Apopka takes home Mayor's Cup for second season in a row

The end of the 2024 FHSAA football season was marked for the Apopka Blue Darters last week with a win over in-city rivals the Wekiva Mustangs. With the win, Apopka stopped a loss streak that would've reached five with a loss to Wekiva and secured their seat in the 2024 FHSAA 7A Region Two Playoffs. It also makes Apopka the Mayor's Cup winners for two seasons in a row breaking the cycle of the last decade where whoever held the game at home won the game.

Apopka's win over Wekiva was the first game in which Apopka scored more than seven points since their 49-0 victory over West Port back at the start of September. That's a good thing to see as the Blue Darters head into playoffs against some very explosive teams.

"Once again, we made it harder than it needs to be. We did some good things... We should have put this one away but we gave up an easy score on defense which gave them hope and then we gave up another one to keep it interesting. So we did poorly to end the game and that's on us. But, offensively we were able

to move the ball a little bit more, get some first downs, and score so that was good. We missed two field goals so we're leaving points on the board. We are still not where we are supposed to be, but we won a game, so thank God for that," said head coach of the Blue Darters Jeff Rolson after the game.

The game against Wekiva was very interesting because of the timing of the scoring. Twenty-nine points were scored by both teams in the fourth quarter alone. To put that into perspective, there were only 36 points scored by both teams in the entire game. This game truly didn't start until the fourth quarter and wasn't finished until the final possession.

Most of the game was quiet. With the first quarter going scoreless, Apopka tallied one touchdown

in the second quarter, the third quarter was quiet coming out of halftime, and then the explosive fourth quarter.

The first quarter was interesting because we got to see a different look from Apopka on offense while

seeing the defense lockdown Wekiva's versatile attack.

The Apopka offense came out with one goal last Friday at Wekiva – get first downs! The Blue Darters came out with an oldfashioned smashmouth of-

fense from the very first set of downs. They made it very clear that the plan was to run straight through the Wekiva defense and get to the endzone through a true

battle of attrition.

Apopka was running a somewhat jumbo package

with a six-man front, Trevon Williams at fullback behind the front, quarterback Tyson Davison and a tailback, and two wideouts. For their entire first drive, Apopka stuck to the

Wekiva falls to Apopka, prepares for undefeated Jones

During all six losses this season, the Wekiva teams in each region quali-Mustangs have fallen behind by at least three touchdowns midway through the second quarter.

The most recent installment of the trend was against cross-town rival, the Apopka Blue Darters on Friday, November 1.

Then Apopka upped the level of how well the Apopka way had been executed against Wekiva, the best since the first contest of the season.

The combination translated to a victory by the score of 20-16 for the Blue Darters. Apopka has now won 13 of the 19 contests making up the Mayor's Cup Rivalry, or also known as the Tater Bowl.

Even with a final overall record of 4-5, the vicfy. Apopka was holding the seventh position in the FH-SAA's power rankings for Class 7A-Region 2 heading into the contest. Primary reason ranked seventh is the fifth highest strength of schedule among all of Class 7A.

The performance was what has become the expected and norm for a Blue Darters' offense, gaining 191 yards on 44 carries. Typical and traditional of the approach by which Apopka wins, the ball was moved methodically and systematically down the field, gaining 4.35 yards per carry. Two completed passes gaining a total of another 53 yards then broke the Mustangs' back.

and starting field position is important to all teams and almost always have an impact on the outcome. However, the Blue Darters' way is not just interested in emphasizing and applying the advantages of both statistics as part of the approach. Intention is to apply both statistics to the current situation with the utmost efficiency and as the centerpiece. The longer a possession lasts, the less time the opponent has to score. The worse the starting field possession, the less likely a team is to score.

Apopka held an 18-6 minute advantage in time

APK bowling surpasses their 2023 campaign, look forward to 2025

For the fifth time over the last seven seasons, both Apopka Blue Darter (Men, Women) teams had a presence at the state champion-

ship meet. "I am proud of both teams' achievements given the state of each," Blue Darters head coach Doug Campbell said. "Advancing to the state championship meet even though fairly young teams demonstrates the high level of talent and skill continuing to be developed in the Apopka

The state championships for team and individual as well as both genders were contested at Boardwalk Bowl, (10749 East Colonial Drive) on October 29, 30 and 31.

Two components are used to determine the state champion: a preliminary, 10-pin (traditional format for bowling) and then a head-to-head, double-elimination tournament. The 10-pin component at the state championship is made up of four games.

Teams scoring the 16 highest amount of pins during the 10-pin component then advance to the doubleelimination tournament.

Outcome of each match during the tournament is determined using Baker Rules and best-offive game formats. Similar to an offensive line-up in baseball, each bowler throws one frame during Baker Rules. The first bowler throws the first frame, second bowler throws the second frame and so on.

There are 16 districts across the state of Florida

championship meet. Tone of the expectations for each Blue Darter team were much different at the beginning of the 2024 season. Each teams' achievements at the beginning, during and at the end of the postseason continued to have a different tone. Circumstances, conditions and the state of the programs were much different between the teams.

Earning a berth in the state championship meet has now reached 12 consecutive seasons. The streak of reaching the double elimination component came to an end last season at 10 consecutive state championship meets though.

The Apopka Men's team advanced into the double-elimination tournament this season and further than last. A lot of would've, could've, and should have when the 2024 season ended remained for the Blue Darters though.

"Returning to the dou-

ble-elimination ment component of the state championship meet removed the bad taste from last season," Campbell said. "There are a number of factors having a role in how a team feels when competing, and at the state championship meet specifically. One less factor was no longer a part of preventing disappointing frames from turning into the negative and heavy feel."

However, Apopka then lost two consecutive matches and was a part of the first group (four teams)

Nor did the upduring the state championship meet. When bowling as well as capable of, the Blue Darters beat every opponent. When and for how long Apopka bowled as well as capable of was the unpredictable question asked throughout the season though.

Twenty-two percent of the frames or 21 out of 96 were left open by the Blue Darters. Spare conversion percentage was 58 percent or 29 out of 50 attempts.

Even more specifically though, Apopka left only four out of 33 frames open during the three victories. Open frames during the six losses totaled 17 out of 63 frames. The Blue Darters also failed to mark during the 10th frame and earn the third throw three times

Scores of the two series were: (3-1 games), 195-209, 231-76, 193-138, 224-185 vs. the Daytona Beach Seabreeze Sandcrabs and 237-201, 254-225, 201-212, 192-212, 182-136 vs. the Davie Western Wildcats (3-2 games),

Team scores of 919, 958, 958 and 964 for a total of 3,799 pins was posted during the 10-pin component as Apopka earned the 13th seed for the tour-

"Consistency among the scores was excellent, but mid-900 pins can take a team only so far," Campbell said regarding the 10pin component and then reiterated elimination during the tournament. "Turn-

Apopka also failed to convert six potential points into fruition. Two field goal attempts (from 28, 38, respectively) were missed. The second was only attempted because it was the last play of the first half.

A seven-yard rush with 4:48 remaining in the first quarter left Tyson Davison in the end zone for the first touchdown. Noah Morgan hauled in a 27-yard pass from Davison on second down. The completed pass also moved the ball into Mustangs' territory (the 35yard line).

Jumping the route, Henry Pickard's interception along the left sideline gave possession to Apopline. Jockee Sanders busted through the line of scrimmage, then outran everybody while following the right hashmarks and into the end zone on the next play. The final and eventual margin of difference was a 26-yard from Davison to Alex Rossi pass completion with 7:39 remaining.

Pass completions from Jackson Keillor to Dametrious Ellison and Jabari Smith accounted for the

ka at the Wekiva 29-yard Mustangs' points. The touchdowns covered 78 and 14 yards, respectively.

The contest began with Wekiva moving the ball from the Wekiva 20yard line to the Apopka 33 on five plays. Four consecutive incomplete passes followed, thus, ending the only somewhat serious threat to successfully counterattacking how effective the Blue Darters' execution of the approach was.



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ing potential pins knocked down into fruition has to be executed as well to keep advancing in the tournament. If just half of the spares left on the table are converted or another three, perhaps even two during one of the games, three of the four scores are over 1,000 pins. We then finish inside the top-10 of the standings.

"Consequences failing to turn potential pins scored into fruition is no less damaging to continuing to advance during the tournament and Baker Rules. We were able to avoid serious damage during the 10-pin component because 16 teams eventually advance. Only one team per match advances from round to round during the tournament though."

ment. Only 58 pins separated four of the bowlers' total scores. Angelo Mullica turned in Apopka's highest individual score of 809, followed by John Cruz-776, Logan Licovali-768, Bradyn Sowers-751 and Kolton Evans-695. Average scores were 950 pins as a team per game and 190 per bowler. Only 14 pins separated four of the bowlers' average per contest as well, 202, 194, 192, 188 and 173, respectively.

Six scores of no less than 204 pins were totaled by four different Blue Darters as well at least one during each game. Half or 10 of the scores reached at least 192 pins too. High score of 234 pins among Apopka was delivered by Bradyn Sowers.

Colby Todd, Cayden Bennett and Tony Price completed the Blue Darter Mens' roster.

"Nonetheless, anoth-

the teams added to the success' high level of consistency," Campbell said. "Much more is expected each season of the bowlers and teams than every other program because of the previous success. Success shouldn't always be measured by what the previous bowlers and teams

achieved though.

"Comments made by (coach) Jason (Ramos) are in step with my take on the Women's team. The Men's team is fairly young. Even though not advancing as far as accustomed to, the streak of qualifying for the state continued and with only a handful of matches (due to the hurricanes). 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ground and marched all the way to the Wekiva red zone but were unable to secure points.

The Apopka defense looked poised not only on the ground but in the secondary for most of the game keeping the Mustangs from moving the chains, but more importantly, from scoring when inside Apopka's side of the field. The defense did have their troubles giving up explosive plays late in the game but for the most part, did great.

There was great pressure on Wekiva's quarterback all night and he took his fair share of sacks and hard hits while trying to scramble for yards as the play deteriorated. The defense had more than a handful of tackles for loss and an interception that put them in perfect field position to score.

As I said before, the game really didn't start until the fourth quarter. With Apopka up 7-0 and the Blue Darter defense keeping the Mustangs corralled it seemed to be a slow march towards victory for Apopka going into the fourth quarter.

Apopka was on defense to start the fourth quarter after just giving the Mustangs the ball. Wekiva was starting their drive from their 31-yard line. The first play from Wekiva was an incompletion due to a Mustang receiver dropping a wide-open pass. The next play was Apopka's interception.

Apopka's Henry Pickard perfectly swoops in under a crossing route intercepting the ball and bringing it back to the Wekiva line of scrimmage nearly a 15-yard return.

Now with the ball in perfect scoring position, Apopka could get some insurance points. The Blue Darters capitalized completely on Pickard's play with a one-play 26-yard touchdown run coming from Jockee Sanders. Apopka was unable to secure the extra point but pushed ahead of the Mustangs even further 13-0.

Wekiva's next drive resulted in no points once again with a quick three and out as the Wekiva sidelines and stands began to truly look defeated.

After receiving the punt from Wekiva, Apopka started their drive on Wekiva's 41-yard line. And once again, Apopka drew up another beautiful set of plays that set up a touchdown perfectly. After running a sweep, an inside run, and an option to collect a first down and start a new set of downs on Wekiva's 27yard line Apopka goes with the play action.

Apopka's Elijah Frazier runs a skinny post and as the defense lets him fly by so they can read the handoff, expecting an option, Davison sees Frazier ahead by three or four steps of the safeties and lets go of a perfect pass landing right in Frazier's hands for another touchdown. After a successful extra point, Apopka was now up by 20-0 with less than seven minutes to go - so the game was all but over ... right?

This is the Apopka and Wekiva game. It's not over until the final whistle – and Wekiva proved that.

The Mustangs received the kick from Apopka and started their drive on their 22-yard line. One play is all it took. A 78yard passing touchdown to a wide-open receiver five steps ahead of two Apopka safeties. Wekiva elected to go for two and converted putting them behind Apopka 20-8 with just under seven minutes still to go.

Wekiva came out trying an onside kick to go for another score quickly but was unable to secure it. This gave Apopka the ball to start their drive on their 45-yard line. But Apopka was unable to do much and couldn't convert to keep draining the clock punting the ball away on fourth down.

Wekiva started their drive on their 18-yard line needing another touchdown quickly to stay in the game. In ten plays Wekiva was once again in the end zone. After a ten-play-82yard drive, the touchdown came on a 14-yard passing touchdown. Wekiva once again elected to go for two and once again converted

it. Apopka was now ahead just four points with Wekiva right on their trail 20-16 with just two minutes on the clock.

"I mean I had to take timeouts when we shouldn't have because we don't remember how to play base defense against base stuff that we see all the time that stopped them on their first drive. Then we're fine all the way until 8-6 minutes to go and were ready to pack it away and all of a sudden its 'Oh I didn't hear the call' or, 'We got too many guys on the field on defense', pass interference. Then, of course, we are getting cut, tackled to the ground, ripped on the edge, all kind of crazy stuff, and nothing happened so I mean it is what it is. We have to win. End of story. Can't leave it in the hands of anyone else."

But thankfully, when Apopka got the ball back the offense found their strength and resilience converting for a first down and running out the clock to win the 2024 Mayor's

"Well, you know, ev-

erybody wants to win. It's a rivalry and they always play really really hard against us, they're physical, and they're well coached. So, it means a lot to both of us to win this game," said Rolson after the game.

"The Mayor's Cup is a great win. This is my third game against Wekiva. So, last year we came out with a win, but my freshman year we lost in a close game. So, this means a lot to all of us, there are a lot of hometown boys we used to play with when we were all just little at Wekiva. And a lot of my teammates still see and hang out with those guys to this day. It's just a unique brotherly and intense rivalry," said Apopka's quarterback Tyson Davison after the game.

Now that the regular season is over Apopka has to worry about the gauntlet that is the 2024 FHSAA Class 7A Region Two Regional playoffs.

changed how they do playoff seeding with the change of classes this year as well. According to the FHSAA 2024 Football manual, "(a) Playoff field will be made up of 32 teams in each class. (b) 8 Qualifiers in each region. 4 District champions and 4 at large qualifiers. Teams will be seeded 1-8 based on the final FHSAA Max-Preps Rankings. (c) Higher seed will always host in regional tournaments except during the regional quarterfinal round where a district champion is facing an at-large team, the district champion is designated as the host regardless of seed-

The playoff seed order for Class 7A Region Two is Venice (1), Plant City (2), West Orange (3), Newsome (4), Sumner (5), Ocoee (6), Apopka (7), and Haines City (8).

While there are some teams above that need to

play one more game before playoffs the likelihood of the seeds changing is very slim. Even if some do change, they most likely would not affect Apopka's seeding or Apopka's opponents' seeding.

If the playoff bracket stands as it is now Apopka would be facing the number two seed as the number seven seed. The number two seed as I said above is the Plant City Raiders.

Plant City is one of the best teams in the state of Florida this year, they are 7-2 this season and have scored 427 points while allowing just 198. They are the 63rd-ranked team in Florida and are on a fourgame win streak.

Plant City is the eighthranked team in all of Class 7A but didn't have a very strong schedule. The FH-SAA has their schedule strength at 3.7 while Apopka sports a 8.87. So while Plant City looks miles better than Apopka on paper the difference in their opponents is quite important. Plant City has had an average opponent rating of 181.89 while Apopka had an average opponent ranking of 126.78. Apopka also faced five top-100 and two top-50 teams in the state of Florida while Plant City has faced two top-100 and

no top-50 teams.

Facing less playoff-caliber opponents will not be in the Raider's favor when they meet Apopka who has been playing against some of the best teams in the state consistently since week one. The Raiders allowed more than twice the points from their opponents than Apopka did and did so against lower-caliber teams. This proves that Apopka will be a challenge for Plant City as they have not come across a defense

One thing about Plant City is that they can score. The Raiders have 51 touchdowns this season (23 passing and 28 rushing) compared to Apopka's

like ours all season.

14 (three passing and 11 rushing). The Raiders quarterback, Chris Denson is rated 20th in the state in total yards with 2,507 yards. Denson is the definition of a dual-threat quarterback with 1,748 passing yards, 23 passing touchdowns, two interceptions, and a quarterback rating of 138.8 all while also bringing in 759 yards on the ground on 79 carries with ten rushing touchdowns.

The main piece of the Raiders' offense is their quarterback. If the Apopka defense can corral Denson, force him to be uncomfortable, and don't let him have time to improvise, they can control his explosive ability. If you can shut Denson down then it comes down to stopping the run.

Leading the Raiders in rushing yards this season is their senior back, Tony Marshall. Marshall has 935 yards, 16 touchdowns, averages 7.7 yards a rush, and 103.9 yards a game on

122 carries. Marshall also has four games where he has collected more than 100 yards.

This will not be an easy matchup, and it is definitely not the one Apopka wants to see in the first round of the playoffs. But, it is much better than what we could've been up against in Venice if we were the eighth seed.

This game is truly a toss-up for me just because the statistics and the numbers are so meaningless in this matchup because of the difference in opponents throughout the season. I think the Apopka defense has shown us all year that it can hang with some of the best defenses in the state, but I fear Plant City will be like Tampa Tech in preseason where it could become deflating for the Apopka defense to deal with such an explosive offense.

If Apopka can control the offensive juggernaut that is Plant City then the Blue Darters have a real chance to win this game with the improvements on offense seen in the Wekiva game that were hopefully built upon this week in practice.

"A lot of our coaches will say to us, 'build on days, you've got to build on momentum even if it's little,' You just got to keep building and keep building until we get into playoff form so I hope we bring this energy into practice next week," said Apopka's quarterback Tyson Davison after the win over Wekiva.

I asked coach Rolson what the team takes from the win and how they will build on it to be better for playoffs.

"Hopefully, some renewed energy, some renewed hope that we can turn this thing around and play better football and make a run."
