Cities, OCPS at odds over current **SRO** negotiation

Following the December 16 Wisconsin school shooting tragedy, the city of Apopka is asking Orange County Public Schools (OCPS) to reconsider its with the hopes that a deal pending negotiation for can be reached to main-School Resource Officers (SROs) on several OCPS campuses served by the five campuses in municipalities, including Apopka. OCPS currently has a one-year contract with the law enforcement agencies in Apopka, Ocoee, Winter Garden, Winter Park, and Windermere, which secures SROs on campuses for the 2024-25 school year in compliance with the Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act. The district has a threeyear contract with the remaining four agencies: Orange County Sheriff's Office, Orlando Police Department, Maitland Police Department, and Eatonville Police Department.

The school board provided direction for staff to continue contract negotiation on January 14, 2025, tain SROs on the 30 school municipalities. If an agreement cannot be reached, the Guardian Program is the only option allowed by Florida law to provide the added security to school campuses, according to OCPS in a news release from early December. The email that OCPS drafted and scheduled for sending to families on December 17 preceded the tragedy in Madison, Wis., according to OCPS spokesman Michael Ollendorff. From 1921 to the present time, The Apopka Chief continues

The following copy was taken from the front page of an Apopka, Orange County, Fla., March 7, 1921 issue of The Apopka Chief. The cost back then was \$2.00 per Year. The top banner had a box on the right that included the following copy: STAND FOR GOOD **CITIZENSHIP THEN YOU** STAND WITH THE CHIEF and the slogan under the picture of a head of an Indian Chief said "WHERE ALL THE TIME IS SUM-MER AND THE FLOWERS NEV-ER DIE." In addition, there was a box of copy on the left side of the banner that can be partially read that includes the words ...LIVE COMMUNITY ... PER THAT COVERS ... FIELD AND WILL ... WIN ITS WAY.


As we are about to begin a new year, we wanted to share what it was like back in 1921 for The Apopka Chief. The copy below was included in a frame on the bottom right side of the front very highest class. It includes page with a full-page drawing of a Miss Apopka holding a pencil drawing of the new building. The copy reads as follows: "The beautiful Miss Apopka, whose permanent dwelling place is in the heart of Summerland, where the flowers never die, presents for public inspection and favor today, the new wigwam of The Apopka Chief and home of the Apopka Printing Company, Incorporated. You can tell from the expression on the young woman's face that she is pleased and proud of this fine new acquisition to her resources. The picture she holds in her hand does not do the building justice, as it was made from a pencil drawing before the building was finished. The plant was built in record time, under the supervision of

Lee F. Lovell, of Apopka, and is 80 feet long and 35 feet wide. It has a handsome front of pressed brick and heavy plate glass. It is of tile, brick and concrete construction.

As it stands today, finished, with all equipment installed, it is the most complete printing establishment in Orange County and one of the very best in the State. It is a credit to Apopka and this is why the lady smiles.

The equipment includes a Single Keyboard Model, 14 Linotype, with sufficient magazines to carry seven faces of type. This is the finest machine ever turned out by the Mergenthaler Linotype Company and cost upwards of \$5,000. It was delivered through the New Or*leans agency.*

*The balance of the equip*ment came from the Atlanta agency of American Type Founders Company and is of the an improved Campbell cylinder press for newspaper work; a Lee cylinder press for book and pamphlet work, a Chandler and *Price jobber; an Eclipse folding* machine, which cuts, folds and pastes 8, 10 and 12 page newspapers, and a Wire Stitcher, Falmouth Punching machine, Miller Saw Trimmer, etc. Each machine is operated by direct drive from its own individual electric motor.



IRMAA uses a sliding income scale to determine your Medicare premium. If you filed your 2022 taxes as "married/jointly" and your combined income for that year was \$206,000 or less, for 2024 you are paying the standard Medicare Part B premium of \$174.50, and there is no additional amount added to your Part D premium. But if your MAGI as a married couple was over \$206,000 your Medicare premiums will be more - e.g., MAGI up to \$258,000 makes your Part B premium \$244.60 and results in a Part D supplement of \$12.90 per month. And so on – as your MAGI further increases, so will your Medicare premiums until you reach the maximum. MAGI over \$750,000 means a Part B premium of \$594/month and a Part D supplement of \$81/month. Thus, Medicare premiums are "meanstested" (those with higher income pay higher premiums).

Premiums: Income determines cost

A word about "MAGI" – MAGI starts with your Adjusted Gross Income on your tax return, to which is added any non-taxable interest you may have had, and 50% of the Social Security benefits (if any) you received during the income tax year. The total of those three amounts is your MAGI, from which your Medicare premium is determined for the forthcoming year.

So, if your 2023 combined income (your "MAGI") as a couple was under \$206,000 you will pay the standard 2025 Medicare premium which, for Part B, will be \$185/ month. If your 2023 MAGI as a married couple is more than \$206,000, you will pay higher Medicare premiums in 2025 due to IR-MAA.

Why not pay higher Medicare premiums when we are younger?

Well, that's because IRMAA only applies when you are enrolled in Medicare, and your premium relates to your income while receiving Medicare benefits.

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


• Journaling:

shooting herself.

For the current school year, OCPS offered all municipalities a 20-percent increase from last year's reimbursement rate and proposed a \$75,000 rate for the 2026-27 year - a 25-percent increase from the 2023-24 year, according to an email OCPS sent out to district families on Tuesday, December 17. The district-proposed SRO reimbursement increase far exceeded the 11-percent salary increase given to OCPS teachers and support staff over the last two years.


Four of the nine law enforcement partners have agreed to a three-year contract, but the five listed municipalities have not agreed to a contract beyond the current school year, according to the OCPS email.

"This year, OCPS is spending nearly \$17 million more than it received from the State of Florida for the safety and security

ship does not anticipate any significant increase in the allocation from the State of Florida to cover the additional \$2 million needed to meet the funding demands

of the five cities. Financial limitations have forced the district to look at other options. OCPS will continue to seek a multi-year agreement with the five cities and their local law enforcement agencies to avoid implementing the School Guardian Program in place of SROs in the 30 schools impacted," the email states.

The SRO negotiation could impact the following Apopka schools: Apopka High, Apopka Memorial and Wolf Lake middle schools, Kelly Park School, Dream Lake, Apopka, Lakeville, Rock Springs, and Wolf Lake elementary schools.



The SRO negotiation was addressed at the De-

program. District leader- cember 18 Apopka City Council meeting, where Chief Michael McKinley explained the position that the five cities have taken on the SRO negotiation.

"This communication was not only disappointing, but disingenuous," McKinley said. "Exploiting the loss of innocent lives to advance their agenda and garner community support is both unacceptable and in-

appropriate. At no time has the Apopka Police Department suggested or attempted to remove SROs from our schools. The idea of replacing SROs with Guardians is entirely an Orange County Public School initiative. The Apopka Police Department has maintained an unwavering com-

mitment to the safety of our

students and schools."

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


