downfield and couldn't find anything as the defense smothered his receivers. As the linebackers dropped farther back into coverage Davison pumped a pass to get them to run back more and then took off on his feet. He stiff-armed one defender and weaved around a handful more before being brought down out of bounds after a 30-yard gain.

After grinding out the rest of the drive on the ground, Davison brought it in himself on a quarterback sneak that looked more like the Philadelphia Eagles tush push play where players behind the quarterback push and help the quarterback force his way forward. Apopka was up 7-0 after the extra point was good.

But that wasn't the only time Davison saved the day Saturday night. He did it again in the fourth quarter to save a would-be scoring drive. After two back-to-back 10-yard penalties, an incompletion, and a five-yard penalty, Apopka was facing a third and 34 on their 11-yard line.

Backed up on his goal line, Davison called for the snap on a quarterback run play with no hesitation. He went right up the middle and then cut to the away team sideline and was in a foot race with an Ocoee defensive back. Davison had just enough juice left in him to grab 36 yards clearing the first down marker by two yards giving

ing Apopka a chance to keep the drive going. Ten plays and 53 yards later Apopka set up for a field goal that would push them ahead 10-0 for some insurance near the end of the fourth quarter. The kick was good and the Apopka sideline and stands could both take a sigh of relief knowing that the game was in good hands now.

Ocoee had one more drive to go and try to put up some points before time ran out but after a 13-yard completion, their luck ran out. Apopka went into a 3-3 formation which puts an extra defensive back in coverage instead of a fourth lineman and played aggressively. After a completion for no gain on first down the Ocoee quarterback was sacked for a loss of 13 yards by Trey Muldrow. And, on third down Ocoee threw another incompletion which forced them to settle for a punt giving the ball back to Apopka.

Apopka went into victory formation and ran out the clock to win 10-0 starting 1-0 in conference play as well as the regular season.

One of the biggest changes between this game and the one against Tampa Bay Tech, Rolson said, was what he's changed on defense and who has shifted. The first thing he talked about was moving Trey Muldrow from the SAM nickel safety position he was in and bringing him back into the box

to be a sub-linebacker. Rolson said he did it because controlling the run is the first thing and most important thing Apopka needs to control. He said the loss to Tampa Tech proved to him that what they had wasn't working and wasn't going to work. But Muldrow wasn't the only guy who has shifted since the pre-season game.

"During the Kickoff Classic, I rotated guys in the spot (middle linebacker) in there and let them play. We were not ready to get it done. So, I took a guy (Muldrow) who could play there and put him in, and he also solidifies it, because the kid next to him is a sophomore, but having a senior who's a three-year starter (Muldrow) next to you helps you get lined up."

Rolson said he's even taken linebackers and had them starting to work as running backs. He said it's all about just trying to find guys who are willing to go out and make the play that gets the first down or keeps their opponent from getting a first down.

One thing Rolson is still unhappy with is Apopka's passing game. Not that he wants more passes but that when we are passing the ball, because it's such a rare thing in our offense, we are completing the pass and getting yards.

"Yeah, we need to be able to run the football and we want to throw it no more than 15 times a game, and complete 12 of them. That's what we're looking for. Three for ten isn't going to do it. It's a waste of time and we might as well

not throw it at all."

Coach Rolson was pleased overall with the performance and especially the improvement and growth shown from this game and the Kickoff Classic.

"Defensively we played better technically this week than last week. And we expect that – everyone's got to get a little better every week. On offense, we have to figure out how to manufacture some chunk plays but I think we improved up front on the offensive line as well."

This week Apopka faces off with Evans High School at home. The game is slated for a 7 p.m. kickoff. Read the Apopka vs. Evans preview to learn more about the matchup.

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ters the contest spearheaded by the victory ranked number 15 in the Orlando Sentinel's Super 16.

Three seasons ago, Geno Thompson was promoted from defensive coordinator to the head coaching position and entrusted with carrying on

the consistency.

The make-over has developed into much different than the state final-four team of two seasons ago. The explosiveness and dynamism has significantly decreased as well.

"Talent is no less of an impact as far as determining the outcome," Gabriel said. "The players are finding

ing their way and identity right now. However, what a team needs to win is still on the Warriors' roster. Recognizing the kind of talent and how to use it is different. Then how much time is needed for the potential to come to fruition is the question."

West Orange is much more systematic, methodical, and drive-the-ball-downfield with multiple plays on offense for the most part under Thompson than in the past. The standard scoring drive consists of at least 10 plays. "The longer the offense keeps possession, the time of possession for the opponent decreases," is the underlying concept.

Multiple offenses are employed by the Warriors. However, the spread is most commonly used followed by the single-wing. Rush to pass ratio is 60-40.

Majority of rushes are downhill, behind the line, gain the advantage by being more physical at the point of contact. Majority of rushes are powers, counters and misdirection though. Nehemiah Burgess didn't just emerge as the featured back. The featured back concept of rushing emerged, too, and as opposed

to a committee, with Burgess gaining over 100 yards during the Preseason Kickoff Classic.

West Orange employs the tight end position and one-back set as a standard. Thus, five receivers lining up is a rarity. However, from time-to-time four receivers are employed.

The passing game is balanced as well. Number of receivers thrown to is a committee approach. Where and distance attempted is roughly the same. Dillard was first among equals during the Preseason Kickoff Classic though, targeted the most of any players and scored on a 34-yard reception. Rushing and passing touchdowns were scored by Dillon, as well. Edison Delgado was on the receiving end of the touchdown pass and from seven yards.

Freshman Andrew Chung took the majority of snaps during the Preseason Kickoff Classic. However, about a dozen snaps were taken by Dillard as the quarterback in addition to back and receiver.

"Too early to specify or define with details what kind of quarterback Chung is after a few weeks of practice and one contest,"

Gabriel said. "However, the game was managed well by Chung and more passes were from the pocket than not."

Multiple blocking schemes and concepts are relied on by the offensive line. The "sum of the parts is greater than the whole," best describes the performance of and how the offensive line attacks opponents.

Wow plays on defense-sacks, interceptions, tackles for losses are also down under Thompson and when compared to the past. However, so is giving up long jaunts by standout players.

Also somewhat of a rarity, the 3-4 defense is relied on. Lowering the number of defenders at the line while increasing the linebackers changes the blocking concepts and schemes. Pinching as far as geographical location of defenders is a staple, starting with the outside linebackers blitzing.

Cornerback and Notre Dame signee Ivan Taylor is the first among equals on defense, receiving multiple offers from Power-5 schools.

"Aggressiveness and movement to the ball is

still the hallmark traits of the defense," Gabriel said. "Defensive line gets off the ball quickly in the first place."

Between 2015 and 2020, the Mustangs earned six consecutive playoff berths and advanced to the regional final three times. The record has slumped to 13-18 over the last three seasons though. With only six starters returning for 2024, the questions surrounding Wekiva are just as many as West Orange right now.

The Mustangs' fortunes for the 2024 season began to take shape and direction in January. Veteran coach and local product (as a player also) Doug Gabriel was hired.

A convincing victory began the season for Wekiva, as well. However, winning by a score of 36-0 over the Olympia Titans in the Preseason Kickoff Classic was a strong start to the Doug Gabriel era.

Covering 55-yards, an interception return from Jabari Smith was the first score of the contest. The tone and direction of the contest more importantly had been established by the

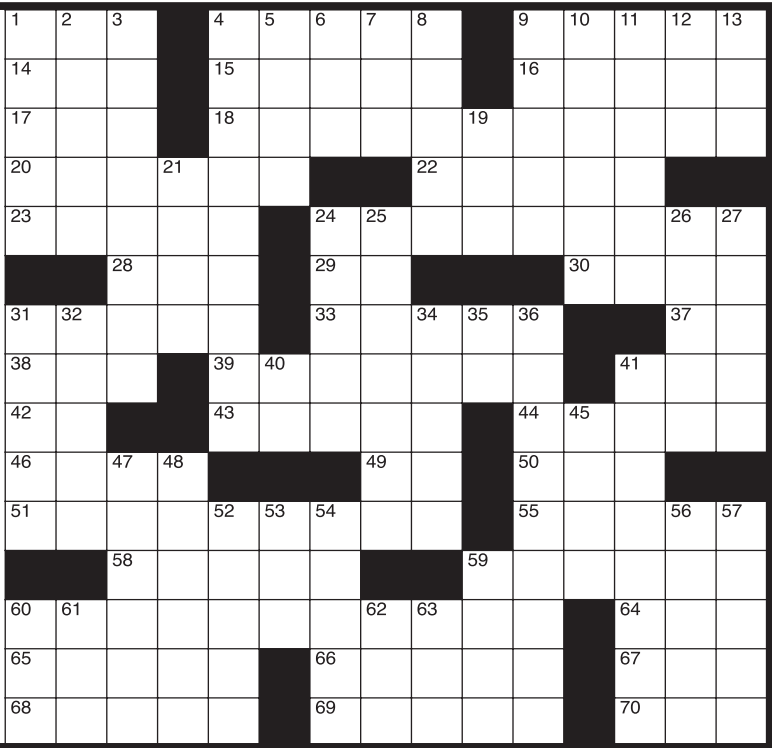

“Definitely a learning experience, whether or not taken to heart will only be known when playing again” Gabriel said. “The has been improvement though. The offensive line played way better than during the spring practice game. Playing together and as a unit was more natural. Speaking of the offensive line, (center) Max (Dume) provided strong good leadership with Jabari. Leadership was being looked for throughout the fall practice part of the year.”

Gabriel’s philosophy as a coach falls under running multiple sets and formations, a specific combination of pro, spread and Power-I formation on offense.

“Most importantly though, the priority of the staff is matching the players’ strengths with the best situation to use those strengths,” Gabriel said. “Aggressiveness is also an important part of the philosophy, but under control and with purpose. We made significant forward movement in both areas against Olympia. However, matching the players’ strengths with the best situations is still a work in progress, especially since only one

contest instead of the expected two played.”

Generally, pro-style offenses place a premium on a balance as far as design of the plays. In order to achieve balance, the use of multiple formations is a principal focus. Employing fullbacks and tight ends works hand-in-hand. Rushing is primarily built on zone and stack rushing schemes at the line. Intention is to create open space beyond the tight ends and tackles at the linebacker level, which the ballcarrier slides into.

Play-action is the trigger for the passing attack. The rushing attack has to gain significant yards for play-action to effectively cause confusion.

However, a wide and diverse range of formations and schemes within the Pro-set will be used as well as the power-I. Quarterback lining up in both locations (under center, shotgun) is the most noticeable of the range and diversity. The use of H-backs and tight ends on and according to the situation and 50-50 rush to pass ratio is featured.

The even front with movement on defense is employed. The use of four down lineman is the basis of the even front.

Cover three is also common for how the secondary covers the passing game.

While I haven’t been able to make it out to a game yet, I will very soon and will keep everyone updated on how the season turns out with some updates from Mater and some of his players.

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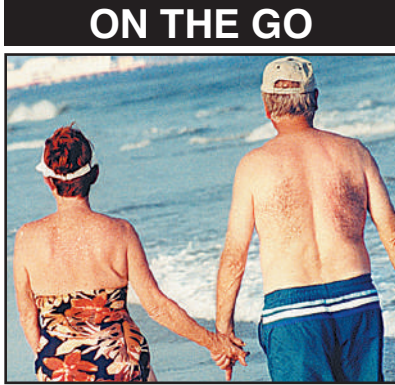

August 31 1786 - Shays' Rebellion began in Massachusetts as ex-Revolutionary War Captain Daniel Shays led an armed mob. The rebellion prevented the Northampton Court from holding a session in which debtors, mostly poor ex-soldier farmers, were to be tried and likely put in prison. Following this, in September, Shays' troops prevented Supreme Court sessions at Springfield, Massachusetts. Early in 1787, they attacked the Federal arsenal at Springfield, but were soon routed and fled. Shays was sentenced to death but was pardoned in 1788. 1980 - Solidarity, the Polish trade union, was formed at Gdansk, Poland. Led by Lech Walesa, Solidarity opposed Communist rule and was outlawed in 1981. Seven years later, the re-legalization of Solidarity occurred and the government agreed to hold partially free parliamentary elections. Solidarity candidates scored stunning victories in the elections that followed, gaining power in Poland and paving the way for the downfall of Communism there. 1997 - Britain's Princess Diana died at age 36 from massive internal injuries suffered in a high-speed car crash, reportedly after being pursued by photographers. The crash occurred shortly after midnight in Paris inside a tunnel along the Seine River at the Pont de l'Alma bridge, less than a half mile north of the Eiffel Tower. Also killed in the crash were Diana's companion, Dodi Fayed, 42, and chauffeur.

September 1 1715 - The "Sun King" (King Louis XIV of France) died. He had ruled since the age of five and was succeeded by his 5-year-old great-grandson Louis XV. 1939 - At 5.30 a.m., Hitler's armies invaded Poland starting World War II in Europe. 1969 - Military officers overthrew the Libyan government. The Libyan Arab Republic was then proclaimed under Colonel Muammar Gaddafi. 1983 - Korean Air Lines Flight 007 was shot down by a Russian fighter jet while on route from New York to Seoul, killing all 269 persons on board. The Boeing 747 reportedly strayed 100 miles off course over secret Soviet Russian military installations on the Kamchatka Peninsula and Sakhalin Island. It crashed in the Sea of Japan. Birthdays - Tarzan of the Apes creator Edgar Rice Burroughs (1875-1950) was born in Chicago. Before becoming a novelist, he was as a correspondent for the Los Angeles Times. - Boxing champ Rocky Marciano (1923-1969) was born in Brockton, Massachusetts (as Rocco Francis Marchegiano). He fought Jersey Joe Walcott for the heavyweight title on September 23, 1952, and knocked him out. In 1956, he retired as the only undefeated heavyweight champion. He died in a plane crash in 1969. September 2 31 B.C. - Roman legions under Augustus Caesar defeated Mark Antony's naval force at Actium.

1666 - The Great Fire of London began in a bakery in Pudding Lane near the Tower. Over the next three days more than 13,000 houses were destroyed, although only six lives were believed lost. 1752 - The British ended their use of the Julian calendar, switching instead to the Gregorian calendar, resulting in a major adjustment as Wednesday, September 2, was followed by Thursday, September 14. The correction resulted in rioting by people who felt cheated and demanded the missing eleven days back. 1789 - The third Presidential cabinet department, the U.S. Treasury, was established by Congress. 1864 - During the American Civil War, Atlanta was captured by Sherman's Army. "Atlanta is ours, and fairly won," General William T. Sherman telegraphed President Lincoln. 1870 - Napoleon III surrendered to the Prussians during the Battle of Sedan, resulting in the fall of the Second French Empire. 1923 - The first elections were held in the Irish Free State after achieving independence from Britain. 1930 - French aviators Dieudonne Coste and Maurice Bellonte made the first non-stop flight from Europe to the U.S.A. 1945 - President Harry Truman declared V-J Day (Victory over Japan Day) commemorating the formal Japanese surrender to the Allies aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. 1945 - Ho Chi Minh proclaimed the independence of Vietnam and the establishment of the Democratic Republic of Vietnam. 1962 - Soviet Russia agreed to send arms to Cuba, leading to the October Missile Crisis after the shipments were discovered by the U.S. 1963 - Alabama Governor George Wallace forcibly halted public school integration by encircling Tuskegee High School with state troopers. Birthday - Christa McAuliffe (1948-1986) was born in Boston (as Sharon Christa Corrigan). On January 28, 1986, the 37-year-old high-school teacher, the first "ordinary citizen" in space, died with six crew members in the Space Shuttle Challenger explosion. September 3 1783 - The Treaty of Paris was signed by John

Adams, Ben Franklin and John Jay, formally ending the American Revolutionary War between Britain and the United States. 1833 - The New York Sun newspaper first appeared, marking the beginning of the 'penny press,' inexpensive newspapers sold on sidewalks by newspaper boys. The paper focused on human interest stories and sensationalism and by 1836 was the largest seller in America with a circulation of 30,000. 1838 - Anti-slavery leader Frederick Douglass began his escape from slavery by boarding a train in Baltimore dressed as a sailor. He rode to Wilmington, Delaware, where he caught a steamboat to the free city of Philadelphia, then took a train to New York City where he came under the protection of the Underground Railway network. 1939 - Great Britain and France declared war on Nazi Germany after its invasion of Poland two days earlier. 1943 - Italy signed an armistice with the Allies during World War II in Europe as the British Eighth Army, commanded by General Bernard Montgomery, invaded the Italian mainland from Sicily. September 4 1609 - The island of Manhattan was discovered by navigator Henry Hudson. 1781 - Los Angeles was founded by the Spanish Governor of California, Felipe de Neve, near the site of the Native American village of Yang-na. The original name was El Pueblo de la Reina de los Angeles (The Town of the Queen of the Angels). 1886 - The last major U.S.-Indian war came to an end as Geronimo was captured. He died of natural causes in 1909 at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Birthday - Austrian composer Anton Bruckner (1824-1896) was born in Ansfelden, Austria. Best known for his monumental ten symphonies. 1774 - The First Continental Congress assembled in Philadelphia with 56 delegates, representing every colony, except Georgia. Attendees included Patrick Henry, George Washington, Sam Adams and John Hancock. 1972 - Eleven members of the Israeli Olympic Team were killed during an attack on the Olympic Village in Munich by members of the Black Septem-

ber faction of the Palestinian Liberation Army. Israeli jets then bombed Palestinian positions in Lebanon and Syria in retaliation on September 8, 1972. 1975 - The first of two September assassination attempts on President Gerald Ford occurred as a woman pointed a gun at the President in Sacramento, California. Two weeks later, a second attempt occurred as another woman fired a shot at Ford in San Francisco. Ford was not harmed in either incident. 1997 - Mother Teresa died in Calcutta at age 87, after a life of good works spent aiding the sick and poor in India through her Missionaries of Charity order. Birthdays - Wild West legend Jesse James (1847-1882) was born in Centerville, Missouri. Following the American Civil War, Jesse and his brother Frank formed a group of outlaws, robbing banks, trains, stagecoaches and stores. The stormwater management assessment appears on your Truth in Millage (TRIM) Notice so that you can conveniently pay the assessment at the same time you pay your property tax.

The average single-family residence in the City includes 3,600 square feet of impervious surface (roofed, paved, or similar surface), which equals an Equivalent Residential Unit* or EDU. The proposed assessment for one EDU is \$60.00 (Base Rate + EDU Rate) for FY 2024/2025. Assessments for specific parcels are based on either an assigned EDU or the actual impervious square footage, as set forth in the chart below.

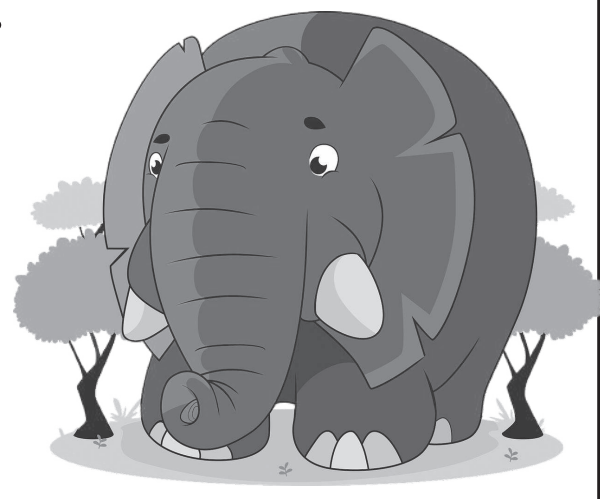
