On Tuesday morning, October 8, Hurricane Milton was expected to cause hurricane as it crossed the Florida Penindamaging hurricane-force winds and a life-threatening storm surge with destructive waves across portions of the northern coast of the Yucatan Peninsula, according to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

Ahead of Milton, a local state of emergency was issued for Orange County, as well as a state and federal state of emergency. The public was advised to finish storm preparations by Tuesday

NOAA also predicted that Milton



No tolls, shoulder use, and 511 in use for Hurricane Milton evacuation

Tallassee

Monday, October 7

Today, Governor Ron DeSantis announced that he has directed the suspension of tolls across Central Florida and West Florida, as well as Alligator Alley, in preparation for Hurricane Milton. By suspending tolls in the impacted area, Floridians and visitors will be better able to quickly and safely evacuate if and when directed by local officials. Tolls will be waived for seven days beginning at 10:30 a.m. on Monday, October 7, 2024.

"At my direction, tolls are suspended today as of 10:30 AM," said Governor Ron DeSantis.

"With evacuation orders imminent, this will help keep traffic moving and be one less thing for people to worry about ahead of Milton."

"The Department is committed to ensuring motorists can get where they need to go as quickly and safely as possible, especially in preparation for a major hurricane. Suspending tolls across the central and west part of the state and Alligator Alley offers an additional option for families to easily get out of the storm's direct path," said Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Jared W. Perdue, P.E. "As Floridians finalize their evacuation plans for Hurricane Milton, FDOT reminds travelers to check FL511.com for the latest traffic conditions and potential road and bridge closures."

The Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) and Florida's Turnpike Enterprise (FTE) will suspend toll collection at 10:30 a.m. EST on Monday, October 7, for a seven-day period, with tolls being reinstated on Monday, October 14, at noon. The suspension may be extended as needed depending on evolving conditions.

Parkway Toll facilities for FDOT, FTE Central Florida Expressway Authority, and Tampa Hillsborough Expressway Authority are included with this suspension.

FDOT is actively implementing Emergency Shoulder Use along Interstate 4 (I-4) and portions of Interstate 75 (I-75) to help facilitate the flow of traffic for travelers evacuating the storm's potential impact area.

Florida's 511 Traveler Information System is available for drivers to stay informed about roadway conditions during emergencies.

This service is monitored and updated 24/7 by FDOT and includes traffic conditions, road and bridge closures, and other specialized alerts. To use Florida's 511, visit the website at FL511.com or download the app on both Apple and Android devices.

Safety tips given for storm repair

ORLANDO, FL-

The danger of a storm does not end when it passes. The Florida Department of Health in Orange County suggests taking the following safety precautions to prevent personal injury when addressing storm repairs.

*Wear goggles, heavy gloves and steel-toed boots. *If possible, work in pairs or groups.

*Take short breaks and work during the cooler hours of the day.

*Immediately clean all open wounds and cuts with soap and clean water. Cuts beyond minor scratches may require medical attention.

*Avoid lifting more than 50 pounds of debris or building materials. Two or more people should move bulky objects.

*Avoid heat stroke and heat exhaustion by wearing light-colored, loose-fitting clothing and drinking a glass of fluid every 15 to 20 *Only experienced

people should use chain saws and specialized equipment. When using chain saws or other heavy equipment, wear earplugs. *To prevent electrocu-

tion in wet areas, turn power off at the main breaker.

*Never handle a downed power line.

Never bring gasolineor diesel-powered pumps, generators or pressure washers indoors as they release carbon monoxide - a deadly, colorless, odorless

Set priorities for cleanup tasks and pace the work over several days or weeks.

Avoid exhaustion by taking frequent rest breaks and resuming a normal sleep schedule as soon as possible.

*Never assume that water-damaged structures are safe; leave immediately if shifting or unusual noises

*Take advantage of disaster relief programs and services in your community.

Private/Gated Community Debris Removal

Orange County has developed a plan to assist private/gated communities where debris removal is necessary following a storm. The County may not remove vegetative debris from private/gated communities because they are considered private property. Orange County's plan consists of four options for debris removal in private/gated communities which need assistance.

Option 1

Option 1 is available to unincorporated Orange County residents as part of the County's curbside collection program. Following a storm, residents may set out vegetative debris according to the regular yard waste collection guidelines. As a reminder, please do not

use the blue and green lid roll carts for yard waste.

Vegetative debris set out neatly and meeting these criteria will be removed on your regular yard waste collection day unless the Orange County Utilities Solid Waste Division announces a modified schedule. Please note, however, that yard waste may be collected in limited quantities until the volume is reduced throughout the affected ar-

Additional Options

In an instance where vegetative or other debris is too widespread, too numerous or too large for pick up by Solid Waste, an official representative of the HOA or Management Company may contact the County by dialing 407-836-3111 and indicating the need for assistance. Orange County Public Works will respond to the representative and schedule a time to meet on-site to assess the damage and determine the amount of debris to be re moved. At that time, the County representative will review the options available and exchange contact information for follow up. Upon selection of said option, the HOA/Gated community representative will notify the County and property owners of the process selected.

Option 2

If it is determined the gated community needs assistance outside of the stan-




Voters must consider the effects of marijuana amendment


Mead's Bottom mural commemorates the legacy of the prominent black settlement of Mead's Bottom.







Pump strike teams on standby to support areas affected by floods

As Hurricane Milton intensifies and approaches Florida's coast, the St. Johns River Water Management District's Emergency Operations Center is closely monitoring the storm and implementing precautionary measures to protect both staff and public safety.

Key updates from the District include: All District offices will close Wednes-

day, Oct. 9, and remain closed until building safety assessments are complete.

All District-managed lands, including campgrounds and navigational locks, will close at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 8, and will stay closed until further notice.

Residents are advised to follow updates from their local Emergency Operations Center for the latest local emergency updates, including evacuation orders and flood-related rescue efforts.

The District is also closely monitoring water levels and is prepared to assist local governments and agencies as needed. Pump strike teams are on standby to support flood-affected communities.

For real-time storm updates, including flood warnings, river stages, and emergency contacts for local governments, visit the District's storm information page at www. sjrwmd.com/storm.

Regarding the St. Johns River Water Management District. The staff is committed to ensuring the sustainable use and protection of water resources for the benefit of the people of the District and the state of Florida. The St. Johns River Water Management District is one of five districts in Florida managing groundwater and surface water supplies in the state. The District encompasses all or part of 18 northeast and east-central Florida counties. District headquarters are in Palatka, and staff also are available to serve the public at service centers in Apopka, Jacksonville and Palm Bay.

A letter will be sent to the HOA/Management Company and copies provided to their contractor specifying the designated citizen site and starting and ending

al. Each truck must have a copy of the letter to enter the debris site. No debris is to be placed at the designated location, right-of-way or citizen site prior to the beginning date stated in the letter to the community. Option 3

The HOA/Management Company may opt to have the debris placed on public right of way outside the gated community property line. The private/gated community will then contract with a private contractor to remove the debris from the private/gated community to the designated public right of way during the pre-determined time period. The County debris removal contractor will be responsible for coordinating the hand off/pick up during the specified time period along with the County monitoring contractor to ensure the area remains clear for the safety of all citizens. **Option 4**

In the event enough public right of way is not available outside the gates of the private/gated community, a roll off may be placed in a location designated by the County. The private/ gated community will then contract with a private contractor to remove the debris to the roll off during the pre-determined time period. The County debris removal contractor will be responsible for emptying and replacing the roll-off during thr specified time period along with the county monitoring



learned about the scheduling conflict, it contacted the UCF School of Performing Arts to ask if the school's orchestra and choir would be interested and available to perform the holiday concert at the Apopka Amphitheater.

Representatives UCF were interested and met with city Parks and Recreation staff to discuss the event scope and concert details.

According to the city staff report, the UCF School of Performing Arts provided a quote of \$25,000 for the performance, with \$20,650 going to the school for the performance and \$4,350 going to the City's live entertainment services vendor, Birchmore Group, Inc. for concert production services.

UCF's proposed name for the performance is "Silent Knights: A Jolly Holiday Concert."

The service provided by UCF School of Performing Arts is not subject to competitive solicitation requirements based on an Artistic Services Exemption according to Florida Statute 287.057.3.(e).1. All additional concert production services will be rendered by the City of Apopka contract 2023-A-27 Live Entertainment Production Services vendor Birchmore Group

The city budgeted \$60,000 in Amphitheater Events for holiday and spring orchestra concerts, according to the city staff

The city annual holiday concert will be at the Apopka Amphitheater on Saturday, December 14,

Harbor House to help in establishing family justice center



Harbor House of Central Florida announced that it will be partnering with the team from the Family Justice Center Alliance. Harbor House of Central Florida announced that it will be partnering with the team from the Family Justice Center Alliance, a program of Alliance for HOPE International, starting January 2025 for a Family Justice Center Study Tour.

The announcement was made Tuesday, October 1, at the Orange County Sheriff's Office Headquarters – Mel Martinez Auditorium in Orlando.

Harbor House has invited the Alliance team to help Orange County begin the planning process for a Family Justice Center to help survivors of family violence and their families get the resources and support they need at one location – bringing together police officers, prosecutors, advocates, therapists, civil attorneys, community volunteers, and many others.

The first Family Justice Center was created in San Diego, Calif., in 2002, through a partnership between the San Diego city attorney and the San Diego Police Department. It evolved out of a collaborative relationship between community-based domestic violence agencies and criminal justice professionals.

The model has since been identified as a best practice in the field of domestic violence intervention and prevention by the U.S. Department of Justice.

The documented and published outcomes from the Family Justice Center model have included: reduced homicides; increased victim safety; increased autonomy and empowerment for victims; reduced fear and anxiety for victims and their children; increased efficiency and coordination among service providers; and reduced recantation and minimization by victims when wrapped in services and support; increased prosecution of offenders; and dramatically increased community support services to victims and their children.



The Study Tour will generate momentum for the development of a center in Orange County by bringing local elected officials, policy makers, and government and community-based agencies together to start the planning process for a co-located service facility.



Post-hurricane tips

NOAA offers tips for what to do after Hurricane Milton:

*Continue listening to NOAA Weather Radio (Weather.gov/NWR/) or the local news for the latest up-

*If you evacuated, return home only when officials say it is safe.

*Once home, drive only if necessary and avoid flooded roads and

washed-out bridges. If you must go authorities have not declared it safe. out, watch for fallen objects in the road, downed electrical wires, and weakened walls, bridges, roads, and sidewalks that might collapse.

*Walk carefully around the outside of your home to check for loose power lines, gas leaks, and structural damage.

*Stay out of any building if you smell gas, if floodwaters remain around the building, if the building or home was damaged by fire, or if the

*Carbon monoxide poisoning is one of the leading causes of death after storms in areas dealing with power outages. Never use a portable generator inside your home or garage. Review generator safety tips.

*Use battery-powered flashlights. Do NOT use candles. Turn on your flashlight before entering a vacated building. The battery could produce a spark that could ignite leaking gas, if present.
