



Florida officials predict stable economic growth for the next year

The Joint Legislative Budget Commission met September 6 to discuss the state's financial outlook and state officials predict stable growth for the Sunshine State.

Amy Baker, the coordinator at the Office of Economic & Demographic Research, presented the state's long-range financial outlook and said the work to prepare it begins early in the summer.

"This year's plan is gonna be addressing fiscal years 2025-26, 26-27 and 27-28. Mostly it's driven by two types of drivers, one is the revenue drivers," Baker said. "The big force in those, particularly this year, is what our assumptions are for the national and Florida economic outlooks and what we're doing with population growth."

Baker said Florida's gross

also provide information through three-year averages," Baker said.

Baker said they recognized a big surge of available non-recurring dollars, so they paced the expenditures to match that pattern but added that some states have not done that.

State Sen. Doug Broxson, R-Pensacola, commended the work done on the budget and added that it shows Florida's unique position.

"Then we saw the federal influx in response to the pandemic and our members, to their credit, made a joint decision that we were gonna take those dollars and spend on non-recurring projects, such as infrastructure."

As I have shared before, after Sandy Hook, the board at the time decided to hire Safe Havens International to come to our district and look at our campuses, and report on safety improvements that needed to be made.

That report turned up many items that were recommended and OCPS set up a plan to get it all done,



City reviews proposed revised comprehensive plan

The Apopka City Council and the Apopka Planning Commission hosted a joint workshop session to review the proposed rewrite of the city comprehensive plan, the main policy document providing the policy foundation for local planning and land use decision.

The joint workshop session took place on Tuesday, September 10, at Apopka City Hall. Since this was a workshop, no action was taken.

City planner Bobby Howell and Michelle Morrison, planner for the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council (ECFR-PC) presented the rewritten comprehensive plan.

"It's been a project that's been well in the making for some time now, but we've got it to a point where we're pretty much ready to move forward on it and solicit input," Howell said. "That's the perfect

gather input between the planning commission and then the City Council.'

In 2021, the city hired ECFRPC to conduct the rewrite of the city's comprehensive plan except for the which the City Council adopted on August 7, 2024.

As one of 10 regional planning councils throughout the state, the ECFRPC is made up of eight counties and 78 local governments in the East Central Florida region.

The ECFRPC's mission, according to the council's website, is "to serve its citizens and member governments by identifying and addressing regional issues through communication and collaboration to develop strategies that create a healthy, sustainable, thriving, and resilient region for future generations."

The state requirement for local governments to have their own comprehensive plan stemmed from



Apopka 'Proud Boy' pleads guilty to charges stemming from Jan. 6

WASHINGTON – An Apopka man and member of the "Proud Boys" organization pleaded guilty today, Friday, September 6, to felony and misdemeanor charges stemming from his conduct during the January 6, 2021, breach of the U.S. Capitol.

His actions and the actions of others disrupted a joint session of the U.S. Congress convened to ascertain and count the electoral votes related to the 2020 presidential election.

Nathaniel Tuck, 32, of Apopka pleaded guilty to a felony charge of obstruction of law enforcement during a civil disorder and a misdemeanor charge of entering and remaining in a restricted area. U.S. Dis-

An trict Judge Timothy J. Kelly will sentence Tuck on January 8, 2025.

> According to court documents, on January 6, 2021, Tuck, who, at the time of the events of January 6, was a member of the "Space Coast" chapter of the Proud Boys organization based in Central Florida, traveled from his home to Washington, D.C., accompanied by his father, Kevin Tuck, and other members of the Proud Boys organization including Arthur Jackman and Joe Biggs

The U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia and the Department of Justice National Security Division's Counterterrorism Section are

prosecuting this case. The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Florida provided assistance.

This case was investigated by the FBI's Tampa and Washington Field Offices. Assistance was provided by the U.S. Capitol Police and Metropolitan Police Department.

In the 43 months since January 6, 2021, more than 1,488 individuals have been charged in nearly all 50 states for crimes related to the breach of the U.S. Capitol, including nearly 550 individuals charged with assaulting or impeding law enforcement, a felony. The investigation remains ongoing.

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
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Orange County celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month with events
